Two celebrations will mark the golden wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Benedict Ehmman, 100 Howard St., Rochester. The first will be on Wednesday, June 10, the date

of the anniversary. Mass will be offered at 9 o'clock in St. Boniface Church by Rev. Benedict Ehmman, who is the oldest of the couple's children. In the evening from 7 to 11, there will be a reception in St. Boniface Hall.

The second celebration will be on the following Sunday, June 14, in St. Mary's of the Lake Church, Watkins Glen, of which Father Ehmman is the pastor.

AT A SOLEMN MASS to be held at 9:45 a.m. the golden jubiliarians will be joined by three couples of St. Mary's of the Lake parish who are observing their silver jubilee of marriage this year. They are Mr. and Mrs. Thomas O'Rourke, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Martin, and Mr. and Mrs. Eugene DeDonnicis. A public reception will be held at 8:30 in the evening in the Municipal Building.

Mr. and Mrs. Ehmman were married June 10, 1903, in Holy Ghost Church, Coldwater, N. Y. Their parents were immigrants from Germany who settled in the rich farm country outside of Rochester, along the Buffalo Road.

THE COUPLE began their married life in St. Boniface parish, Rochester, where, within five years, Father Boppel was appointed to be pastor. One of their best memories is a long and fruitful friendship with this venerable pastor, Father Boppel

who died in 1947 and was succeeded by Father Walter Kohl, whose post in the Watkins Glen parish was taken by Father Ehmman.

Besides Father Ehmman, the golden jubiliarians have two other sons, Bertrand and James, both married, and a daughter, Ruth. Two other sons, Robert and Roger, died in infancy. Mr. Ehmman had ten brothers and sisters, of whom two are living; of the eight brothers and sisters of Mrs. Ehmman, only one sister survives.
