Brownie Troop 429 To End First Year

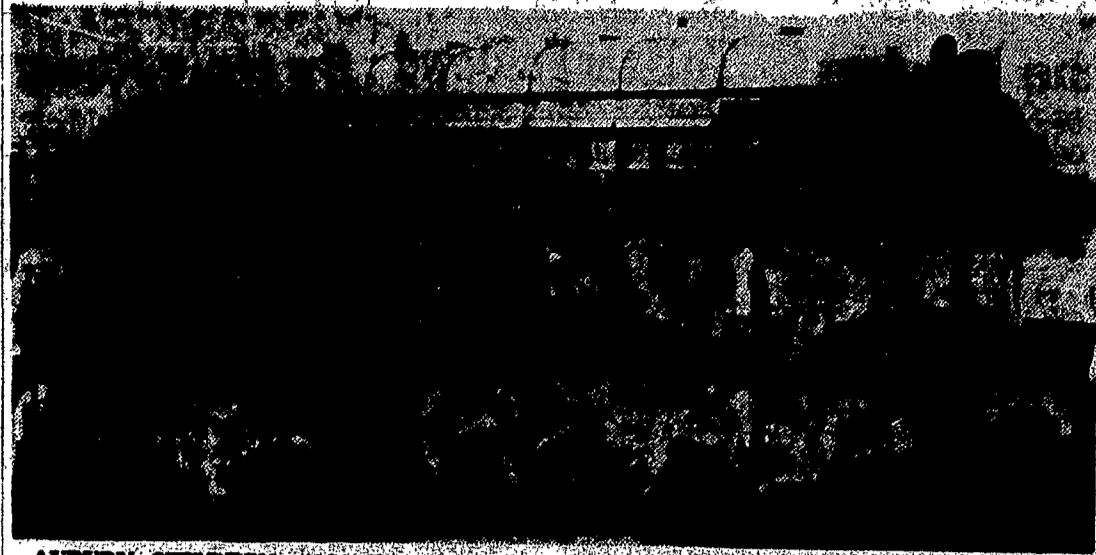

College Art Exhibit To Feature Charlotte Mural

Nazareth College Senior Art Exhibit will be held in the administration building, 4245 East Av., Friday, May 8, from 4 to 9:45 p.m.; Saturday and Sunday, May 9 and 10, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., according to Sister M. DeSales, head of the art department. It is open to the public, free of charge.

On display will be four years' work by five Nazareth College fine arts majors: Mary Ellen Creedon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond J. Creedon, 225 Flint St., Joan Battaglia, Buffalo; Virginia Strife, Old Forge; Nathalie Stuart, Albany; and Mary Lou Pike, Mendon.

A reception will be held along with the exhibit Friday; college art department alumnae will hold a reunion Saturday at 6:30. Guest of honor at the latter will be Prof. Walter K. Long, for 12 years a member of the art faculty, currently on leave of absence.

HIGHLIGHT of the exhibit will be the first showing of a 10 by 15 foot mural in the tunnel connecting the administration building with the auditorium.

Depicting the old lighthouse and a scene at Charlotte harbor in 1822, the oil painting was done by the five seniors under the direction of Mrs. Sylvia Davis, instructor. Months of research on consulting of the period and historic detail preceded the actual painting.

Graduating art students customarily paint a mural portraying a scene of local historic interest as a parting gift to the college. Side by side the murals line the walls of the underground passage.

Also to be shown are model rooms with hand-made furniture to scale, prepared by the interior decorating classes; commercial art work and fashion illustrations, stage designs, oils, portraits, water colors, sketches and other art works.
