

Two Nuns, Priest Killed By Tornado In New England

Worcester, Mass. — (RNS) — Two Catholic nuns and a priest were among the eighty known dead here in the worst tornado to hit New England in 70 years.

They were Sisters St. John of the Cross, A.A., and St. Helen, A.A., and the Rev. Englebert Devine, A.A., all of Assumption College, which was severely damaged by the blast. More than 100 priest retreatants were in residence at the time.

Nine other priests and ten nuns were seriously injured at the college, including the Rev. John O. Arthur Brassard, A.A., who recently returned from Moscow where he ministered to members of the American diplomatic colony.

Among the seriously injured was Mother Superior Sister Chantelle, A.A. of the Assumption College convent. The convent was all but destroyed.

The Episcopal Church of St. Michael-on-the-Heights was demolished by the blast, which affected the whole of Worcester County. Extensive damage was done at Petersham, Athol, Barre, Holden, Shrewsbury, Southboro and Framingham.

AS SOON AS the tornado had passed aid was speeded to the disaster areas. Clergymen of all faiths comforted the stricken, and at the Worcester City Hospital Roman Catholic priests administered the Last Rites to the dying as they were brought in.

Bishop John J. Wright of Worcester, who was administering Confirmation at St. John's church here, left immediately after the blast for the damaged suburbs of Worcester. Until the early hours of the morning he visited hospitals and the city morgue where he gave absolution to the dead.

The Bishop who was due to receive an honorary degree and give the commencement address at Fordham University, canceled his appearance, stating:

"In the midst of their suffering I can not leave my people."

Private Schools Build Faster Than Public

Washington — (NC) — Non-public school building in America is increasing at a far faster rate than public school construction, according to figures released by the Department of Commerce here.

By the end of May the nation had spent \$136,000,000 on new parochial and other private schools and colleges. This was an increase of 17.3 per cent over the amount spent in the first five months of 1952. In May alone the estimated expenditure was \$22,000,000, 23 per cent higher than the total for May, 1952.

PUBLIC SCHOOL construction between the same five-month period rose only 3.5 per cent. The total amounts spent, however, were much greater: \$683,000,000 through May, 1953, compared to \$650,000,000 for the same period last year.

Church building by all denominations has also risen sharply from last year, increasing by 14.9 per cent.

Total new construction throughout the country rose less than six per cent over last year in the January-May period.

A part of the increase in these categories over last year can be explained by the removal of controls from building materials in the summer of 1952. Since that time it has been possible to buy building materials for school and church construction on the open market without priorities. There are also a number of other reasons for this year's increase, such as different weather conditions, Department of Commerce officials have pointed out.

CONSTRUCTION OF new hospitals and other institutions, many of which had a high priority for materials under controls, showed a decline from last year. Private hospital building in the first five months of 1953 dropped to \$129,000,000 from \$164,000,000 a year earlier, a decline of 21.3 per cent.

Public hospital construction between the same periods declined from \$158,000,000 to \$165,000,000, a drop of 10.6 per cent. Part of the decline in public hospital building was explained here by the decrease in construction of new hospitals for veterans.

Princess Margaret Linked To Catholic Nobleman

London — (NC) — Leftist newspaper gossip concerning the sister of Queen Elizabeth serves to recall that no power on earth—except the royal family itself—can divulge details of the royal family's private life.

The gossip, printed in the London Daily Mirror, spoke of a "very deep friendship" that Princess Margaret had formed with a 26-year-old Roman Catholic, an attorney identified as "a devout Roman Catholic." The gossip item added: "There is no doubt that some of the Princess's recent absorption in religious matters springs large discussions on the subject with Robin."

The newspaper concerned is the most radical socialist organ in Britain this side of the Communist London Daily Worker.

THE BRITISH PRESS in general respects the privacy of the royal family, and anything printed in some papers is either guesswork or gossip. An instance of the rigidity with which this privacy is observed is furnished by the still unconfirmed rumors concerning death bed conversions of King Edward VII who died in 1910, and also of Queen Mary who died earlier this year.

Whatever element of truth such rumors might contain, it is utterly unlikely that any suggestions regarding Catholic connections of members of the royal family would be issued officially. In view of weighty constitutional reasons and of the readiness of extremists to beat up hornets, any Catholic priest involved, would observe the confidence most strictly.

