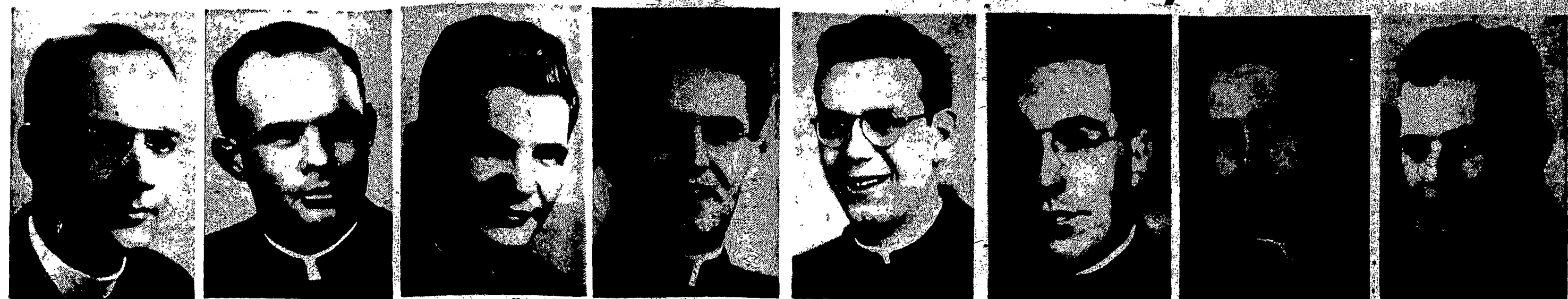

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10 St. Bernard's Graduates To Be Ordained For Diocese

Ten of the 14 members of St. Bernard's Seminary 1953 graduating class and one Franciscan Father of the Third Order Regular will be ordained to the Holy Priesthood by His Excellency Bishop Kearney in Sacred Heart Cathedral on Saturday, June 6 at 9 a.m.

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Wilfred T. Crough, rector of St. Bernard's Seminary has announced that there are eight young priests for the Diocese of Hartford in the class, two for Syracuse, two for Buffalo and one each for the Dioceses of Savannah-Atlanta and Albany.

The Rev. Ignatius Butler, F.O.B., the former William F. Butler III, of the Franciscan community at Loretto, Pennsylvania, will be ordained with the Rochester ordinand. Father Butler is from Our Lady of Good Council parish.

Following their ordination by Bishop Kearney, these young priests will celebrate their First Solemn Masses in their respective parish churches on Sunday, June 7.

Bishop Casey Appointed Second Vicar General

His Excellency Auxiliary Bishop Lawrence E. Casey was appointed a second Vicar General of the Diocese of Rochester P.A., V.G. by His Excellency Bishop Kearney, the Chancery announced today.

The Vicar General is an official of the diocese appointed by the bishop and holding ordinary jurisdiction with the bishop.

In that office, Monsignor Hart who is also pastor of Corpus Christi Church, Rochester is serving under the third Bishop who appointed him as Vicar General and he also served a period as Vicar Capitular or administrator of the diocese in the absence of a Bishop.

MONSIGNOR HART has been associated with the Chancery since Jan. 23, 1951 when appointed by Bishop Thomas F. Hickey as vice chancellor. When Bishop John Francis O'Hern became Third Bishop of Rochester on March 19, 1952, Monsignor Hart was first appointed Vicar General.

He served in that capacity under Archbishop-Bishop Edward Mooney, now Cardinal Archbishop of Detroit from Oct. 14, 1933 until Nov. 11, 1937 when His Excellency Bishop Kearney, Fifth Bishop of Rochester became Ordinary of the Rochester diocese.

It was during the interim between Archbishop Mooney's leaving Rochester on August 1, 1937 and Bishop Kearney's coming on Nov. 11, 1937 that Monsignor Hart ably administered the affairs of this diocese.

NAMED A Domestic Prelate of the Papal Household by Pope Pius XI on August 23, 1929 he was elevated to the dignity of Prototitular Apostolic by Pope Pius XII in October of 1947.

