

Edward Kenzney, Bishop of Rochester, has need of capable assistance in providing more adequately for the welfare of religion in that diocese, We are not at all averse to granting him, with his consent, an Auxiliary Bishop. As We reflected upon the choice of one whom We might invest with this dignity, it seemed to Un that You, beloved Son, who are so conspicuous and so highly estoemed for your qualities of mind and character, are the one best fitted to be entrusted with this office, and dignity. Furthermore, since You have been for me time the Nector of the Rockester Cathedral, and have had considerable experience in the handling of matters pertaining to religion, You are with good reason regarded as wellsuited for the duties of a bishop. We are therefore pleased to elect and designate You as Auxiliary to Our above named Venerable Brother, and to grant to You all the rights, duties and privileges usually accompanying that office, in the hope that with the same devoted love for God and seat for Christ's monor which You have previously demonstrated in your office as Rector of the Cathedral, You will continue to fourish now that You are invested with this new honor. We also carnesily exhert You to show to Our Venerable Brother, James Edward, all the reverence that is due to one who already for many years has inbored in the Church of Christ, and always so exert Yourself in his boucht that your work may produce the most abundant fruit. It is not Our intention that You, whom We are now calling to this high effice, should Yourself be without the honors and dignity of a binhop. Since therefore it is customary for the Moly See to bestow upon Auxillaries the title of one of these Churches once respiondent with the glory of Christianity, and whose names should therefore be perpetuated through the ages. We are elevating You to the titlaher See of Cos, in the province of Greece or ancient Mchins, which Nee,

rank with You. For your own greater convenience, however. We are now granting You the permission to be consecrated as Bishop outside the City of Rome, by any Catholic Bishop of your choice, assisted by two other Catholic Bishops, all three of whom must be united in faith and charity with the-Roman Pontist; and to that same Venerable Brother, whom You shall choose, We hereby entrust the commission to consecrate You as Bishop. It is Our further wish that before You are consecrated You will make, in the presence of any ('atholic Bishop enjoying the favor of and communion with the See of Peter, the prescribed profession of Catholic faith, and take the sath of doyalty to the Holy See and the oath against Modernist errors, according to the usual formulae, copies of which are hereto attached. These You will return, signed and scaled by Yourself and the afgrementioned Bishop, as soon as possible to this Sacred Consistorial Congregation. And know that if You and the Bishop chosen as your consecrator fail to observe this command, then each of you will suffer the penalties by inw established. Before closing. We wish to inform

Before closing. We wish to inform You that You may retain the office which You have hilberto held as Rector of the Rochester Cathedral. And Amaly, We express Our wishes that your labors for Christ in this new Reid may be most fruitful, and be permeated with the abundance of God's grace. Dated at St. Feter's in Romo, on the
