9 New Interns, 8 Residents Enter St. Mary's Service

Nine new interns and eight new resident physicians joined the staff of St. Mary's Hospital, Rochester on July 1 and will participate in the post-graduate medical education program announced at the hospital in December of 1951.

St. Mary's Hospital affiliated with Georgetown University Medical School to establish a medical education program and to provide improved training for interns and resident physicians.

When the affiliation took place Dr. John Butler of Worcester, Ohio was announced as Director of Medical Education.

The medical education program was announced originally by Dr. Leo F. LaPalin, St. Mary's chief of staff who explained that the newest results of modern medical research were to be brought directly to the bedside of St. Mary's patients through extended visits each month of doctors holding professional rank at Georgetown Medical School.

OTHER ARRANGEMENTS include rotation of interns at St. Mary's for periods of special training at Georgetown Medical Center; provision for a year in basic medical science at Georgetown for resident physicians after which they will return to St. Mary's for two years of clinical work.

The agreement between the university and the hospital also provides that two St. Mary's staff doctors at one time may go to the Georgetown Medical Center for a week of special training.