Long interested in the Catholic press, Monsignor Hart not only serves as Editor-in-Chief of the Catholic Courier Journal, diocesan newspaper but pens the editorials which appear each week on the editorial page.

Auxiliary Bishop Casey, too, had long association with the Chancery. In 1932 he was appointed Secretary to Bishop John Francis O'Hern and continued to serve in that office under Archbishop Mooney and Bishop Kearney until 1946 when he was appointed pastor of Holy Cross Church.

Bishop Casey is rector of Sacred Heart Cathedral to which post he was appointed in February 1952. His consecration as Titular Bishop of Oria and Auxiliary to Bishop Kearney took place amid ecclesiastical splendor on May 5 in Sacred Heart Cathedral.

He has the honor of being the first Bishop of the Rochester diocese to be appointed a second Vicar General.

Bishop To Confer Degrees On 80 At Women's College

Eighty young women will receive degrees at the 26th annual Commencement of Nazareth College Wednesday afternoon, June 3, at 4 o'clock. His Excellency Bishop Kearney will confer the degrees assisted by Sister Rose Angela, dean. Weather permitting, the ceremony will be held outdoors on the East Ave. campus.

Pre-Commencement religious observance for 80 Nazareth College seniors who will receive degrees June 3 includes a Day of Recollection May 30. Baccalaureate service May 31 and an anniversary Mass June 2 for Sisters of the Holy Family.

The Day of Recollection will begin with 9 o'clock Mass in the college auditorium and will end with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament at 3 p.m. The Rev. Eugene H. McFarland, assistant pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help church, will conduct a series of conferences to help the students withdraw for a while from worldly concerns and recollect the spiritual values acquired during their stay in college.

THAT EVENING seniors will join His Excellency Bishop Kearney in recitation of the Rosary over Station W5AY at 7 o'clock.

The Bishop will preside at High Mass Baccalaureate Sunday at 11 in the Sisters of St. Joseph Motherhouse Chapel. The Rev. Edward A. Molloy, C.S.S.R., retreat master of the Notre Dame Retreat House, 246 Alexander St., will preach the Baccalaureate sermon. His topic will be "The Mission of Catholic Education."

A native Bostonian, Father Molloy served as army chaplain from 1942 to 1946. He spent three of these years in the Pacific area and left the service with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.

HE WAS ordained in 1932 after studying at St. Mary's College in Pennsylvania and Mount St. Alphonsus, Esopus, N. Y. Before the war he covered the eastern

part of the United States. He has the bachelor of arts degree from Assumption College; master of arts degrees from the Universities of Toronto and Ottawa; and the doctor of philosophy degree in English from the University of Ottawa.

BISHOP KEARNEY will give an address and his episcopal blessing. Names of students elected to Kappa Gamma Phi national honorary society of Catholic women's colleges, and those receiving academic honors will be announced. No honorary degree is to be awarded this year.

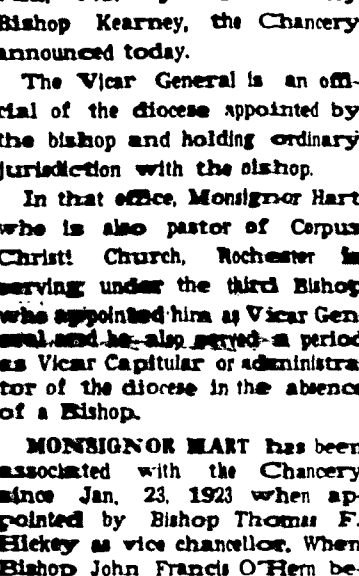
Of the graduates 29 will receive the bachelor of arts degree, 12 with majors in sociology, seven in English, four in social studies, three in mathematics, two in history and one in Italian.

Twenty will receive the degree bachelor of science in secretarial science and economics, and 12 the bachelor of science in nursing.