As for the item printed in the Daily Mirror, journalistic circles here do not regard it as a sensational "scoop." It is known generally in Britain that Robin McEwen's sister, Christian Mary, now Baroness Hesketh, has been Princess Margaret's closest friend since her childhood days. Her brothers, including Robin, have been escorts of the Princess for a long time. Robin is one of several children of Capt. John Hellas Finnie McEwen, a Scottish Catholic landowner, former politician and author. Robin McEwen was among several hundred Catholics who attended the coronation ceremonies in Westminster Abbey.

As for Princess Margaret, she is the most eligible spinster in the British Commonwealth and the press has grown weary of "marrying" her to anybody seen in her vicinity. She is a sincere and devout churchgoer and belongs to Anglican (Church of England) lay groups. This latter fact has given rise to the gossip that she may embrace the religious life.

However, Princess Margaret's main function is that of easing her queen-sister's public burden

Catholics In Seoul Kneel In Prayer As Korea Faces Armistice Crisis

Seoul, — (Radio, NC) — The largest crowd of Catholics since the Korean war began knelt in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament exposed in the cathedral here as the Korean Republic faced one of its biggest crises in history.

The faithful were kneeling in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception as a four-starred jeep rumbled through the South Korean capital carrying Gen. Mark Clark to the presidential palace. He was enroute to deliver President Eisenhower's letter appealing to South Korean President Syngman Rhee to accept the armistice terms then being worked out at Panmunjom.

KOREA'S CATHOLICS were observing Corpus Christi Sunday but they were also praying for divine aid and guidance during the critical period of their history. The South Korean government had announced that it found the armistice terms unacceptable and was determined to go it alone.

Top South Korean spokesmen, from President Rhee on down, have stated emphatically that they cannot accept any armistice which leaves Korea divided and permits Chinese troops to remain on Korean soil.

Only four of the five UN Command delegates were present at the conference table when the agreement was signed on the exchange of prisoners. Omniously absent was General Choi of the Republic of Korea. However, a Korean officer was present as a staff assistant.



PREMIER DE GASPERI Wins Over Reds

Rome — (NC) — Premier Alcide de Gasperi's center coalition won a narrow majority of seats in both the senate and the Chamber of Deputies in the Italian elections.

De Gasperi's own Christian Democrats captured 116 Senate seats, and their allies in three other parties won nine. In the last Senate the government coalition had 136 seats, but the upper house of Parliament then comprised 344 members. Many positive seats have been abolished.

The far left captured 37 seats. The Communists took 54 and pro-Red Socialists 23. A socialist-Communist alliance won four seats, and there is one independent leftist. In the last Senate the leftists totaled 109.

Resurgent far-rightists made the most spectacular gains. Monarchists won 16 seats and the neo-Fascist Italian Social Movement 9, for a total of 25. These two parties combined had only three in the old senate.

Six lifetime senators make up the total of 243.

De Gasperi's pro-Western government also won more than 50 per cent of the Chamber of Deputies vote. Under a new law, any party or bloc which wins 50.01 per cent or more gets bonus seats, raising its strength to 64.5 per cent of the Chamber seats.

UNOFFICIAL FIGURES from 60 of the 91 provinces indicated the government coalition was receiving almost exactly 50 per cent. Final tabulations determined De Gasperi's forces were slightly over 50 per cent.

Of 19,695,733 votes unofficially tabulated out of about 23 million in the Chamber election, the center coalition had 9,921,183. The far left had 7,402,190, and the far right 2,472,420.

Unless the center had achieved a majority, the far right and far left could have opportunistic alliances despite ideological differences and thus block such key government programs as ratification of the European defense treaty. Both right and left oppose this pact.

A SMALL local news agency, Agenzia Romana Informazioni, said the government bloc had a majority of 51.75 per cent. The agency declined to disclose the source of this figure but said it was based on the 20 million votes counted.

Interior Minister Mario Scelba announced that, in the Senate race, the government coalition of Christian Democrats, Moderate Socialists, Liberals and Republicans won 12,196,158 votes, to 12,103,388 for the combined opposition. This gave the center 50.2 per cent of the total. The margin of victory for the government in the Senate was three splinter parties—the South Tyrol People's Party, the Sardinian Action Party, and the mixed group of the center, whose votes were included in the coalition.
