GOD LOVE YOU!

PROSEPERITY separates; suffering unites. Back to Jewish history Abraham and Lot had to separate and go in opposite directions because "they had great possessions." On the other hand, in the parable of the Ten Lepers, nine were Jews and one was Samaritan. The Jews and the Samaritan in health did not speak, but in suffering they acted as a unit and asked Our Lord to heal them.

We live in a world in which Christ has been crucified. All people are divided into two classes: the crucifiers and the crucified; they are either on the cross or they are beneath it. Our frustrated writers, our truthless intelligentsia, our neurotic dramatists try to solve this problem of world suffering by Freud instead of by Calvary. The result is despair, not hope.

Our Blessed Faith never sees suffering alone: it has two relations: one horizontal, with every other human in the world who hungers and thirsts, who seeks and who aches; the other, vertical, with the Cross. On that Cross we set the worst thing evil can do, namely kill Divine Goodness, but we also see how Divine Love overcomes it by rising and sending into our hearts the Spirit of Love.

Suffering then is communion: communion with fellowman, communion with Christ crucified.

As we refuse to deny ourselves to be one with our persecuted and starving brethren in the world, we by that fact freely decide against taking our Cross and following Him. As a result, we have another Cross thrust upon by the forces of anti-Christ, namely violence and persecution. When a man will not obey freely the law of health and eat, doctors resort to forcible feeding. When we voluntarily refuse the Cross, the Cross is violently thrust on our shoulders. The world's persecution is an Ersatz, a substitute for our want of being truly Christian.

Out of love of that same Jesus pinned to a tree and Our Lady pierced with a sword, make a sacrifice, deny yourself a luxury, and send it to us that we may send it to the Holy Father's Missions to save souls! Thus alone can we diminish the evil in the world.