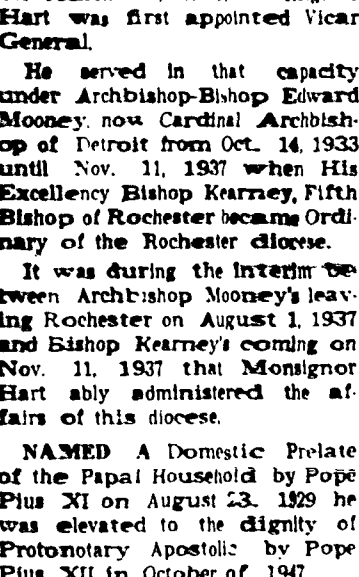
OTHER DEGREES are distributed as follows: bachelor of arts in fine arts, five; bachelor of science, seven; bachelor of science in music education, six; bachelor of science in education, one.

Five of the candidates are members of religious orders. More than 30 are from outside Rochester, one each from Puerto Rico and Los Angeles, the others from communities in all parts of New York State.

'No Room For God' Says Red Paper

Berlin — (RNS) — There is "no longer any room in this world for a God and His heaven," the East German Communist youth organization's official paper, Junge Welt, said editorially in its current issue.

The comment was made in connection with the Communist exhibition on "The Development of the World and Its Inhabitants" which opened in East Berlin.

"It is folly," the paper said, "to have the execution of justice to a so-called Master of the World and thus have the exploiters of man free to do what they want."

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Church Reports Million Membership Gain In 1952

New York — (RNS) — Catholics in the United States, including Alaska and Hawaii, now number 30,425,015, or 1,017,498 more than the total of 29,407,520 reported in 1952, according to the newly-published official Catholic Directory.

For the seventh consecutive year, the Directory said, the number of converts to Catholicism passed the 100,000 mark. Adult baptisms numbered 117,803, bringing the total number of converts in the past decade to 1,072,498.

There were 1,077,184 infant baptisms in 1952, an increase of 58,881 over the previous year.

THE DIRECTORY lists the largest number of members of the hierarchy in the history of the Catholic Church in this country. There are four cardinals, 28 archbishops and 163 bishops. Archdioceses number 25, while there are 104 dioceses and the Vicariate Apostolic of Alaska.

Archdioceses with populations of over a million are Chicago (1,778,324), Boston (1,406,136), New York (1,319,156), Philadelphia (1,193,869), and Newark (1,094,364). Brooklyn, N. Y., with 1,319,714 Catholics, is the largest diocese, and Hartford, Conn., with 748,241, is the second largest. Pittsburgh is the third largest with 704,268.

AN INCREASE of 763 in the number of the clergy brought the total of ordained priests to 45,222, the largest ever recorded. Professed religious include 7,823 brothers and 158,916 sisters, an increase of 2,098. Engaged as full-time teachers in Catholic institutions are 8,153 priests, 3,637 brothers, 399 scholastics, 87,288 nuns and 18,627 lay teachers — a grand total of 118,104.

According to the Directory, there are 12,124 separate Catholic educational institutions, or 137 more than last year.

They include 439 diocesan and religious order seminaries or novitiates; 240 colleges and universities; 1,577 diocesan and parish high schools; 839 private high schools; 8,488 parish elementary schools and 541 private elementary schools. There are also 156 protective institutions with 15,098 children under instruction.

TOTAL young people now under Catholic instruction was given as 4,436,120 — or 265,768 more than in 1952. Of this number 1,677,498 are public school children attending special religious classes under the released-time system.

Ten new institutions brought the total number of Catholic general hospitals to 782, with a bed capacity of 119,027, and the number of hospitals to 119, with accommodation for 9,612 patients. During 1952 a total of 5,694,247 patients were treated in Catholic hospitals.

Dispensation

The Most Reverend Bishop in virtue of faculties granted by the Holy See, dispenses the faithful of the Diocese from the obligation of fast and abstinence on Ember Wednesdays, May 20, which is also Memorial Day. The faithful are hereby dispensed from the obligation of fasting on these days.

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
