

### Italian-Red Fight Grows On Peace Plan

A new round in the dispute between the Vatican and the Italian Communist Party was set off by a peace plan proposed by the latter in 1951.

Giuseppe Togliatti, leader of the Italian Communist Party, and Giorgio La Pira, former Christian Democratic deputy in parliament and now mayor of Florence, are the main protagonists in the "peace" fight.

The agreement between the two men, who threw the peace plan into the "peace" fight, was brought up by Togliatti in an election speech at Padua. He stated that the Kremlin had viewed "favorably" La Pira's "peace feelers," but that the Vatican had drawn back.

IN THE LONG article in Osservatore Romano, Vatican City daily, La Pira said that he had initiated the "peace feelers" but declared that the Kremlin came back with insulting language about being glad to have the Holy See join "the movement of the partisans of peace."

Now, Togliatti has written in L'Unita, Rome Communist daily, that nothing was ever said about the "peace partisans' movement."

"I declare formally," he wrote, "that... there was never a word by any of those concerned with this matter about the 'peace partisans' movement."

La Pira challenged this denial in a second article in Osservatore Romano.

"FOR MY PART," he wrote, "I confirm the absolute truth of what I have written. The Honorable (Luigi) Longo (number 2 Italian Communist) who Friday, Feb. 2, 1951, at Montecitorio (the chamber of deputies) referred to me Moscow's answer, spoke to me exclusively of the movement of the partisans of peace."

There was no mention of the two elements that had constituted the substance of the proposal—possible "conciliatory moves" on the religious level and the initiation of some diplomatic conversations by responsible groups.

According to reports from Florence, La Pira has organized an International Christian Congress for Peace which will take place in Florence from June 21 to 27.

### Better Treatment Seen In Pakistan

Karachi, Pakistan — (NC) — Catholics of Pakistan have hailed the country's new government headed by Mohammed Ali. The new Prime Minister is a Hindu, but has pledged that his government will "treat the minorities not only justly, but generously."

A career diplomat, Mohammed Ali previously served as Pakistan's Ambassador to the United States and as High Commissioner in Canada.

Catholics here, in welcoming the new Prime Minister, were encouraged not only by his pledge of generous treatment for minorities, but by the fact that he followed it up with action.

In appointing Allahbux Brohi as the Minister for Minorities, Mohammed Ali gave particular satisfaction here. Tending its loyal support to the new Prime Minister, the Catholic Association of Sindh and Baluchistan noted the appointment with "great satisfaction."

It was reported that the keynote of the new Premier's domestic policy would be to discount extremist views of religious affairs getting the upper hand in matters affecting all citizens, including the minorities. Mullahism which has so far spelled misfortune to the Christians of this country, would be strictly discouraged by the young, energetic and highly educated Prime Minister. Pakistan's Mullahs (religious teachers) represent a section of Moslem public opinion in this country which has put forward extremist demands on the government.

### Congressman Push Deist Motto Plan

Washington, D. C. — (RNS) — A proposal that the motto "In God We Trust" be used on postal cancellations has received further support by the introduction of a bill in Congress authorizing the Postmaster General to issue stamps bearing this slogan at all first and second class post offices.

The measure is sponsored by Rep. Edna F. Kelly (D-N.Y.) and is similar to one introduced earlier this session by Rep. Louis C. Rabaut (R-Mich.). It has been referred to the House Post Office and Civil Service Committee.

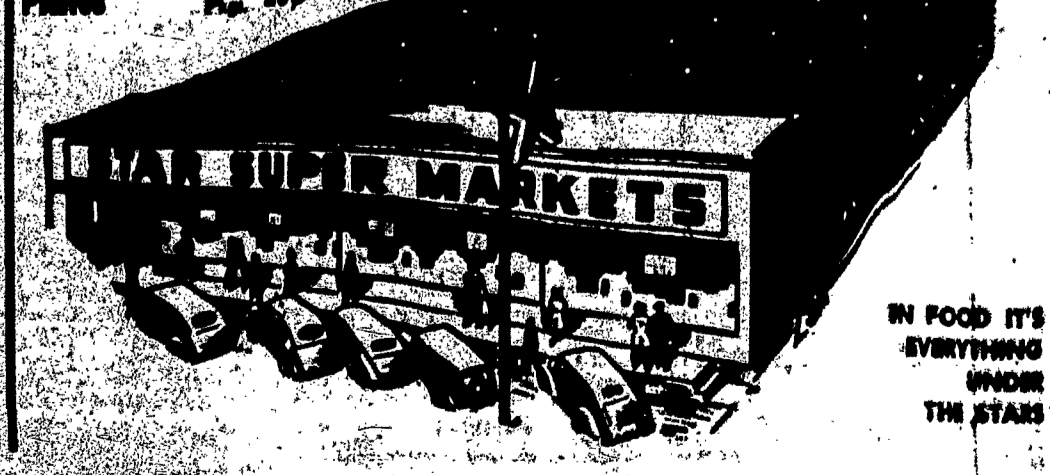
