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Nazareth May Day Opens With Mass By Bishop Kearney

Crowning of the May Queen, a living rosary, outdoor Benediction, a maypole dance and outdoor pageant are among the activities scheduled for May Day on the Nazareth College campus Wednesday, May 6.

Planned to "give May back to Mary," the observance will begin with 9 o'clock Mass celebrated by His Excellency Bishop Kearney, who will be guest of the college for the day.

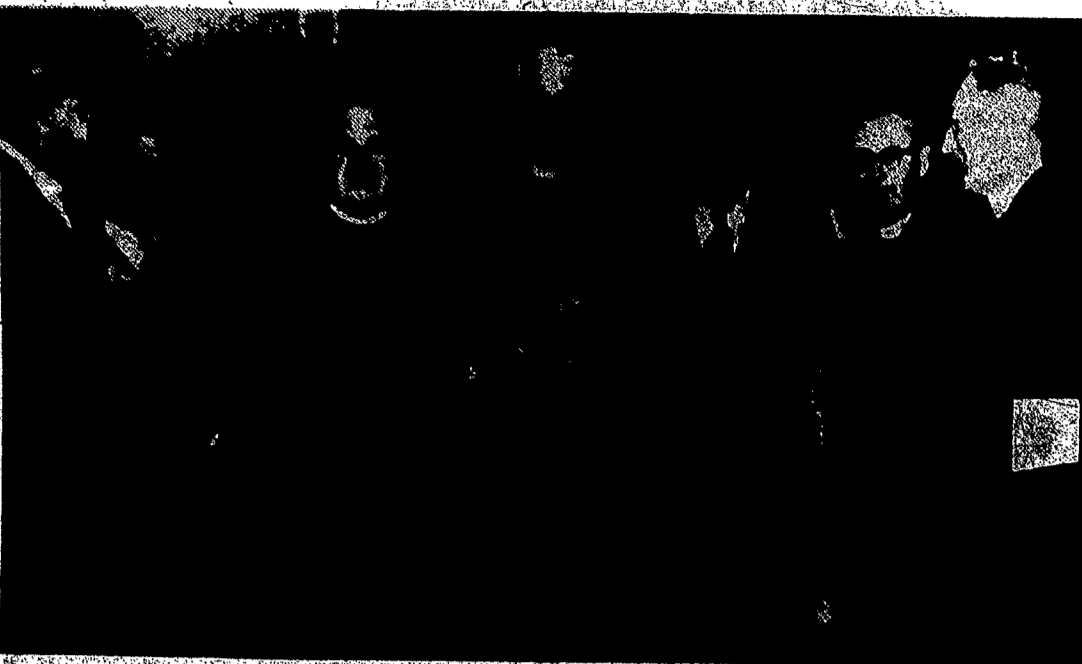
After breakfast following Mass, students will form a living rosary before a statue of Our Lady of Grace. Each class and the Sodality will lead one decade and provide the meditation. Students, Faculty and guests will then proceed to Calvary Garden, behind the Sisters of St. Joseph Motherhouse, for Benediction before the outdoor altar.

A MEMBER of the senior class will be crowned May Queen at about 2 p.m. by Kathryn Curran, president of the Undergraduate Association, student government body.

Although the queen-to-be was elected by the student body, her identity is kept secret until the afternoon of May Day. Wearing a bridal gown, she will march in solemn procession from the Administration Building to the outdoor scene of the coronation, attended by two members of each class in formal attire, pages and flower-bearers.

Bills Regulate Flag Display In Churches

Washington, D. C. — (RNS)—Legislation has been introduced in Congress to regulate display of the American flag in church services.

Two bills in the House would amend the flag code adopted by Congress on June 22, 1942, with respect to the use of flags in churches, and it is expected that a resolution will be offered in the Senate shortly.

