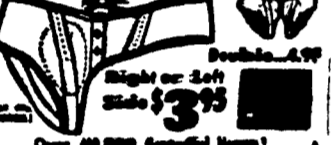

North East Nocturnal Center Opens With 600

Six hundred new members of the Nocturnal Adoration Society were greeted by His Excellency Bishop Kearney as he inaugurated the first of the three new Centers of the Society at St. Andrew's Church, Portland Ave. Saturday night, June 6.
Noting in this one quarter of the city alone such an unprecedented response to the invitation to membership having been extended to all Catholic men during the past few weeks, Bishop Kearney saw in it ample justification for his decision "to make this peculiar devotion to Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament more accessible to men in all sections of the city."

BISHOP KEARNEY observed that since the nature of the Society, requiring as it does a pledge of one hour's adoration before Our Lord in the Eucharist each month at the various hours throughout the night, the opening of the three new centers did not have as its primary purpose the lessening of this sacrifice; however, from the standpoint of common sense it seemed desirable that extending the devotion to four churches located in the four natural divisions of the city would attract more men.

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. George W. Eckl, pastor of St. Andrew's and now Spiritual Director of this new Center, welcomed the new members as well as approximately 200 members residing in the 22 parishes in this northeast section, transferred from the old St. Patrick's Center.

Monsignor Eckl expressed his appreciation of the selection of St. Andrew's Church as the Center for this Society in that section of Rochester and extended commendation and high praise for the efficient, orderly yet quiet manner in which the officers and their parish committees had accomplished this remarkable enlistment of new members.

Following exposition of the Blessed Sacrament the men joined in the recitation of the First Nocturn of the Office of the Society and the devout and impressive Act of Reparation. The Act of Consecration by the new members was received by the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, pastor of St. Patrick's Church and long the Spiritual Director of the original Branch of the Society in Rochester.
