

## Bishop Blesses Monastery Of Trappists At Piffard

The Cistercian Order of Strict Observance or Trappists were formally established in the Diocese of Rochester on their farm near Piffard with impressive ceremonies on Memorial Day which attracted through despite inclement weather.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney blessed the Monastery Chapel in the morning and the entire foundation in the afternoon.

As Bishop of the Diocese of Rochester in blessing the Monastery of the silent contemplative monks, he was setting into motion a new dynamo of spiritual power, the influence of which will be felt in every parish, every home, every school and every classroom, Bishop Kearney said.

THE PRAYERS and sacrifices of these devoted monks will spread its influence throughout the entire diocese.

God had originally blessed the Genesee Valley with all its beauty, the Bishop said and is again to bless it with the erection of a new tabernacle to dot another hill with another home for Our Saviour.

Solemn Pontifical Mass followed blessing of the chapel in the morning. The new chapel was filled to overflowing despite the heavy rain.

Bishop Kearney was assisted in the Mass by the Very Rev. M. Gerard McGintley, O.C.S.O., prior of the Monastery, an Assisting Priest; the Rt. Rev. Msgr. F. William Stauder and the Rt. Rev. Michael J. Krieg, as deacons of honor; the Rev. Charles E. Mucke, deacon; the Rev. Joseph A.

Cirincione, subdeacon; the Very Rev. Magr. John E. Janey and the Rev. Charles R. Reynolds, masters of ceremonies.

Also in the sanctuary were Bishop Thomas K. Pohacamory of Bangalore, India, and the Rt. Rev. Magr. Louis Delema.

THE CHAPEL'S new altar was consecrated prior to the Pontifical Mass by the Rt. Rev. M. James Fox, O.C.S.O., rector of Our Lady of Getsemani Seminary and Scholastic in the Archdiocese of Louisville, Ky.

In the afternoon as the rain set up the crowd increased. After blessing the entire monastery Bishop Kearney was celebrant of Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament on the Monastery grounds.

The Bishop was assisted by Dom Gregory, O.S.B., of Mt. Seavoy Monastery, Elmira, as deacon and the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, subdeacon.

Open house during which men and women were permitted to inspect the refectory, chapel, chapter room and bakery was held from 4 to 5 p.m. So great was the number of visitors that a 5 p.m. long line was still waiting to enter the Monastery.

In addition to their rigorous life of silent devotion and labor on the farms, the Trappists have an especial devotion to the Blessed Mother.

About 50 monks, priests and lay brothers, are now set up on their farm near Piffard to carry on their program with a permanent monastery planned in the future. Their reception, on Memorial Day evoked great appreciation of their coming, those who attended declared.