A bill, offered by Rep. Gordon L. McDonough (R-Calif.), would provide that "when displayed from a staff in a church . . . if it is displayed in the chancel of a church, the flag should occupy the position of honor and be placed at the clergyman's or the speaker's right as he faces the congregation or audience."

THE MEASURE further provides that "any other flag so displayed in the chancel or on the platform or on the floor should be placed at the clergyman's or speaker's left as he faces the congregation or audience."

When the flag is carried into the sanctuary the order may be reversed, under Mr. McDonough's proposal, so that it would be in the position of honor at the right of the congregation, with any other flag at the left as the congregation faces the chancel or platform.

ANOTHER BILL sponsored by Rep. T. Millet Hand (R-N.J.) would make a specific exception for the Christian flag or church pennant. It states: "No other flag or pennant shall be flown or otherwise displayed in any public place unless it is flown or displayed with and below the flag of the United States of America, except during church services, when the church pennant may be flown with the flag."

College Art Exhibit To Feature Charlotte Mural

Nazareth College Senior Art Exhibit will be held in the administration building, 4245 East Ave., Friday, May 8, from 4 to 9:45 p.m.; Saturday and Sunday, May 9 and 10, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., according to Sister M. DeSole, head of the art department. It is open to the public, free of charge.

On display will be four years' work by five Nazareth College fine arts majors: Mary Ellen Creedon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond J. Creedon, 225 Flint St., Joan Battaglia, Buffalo; Virginia Strife, Old Forge; Nathalie Stuart, Albany; and Mary Lou Pike, Mendon.

A reception will be held along with the exhibit Friday; college art department alumnae will hold a reunion Saturday at 6:30. Guest of honor at the latter will be Prof. Walter K. Long, for 12 years a member of the art faculty, currently on leave of absence.

HIGH-LIGHT of the exhibit will be the first showing of a 30 by 15 foot mural in the tunnel connecting the administration building with the auditorium.

Depicting the old lighthouse and a scene at Charlotte harbor in 1822, the oil painting was done by the five seniors under the direction of Mrs. Sylvia Davis, instructor. Months of research on costuming of the period and historical detail preceded the actual painting.

Graduating art students customarily paint a mural portraying a scene of local historic interest as a parting gift to the college. Side by side the murals line the walls of the underground passage.

Johnsburg, Ill. — (NC)—One woman in this small Illinois town has filed suit against public school authorities in an attempt to remove six Catholic nuns as teachers in the Johnsburg school.

Mrs. Dorothy N. Larson, a Lutheran and mother of two, told reporters that "as long as the Sisters are there, it isn't a public school." Newsmen stated that other Johnsburg citizens, Catholic and non-Catholic had no objection to the Sisters teaching in the public school.

LeMoyné Scholarship Won By Leon Bolich

Syracuse—Leon Bolich, 73 East Bayard St., Seneca Falls, won third place in the LeMoyné College Competitive Examination here and was awarded a scholarship valued at \$400. He is a senior at Mynderse Academy in Seneca Falls.

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Bill On School Aids Passed In Minnesota

St. Paul, Minn. — (RNS)—Two bills which developed out of a public-parochial school controversy at Pier, Minn., have been passed by the Minnesota legislature and sent to Gov. C. Elmer Anderson for his signature.

The bills specify the cause of education can withhold state aids from a school district.

Pope Establishes African Hierarchy

Rome — (RNS)—Pope Pius XII has established a Catholic hierarchy in East Africa covering the territories of Kenya, Uganda and Tanganyika, it was announced here. Four new archbishops and 18 dioceses have been erected in the area.

This is the third hierarchy set up in Africa by Pope Pius in the past three years.

In May, 1950, the Pontiff established the hierarchy in West Africa. Eight months later he created the hierarchy of South Africa, replacing the missionary system of vicariates.

In his latest act, the Pope made Uganda, Kenya, Western Tanganyika and Eastern Tanganyika separate provinces with Butaga, Tabora, Nairobi and Dar-es-Salaam as their Metropolitan See.
