

Donors Set Record At St. James, Hornell

Record—A local record, 265 pints, for the most pints of blood donated in a single day was set at St. James Mercy Hospital which sponsored the visit of a bloodmobile unit from Rochester on April 24.

The "Blood Bank" visit to St. James was promoted in "Mercy Echoes", hospital publication which set a quota of 250 pints. The publication stressed the need for blood also to produce gamma globulin, a human blood fraction, used as a Polio prophylaxis.

Fred A. Cornell, chairman of the Hornell blood program said the previous high donation was 263 pints of blood contributed two years ago by St. James Mercy Hospital.

Cornell said 250 persons appeared to give blood, with 212 of them from Hornell.

The largest groups were from the Erie Railroad and the New York State Department of Public Works. Officials attributed the heavy Erie turnout in part to the work of the hospital in speeding a blood supply from Rochester to aid Marie (Mike) LeMayman, an Erie employe, who lost his legs in a switching accident March 14. During the first day of the accident, 10 pints of blood were rushed from the Rochester bank to help him.

Sister Mary Elizabeth Anne, chairman of the hospital's recruiting committee, praised the "whole-hearted cooperation of the entire hospital personnel."

THE STAFF alumni, nursing school, Woman's Board and medical profession all worked their hardest to make the program a success, she said.

Mrs. Mary E. Bradley, secretary of the American Red Cross, said "special interest" was shown by the Canisteo Grange, Stern and Stern Textile, Inc., SKP Industries Inc., Hornell Brewery Company and North Jasper Mothers' Club.

Communities were represented by this number of persons: Hornell, 212; Canisteo, 32; Artport, 10; Cameron and Jasper, 5 each; Rathbone, 4; Stephens Mills, Canesara, Almond, Bath, Westfield, Pa., 3 each; Woodhull, Greenwood and Angelica, 2 each; and Andover, Alfred, Addison, Edinport, Rexville, Troupsville, Rochester and Whitesville, one each.

7 Affiliates Report To Rochester Deanery DCCW

Regular Board Meeting of the Rochester Deanery Diocesan Council of Catholic Women will be held on May 8. At this meeting will be reported work of various affiliates showing wide scope of activity in all branches of social and civic community life.

Aquinas Mothers' Club, founded for purpose of aiding Basilian Fathers, have worked closely with the school saving thousands of dollars by volunteering for clerical work, issuing the bulletin, and have raised money by campaigns which they turn over to the Principal at the close of the year for books, redecoration of the Chapel and fellowships for needy boys.

Ladies Auxiliary of the Knights of Columbus reported 85 cards sent to WHAM-TV requesting reinstatement of Bishop Sheen's program. Contributions were sent to the Rosary Society, Red Cross, Muscular Dystrophy. Proceeds from a card party, \$555, were donated for entertainment and gifts for hospitalized veterans at Bath and Canandaigua.

THREE GROUPS at St. Monica's Church were extremely active. The Rosary Society held a card party for the benefit of the School of the Holy Childhood. St. Monica's Group organized the Girl Scouts in Parish, have distributed a quantity of clothing and toys for underprivileged children, and are working toward obtaining a strictly children's program at the neighborhood theaters on Saturday afternoons.
