#### On The Holy Ghost

The name of the Third Person of the Blessed Trinity has cast a deep awe upon us from our youth. "Holy Ghost," "Holy Spirit"—to this Spirit we sing reverentially and veneration, and with all the beauty and delicacy we can impart to our hymns and our prayers, as if we were spirit ourselves; not at all as we sing "Holy God we Praise Thy Name" bellowing hoarsely, nor with that gust of ardent affection that sweeps us through "To Jesus Heart All Burning."

**THE NAME OF GOD** brings with it a childlike opening of the heart; the name of Jesus flows our head and makes us tender; the name "Holy Ghost" is truly the finger of God touching us to wondering stillness. Surely this is an ordained, a right difference.

Yet we long to draw near, not to be lacking in love. There is a little sense of guilt somewhere that we have not a clearer, more understanding devotion to Love itself, that we are not quite sure we are giving even an inadequate service.

**WE WANT** to act under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit too; and at the same time we want to keep a million miles away from the un-Catholic presumption of thinking that this one that word or act of ours is His direct inspiration.

Rather, we cling to the humble view that our prayer for guidance, and our dependence and our quick deference to authority whether priestly or ordinary, will insure the Holy Spirit's making the best of a bad job, if I may so speak, bringing about His Will through and despite our poor mediocre word, our poor feeble act.

**PERHAPS** we habitually do well as to reverence; we would do better as to love. If so, may the Holy Spirit move us to read about Him in Leonce de Grandmison's *We and the Holy Spirit*.

**THAT THE HOLY GHOST** is the Spirit of Jesus, sent by Jesus, forming Christ in us, interpreting Christ to us; that we have the Holy Ghost within us as Giver and First Gift of Jesus, and that we have all the gifts of Jesus applied to us through the Holy Ghost; that He is the supreme principle of union with God; that Mary's life is Jesus' masterpiece, the "canon," the model, containing Wisdom itself—do these great nuggets, megal diamonds, here, unburning, rose hued in any way, to see them clearly, their facets polished, their wonders at least faintly discernible?

**THE BOOK** follows through with the effect of devotion to the Holy Spirit on the willing; in other words, by "a certain interior deference, a respect that serves charity, good breeding, and fraternal union."

He learns the difference between the love of trust and of sacrifice, and the need of both; the meaning of "taking on the sentiments of Christ"; the apostolic passions and the puerile passions, and their control; good humor, serenity, objectiveness; the "severe joys of the apostle," and much more.

**THE CONTENTS** pages are printed in the ugliest type I ever saw, regularly affected by Fides Press; the rest of the book is as usual in a pleasant font.

Two other works of special beauty and unction and transparent holiness, breathing love of the Holy Ghost and by happy chance known to this amateur, are those of the *Interior Life* by the Archbishop of Mexico City, Luis Martinez, and that romance of Divinity called *The Burning Bush: a Treatise on the ecstatic contemplation of the Blessed Trinity*, by the Benedictine Dom Louismet. Nobody need apologize for recalling Father Leon's most excellent volume, *The Holy Ghost and His Work in Souls*.

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### Annual Law Collection

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### Statue Of Madonna Erected In London

London.—(RNS)—A Catholic monument dedicated to the Blessed Virgin and the Holy Child has been erected in a public place here for the first time since the Reformation.

The monument, "Mirrored and Child," conceived by sculptor Jacob Epstein, was unveiled before a large crowd outside the Convict of the Holy Child in Cavendish Square by E. A. Butler, Bishop of London and Archbishop of Canterbury.

The two Georgian buildings of the square, the statue is set in between. The material originally came from the roof of the convent and was used when the building was destroyed.

The monument is made of bronze and is 10 feet high. It is set on a base of white marble. The statue is of the Virgin Mary, seated and holding the Christ Child on her lap. The Child is holding a book. The Virgin is wearing a blue mantle over a red gown. The Child is wearing a red tunic and a blue mantle.

The monument is set in a public place in Cavendish Square, London. It is the first Catholic monument erected in a public place in London since the Reformation.
