

Camps Covering Two Weeks Stated By CYA

Catholic Youth Association Day Camp will be operated in two periods this year, the first a six-week encampment beginning on June 23 and ending Aug. 7, the second starting Aug. 13 and ending Aug. 21 for a two-week period.

In addition to the regular Day Camp operated out of Columbus Youth Association, 50 Chestnut St., the CYA will also staff and program Camp Ave Maria at Holy Redeemer Parish, Hudson Ave. Additional registrations at both of these Day Camps especially for girls are now being made.

THE CAMPS are conducted for children between the ages of 6 and 13 years. The CYA camp is set up to parallel experiences in regular camps, except in this case, the child spends each night at home and reports the camp each week day morning.

Outdoor activities, especially swimming and diving include instruction. An extensive amount of this is done at various city pools, supervised beaches and CYA pool. Swimming certificates are issued children who progress sufficiently to warrant them.

On the program popular with the youngsters are arts and crafts. Leather work, paper mache, clay modeling, drawing, and painting are a few of crafts undertaken. The children take some of the finished items home as souvenirs.

During summer sessions, "Overnight Hiking" has been strictly reserved for the boys. This year, the girls are anticipating their own period of "real camping."

Evening BIBLE PAGE was chosen as the program to be shared with the boys of July 7, to 11. The program will include such activities as hiking, fishing, picnicking, campfires, nature work, handcrafts and play ball.

The Day Camp program also includes guided tours to important historical landmarks, trips to museums, art galleries, tours through radio studios and an opportunity to explore city and county parks.

On July days the children are entertained with movies, indoor swimming, game parties, folk dancing, playacting on a "real stage" and additional craft work. During the "week home" following each camp day, the children will try to find an opportunity to help the group.
