

Jesuits Set McQuaid High Ceremonies

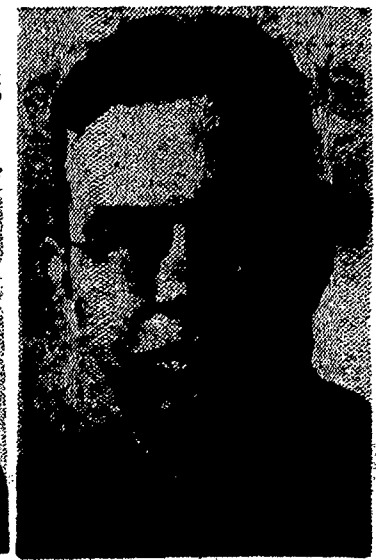
His Excellency, Bishop Kearney and the Very Rev. John J. McMahon, S.J., Provincial for the New York Province of the Jesuit Fathers, will lead ground-breaking ceremonies for the new McQuaid High School at Elmwood Avenue and Clinton Avenue South next Tuesday, June 23 at 4 p.m.

Bishop Kearney, whose fifteenth anniversary as Ordinary of the Rochester Diocese, was marked by last fall's successful jubilee fund drive, will turn the first spadeful of earth to signalize the start of construction of the new \$1,500,000 high school for boys. Both Bishop Kearney and Father McMahon as a representative of the Jesuits who will operate the school will speak briefly at the ceremonies on the 26-acre plot.

Catholics Work To Meet Increase In School Pupils

With a building boom of more than 600 elementary and high schools in the past three years, Catholic schools in the U. S. are battling to meet enrollment increases that are piling up almost five per cent faster than in public schools.

Four hundred elementary schools went up in dioceses throughout the nation in 1950-52, and 150 more were under construction as the past school year started. Catholic high schools at the same time increased by 80 new buildings with almost 40 more underway last year.

These are estimates from the latest biennial survey of the Department of Education, N.C.W.C. central source for statistics on U.S. Catholic education. A comparison of that office's figures with a "Statistical Summary of Education," newly released by the U.S. Office of Education, gives one of the first accurate pictures of what U. S. school systems, parochial and public — are facing today.

CATHOLIC elementary school enrollments which have been at least tripled since 1920, were tallied at an accurate 2,560,815 in 1950. Various estimates since then have placed enrollment at more than three million.

The most recent complete figures showed a two-year enrollment increase of 111 per cent in Catholic elementary schools as compared with a 62 per cent jump in public elementary schools. And Catholic High School enrollments were increasing 47 per cent while public high schools fell a 9 per cent.

As of June, 1950 almost 11 per cent of U.S. school children were in Catholic schools. The percentage has climbed since then and the figure keeps climbing.

A CONSERVATIVE estimate has some three and a half million pupils now enrolled in Catholic elementary and secondary schools.

The facts on school construction show that while building has advanced it still lags behind enrollment. In 1950 when Catholic schools received a nine per cent two-year increase in pupils, only a three per cent increase in building was reached to provide for the influx.

The building boom which has gained speed since then will help remedy that situation. But it won't fill the bill. Catholic high

Korea Missioner Relates Grim Ordeal Under Reds

In this exclusive NC series of articles, Father William R. Booth, a Maryknoll missioner from Brooklyn, recalls the events of his recent imprisonment under the North Korean (communist) and pays tribute to his heroic fellow prisoners and North Korean Catholics.

Since I arrived back in the United States a few weeks ago, I have been told time and time again how lucky I am to be alive when so many of those who were arrested with me are dead.

But luck had nothing to do with my survival. It was the providence of God which brought me home. All through

RIGHT NOW enrollment increases are most urgently felt in elementary grade one and in kindergartens. Looking to the future, these will form the largest graduating classes in U.S. history to pour out of Catholic elementary schools prepared for a Catholic high school education.

Number one long-range problem is to provide for them — to supply the religious training especially needed at the teenage level. Even today, Catholic high schools could substantially increase their enrollments if school buildings and teaching staffs were available.

The nation's public schools are admittedly hard pressed for a solution to the problem of bigger enrollments now and bigger ones to come. In addition to this common problem, U.S. Catholic schools — depending on the pocketbooks of individual Catholic parents — must expand to include thousands of youngsters now deprived of a Catholic education.

Reds In Poland Work To Check Mass Attendance

London — (NC) — The Polish regime has made a new move to keep that country's Catholics from church on Sundays.

That is the reaction of informed sources here to a Warsaw Radio announcement that all stores will be kept open on Sundays. The broadcast said this would make it possible for working people to do their shopping and marketing on that day.

The regime previously had initiated the following moves to keep people from the religious observance of Sundays. It organized special "outings" for workers which begin early Sunday morning and lasted the entire day. Red officials frequently call party meetings during hours when church services are scheduled. Polish youth are frequently compelled to join the "voluntary work brigades" which labor on special Communist projects on Sundays.

Soviet Airman Now Priest

Plainfield, N.J. — (NC) — A Soviet flier, converted by the religious underground in Russia and now a priest, will attend the Fatima Congress here on July 12.

Ten Priests Go On Trial In Shanghai

Hong Kong — (RNS) — Ten Roman Catholic priests have gone on trial before a Communist military tribunal in Shanghai, China on charges of spying under cover of religion. The Shanghai Radio announced.

