THE BREAKFAST followed at the Seneca Hotel where city and civic leaders were guests of honor. Flor for 13 years on the police force is a member of the Accident Prevention Bureau and lives at 45 St. Cassin St. He succeeds former Patrolman James D. Doyle of the School Safety Division.

Father Flynn in his address urged some kind of educational program to increase the public's appreciation and respect for our law enforcement agencies.

"In Communist states," Father Flynn said, "the policeman has become a symbol of terror and oppression. But in our American democracy the policeman is a symbol of protection and freedom. The policeman on the corner spells protection of our rights and liberties as citizens."

A member of the Oblates of Mary Immaculate religious community, Father Bowers is known on both sides of the border as distinguished and learned in social work.

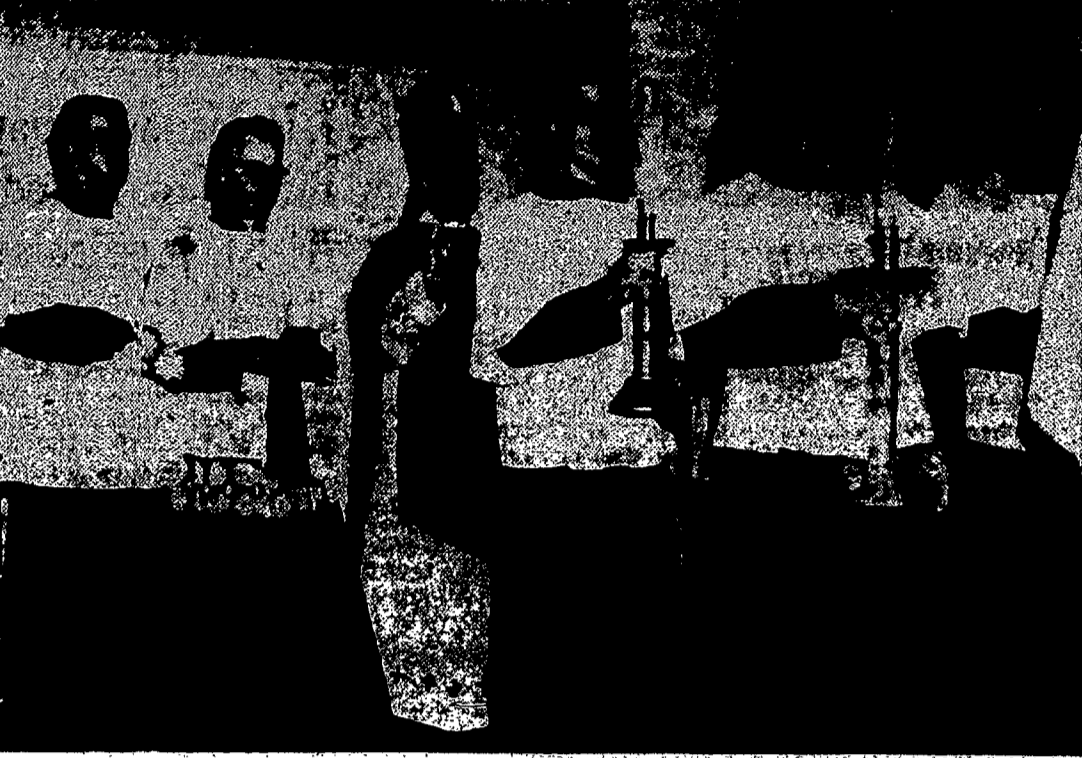
