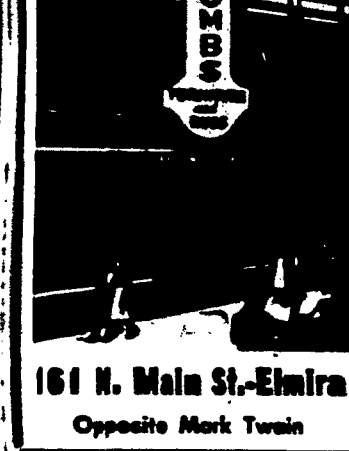

The Apostolic Delegate will preach in Italian and English and will carry the Blessed Sacrament in procession to the Ravine at 4:00 p.m. Holy Mass will be celebrated at that hour with His Excellency presiding.

The famous choir of St. Anthony's Church, Albany, will sing at the Mass and a band will play on the grounds of the Shrine that day to play sacred music.

The choir, a group of 30 male voices, is schooled expertly in the music of the church.

Pilgrims of all nationalities are invited to greet His Excellency. Members of pilgrimages are welcome to bring box lunches, or refreshments and full course meals are available at the Shrine.

Archduke Otto's First Born

Symbols Of 2 Nations Used At Child's Baptism

Wuerzburg, Germany — (NC) — Water secretly brought from Hungary and candles lit by a flame carried from Austria were used at the baptism of the first-born child, a daughter, of Archduke Otto of Hapsburg, pretender to the throne of the former Austro-Hungarian Empire.

An Austrian Bishop, the Most Rev. Ferdinand Pawlikowski of Seckau, baptized the child, who was given the name of Andrea-Maria. The ceremony took place in the chapel of Luitpold hospital here, where the child was born. Her mother is the former Princess Regina of Saxe-Meiningen.

Hungarians still loyal to the Hapsburg throne brought the baptismal water which had been taken from the river Tisza and was smuggled across the borders of Communist-ruled Hungary. Also used was water from the Austrian national shrine of Mariabell and from Meiningen (Thuringia), home town of the mother, which is located in the Soviet of Germany.

A NOTE HERE SYMBOLIC reminder of the child's Austrian nationality was a bit of Austrian soil which had been placed under the pillow on which she rested during the baptism.

The child's grandparents were Father Marianus, O.S.B., Duke of Saxe-Meiningen, and her paternal grandmother, Empress Zita, who was represented by her daughter, Archduchess Adelheid.

Among those witnessing the ceremony were members of the German and Austrian aristocracy and Prince Max von Hohenzollern, the eldest son of Archduke Francis Ferdinand who was murdered in 1914 at Sarajevo.

Harrisburg, Pa. — (NC) — Five members of the Pennsylvania Legislature have introduced a bill which would honor the memory of Philip Murray, deceased former head of the C. I. O. with services to his nation, state and city. Philip Murray, a devout Catholic, was for many years one of America's leading spokesmen for the working man.

Rio De Janeiro — (NC) — Close to a million people took part in the ceremonies here climaxing the year-long, country wide pilgrimage of a statue of Our Lady of Fatima. A colorful procession, a display of fireworks and a huge gathering of 200,000 people at the Municipal Stadium, preceded the permanent enshrining of the statue in a new church here dedicated to Our Lady of Fatima.

But the trend is gradually turning in the other direction, thanks in great part to the wonderful work of the Christopher movement."

"So that more and more public and private personages see that our democracy, our ideals of freedom and individual rights are rooted in Christianity — as the Founding Fathers of our Country were so well aware when they wrote the Declaration of Independence and the Preamble to the Constitution, is the need of today."
