

Knights Of St. John Honor 36 Dead At Field Mass

The role of 13 knights and 23 members of the Ladies Auxiliary who died during the past year was read at the 36th Annual Field Mass of Rochester Regiment, Knights of St. John and Auxiliaries celebrated in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery Sunday.

Celebrant of the Mass, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Wilfred Craugh, recited to the 300 knights and ladies at the Mass. He declared that if people doubt a life after death, they dodge the truth.

Those who claim to be convinced that death ends all are seeking to stifle a natural fear of the unknown. Monsignor Craugh said, "God in His wisdom has not seen fit to draw aside the veil that shrouds the future either in this world or the next, but in sacred Scripture and in the teaching of His Church, He has given us enough

light to enable us to prepare properly for our own passing into the future and to help those who have gone before us."

Springfield, Ill.—(NC)—A bill to provide a 60-day "cooling off period" for couples seeking divorce has been signed by Gov. William G. Stratton.

The bill is designed to cut down Illinois' divorce rate and to save families from breaking up through hasty divorce action.

The law requires that divorce petitioners wait two months before they file contemplated suits for divorce, separate maintenance or annulment. They must file a statement of intent.

Turkish Stamp To Honor Feast Of Assumption

Ephesus, Turkey—(NC)—Preparations have been made by Turkish authorities to place on sale on Aug. 15 a special series of postal stamps commemorating the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin.

This ancient city of ruins is regarded by many as the site from which the incorrupt body of Mary, the mother of Jesus, was taken into Heaven to be reunited with her soul.

Another tradition holds that the Blessed Virgin actually died in Jerusalem and was returned into Heaven from that city. The doctrine of the Assumption itself dates back to early Christian times and was proclaimed a dogma of the Catholic Faith by His Holiness Pope Pius XII in 1950.

One series of the Turkish postage stamps commemorating the Assumption carries an illustration of the Blessed Mother; another an illustration of the ruins of this city so prominent in the early history of the Church. It was to the early faithful in this city that St. Paul wrote his epistle to the Ephesians.

A special cancellation seal has been prepared by the Turkish government for use on the stamps which will be sold here on Aug. 15, the feast of the Assumption.