The group of Catholic priests had been arrested March 25 in Shanghai. In the 11-day trial reported, was the head of the Jesuit seminary in Shanghai, who is an American citizen.

THE REPORT, however, did not make clear whether the American priest was one of those being tried. Nor did it say whether other Americans were among those accused.

The Jesuit Mission Office in New York said there was a Shanghai Regional Seminary operated by Jesuits for the training of parish priests and St. Robert Bellarmine Theologate in Shanghai for the training of Jesuits.

The acting rector of St. Robert Bellarmine, the office added is the Rev. Charles McCarthy S.J. of San Francisco.

San Francisco — The Rev. John K. Lapan, mission procurator of American Jesuits in China, said a Hong Kong priest had forwarded to him a letter written by Father McCarthy on March 26.

In the letter, Father McCarthy said one Chinese and two Belgian priests had been arrested the day before. Writing guardedly, he hinted that he and other Jesuits might be next.

A New York mission office staff member said there were at least four American Jesuits in Shanghai.

The Shanghai Radio described the trial defendants as "two main criminals, Tien Wan Lin and Lin Jen, and eight accomplices." All, it said, were charged with working for "imperialist agencies."

Archbishop Downey Of Liverpool Dies

Liverpool, England — (RNS) — The Most Rev. Richard Downey, Roman Catholic Archbishop of Liverpool, died in a hospital here at the age of 72 after a long illness.

One of England's outstanding churchmen, Archbishop Downey was the inspiration behind the new Metropolitan Cathedral of Christ the King.

FATHER WALL, who was ordained June 12, 1897 by Bishop Bernard McQuaid is the oldest priest in the Diocese of Rochester. He marked his silver jubilee as pastor of St. Mary's Church, Canandaigua on Feb. 15, this year.

Many improvements made at the Canandaigua Church were preceded by zealous administration and service at the following churches, assistant pastor, Holy Family Church, Auburn from 1897; Pastor of St. Theresa's Church, Stanley and St. Mary's, Rushville, 1898; Pastor St. Mary's, Horseheads and Elmira Heights, 1903; Pastor St. Patrick's, Dansville; 1909 and Pastor St. Agnes, Avon, 1921.

MONSIGNOR EDELMAN, who was elevated to the rank of Domestic Prelate in June 1952, has a distinguished record as pastor and educator. He has been pastor of St. Louis, Pittsford for 42 years.

An outstanding member of the faculty of Nazareth College for women, he taught at St. Andrew Seminary, served on the Diocesan Matrimonial Tribunal, the Diocesan Junior Clergy Board, and as a trustee of Holy Sepulchre Cemetery. Appointed pastor of St. Louis Church, Pittsford, June 23, 1911, he handled the work of planning and establishing the first parish school in Pittsford.

FATHER BAIER has been pastor of St. John the Evangelist Church, Greece, since Aug. 13, 1935.

A native of Rochester, Father Baier was born on March 16, 1886. He attended both St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's Seminaries and upon graduation was ordained on June 8, 1921.

Father Baier was first assigned to Holy Family Church, Rochester, as assistant pastor. In 1924 he was appointed pastor of St. Theodore's Church, Greece, where he served until given the pastorate at St. John's.

announced that Mayor Samuel B. Dicker of Rochester and Supervisor Leonard Boniface of Brighton where the new school is located, will speak.

Invitation to attend the ceremonies have been extended to parish chairmen and their workers who were active in last fall's successful campaign which made the new school possible.

Delegations from the Fourth Degree, Knights of Columbus and the Rochester Regiment, Knights of St. John also will be in attendance. Music will be furnished by the Aquinas Band under the baton of Raymond J. Hasenauer. Members of the Loyola Guild composed of relatives of Jesuits, will serve as ushers.

FATHER BARNETT said the ceremonies will take place in the center of the 26 acre campus on the site of the proposed school chapel.

The new structure will be built in the form of the letter H and the chapel is to be located at the crossbar.

Following the ground-breaking ceremonies, excavation work will get underway immediately to permit formal opening of McQuaid High in September, 1954. Plans call for the construction of necessary buildings to accommodate 1,000 students.

The new school, the first to be conducted by the Jesuit Fathers in the Rochester Diocese, will be the second high school for boys in Monroe County. It has been named in honor of the Most Rev. Bernard J. McQuaid, first Bishop of Rochester and a pioneer champion of Catholic education.

The hospital has no blood bank. The Sisters begged the husband to get some blood donors. He was a stranger in the city and could find no volunteers. Then Sister Karen gave a pint of her blood and saved the life of the mother.

Admiral Nimitz Daughter To Enter Catholic Convent

San Francisco, Calif. — (NC) — Mary Manson Nimitz, youngest daughter to Fleet Admiral Chester W. Nimitz, is to enter a convent within six months, it has been reported here.

Twenty-year-old Miss Nimitz became a Catholic shortly after entering Stanford University where she received a degree this month.

Her parents, both Protestants, declined to comment or give details on their daughter's plans. The religious community Miss Nimitz plans to enter has not been disclosed.

Miss Nimitz, who attended high school at the Dominican Convent in San Raphael, Calif., was an outstanding student and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa at Stanford.

At Stanford she became a close friend of Clare Boothe Luce now, U. S. Ambassador to Italy, who built the university's Newman Chapel in memory of her deceased daughter.

Admiral Nimitz who is now regent of the University of California and Special Consultant to the Secretary of the Navy, has two other daughters and one son who is a Navy Commander.
