

GOD LOVE YOU!

In Lowell's "Vision of St. Luce" Christ says:

"Not what we give, but what we share
For the gift without the giver is bare;
Who gives himself with his aims feeds three,
Himself, his hungering neighbor and Me."

The poet distinguishes between giving and sharing. Giving is parting with a thing, such as a coin; sharing means to enter into the need of the neighbor so that he receives a part of ourselves. Saints intensely identify with the sorrowing and the sinful, but only Our Lord did this completely. That India today might never say: "God does not know what it is to live on one bowl of rice a day." He went hungry for forty days; that missionaries in China might never say, "God does not know the sting of a Communist lash or the scorn of a Marxist mob." Our Lord suffered trials as they did and had His ears deafened with the shouts of "Crucify!" He entered so entirely into the emptiness of the sinner that He permitted Himself to feel it on the cross, saying: "My God, my God, why hast Thou abandoned Me?"

The other thought of Lowell also shows that when we share with others by sacrifice we give to God. When the Holy Father distributes our sacrifices, it is Christ Himself who receives: "When you did it to the least of these My brethren, you did it unto Me."

Much giving today is spiritually worthless. St. Paul wrote: "If I should distribute all money to the poor, and have not charity (supernatural love of Christ), it profits me nothing." No gift profits your soul unless the inner life of Christ prompts it.

If you sacrifice something, you help the Holy Father's Missions yourself. In the name of Jesus and Mary, save a soul in the mission lands and help save your own.

Chaplain Hero Killed In Korea Buried In U.S.

Louisville, Ky. — (NC) — The body of the first Catholic chaplain to be killed in Korea, Father Herman Felhoelter, O.F.M., of the Cincinnati Franciscan Province, has been returned home. A solemn requiem Mass was offered in St. Boniface's Church, Louisville, by Father Vincent Kroger, O.F.M., provincial, with burial following in St. Michael's cemetery, Louisville.

THE CHAPLAIN'S parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Felhoelter, reside in St. Boniface's parish. Father Felhoelter was killed July 16, 1950, when he was ministering to wounded American troops, on the day before his 37th birthday. He had won the title of a coin with a Protestant chaplain to see which one would remain with the wounded men. Ordained in 1939, Father Felhoelter served in Cincinnati at Roger Bacon High School and at Longview State Hospital, and at St. Boniface's Church, Peoria, before receiving his commission as a U. S. Army chaplain in 1944.

AFTER TWO years of overseas service in World War II, during which he received the Bronze Star, he was separated from military service in 1946 and named assistant pastor at St. George's Church, Cincinnati. He reentered the Chaplain's corps in 1948.

The Distinguished Service Cross was awarded to Father Felhoelter posthumously.

Maryknollers Report 2,451 In Order

Maryknoll, N.Y. — (RNS) — The Catholic Foreign Mission Society of America (Maryknoll Fathers) now has a total of 2,451 priests, brothers, sisters and students according to an announcement here by Bishop Raymond A. Lane, M.M., Superior General. Bishop Lane said that the society numbers six bishops, 544 priests, 124 brothers, and 675 students, while 1,102 sisters belong to a parallel mission group for women.

He said that Maryknollers are stationed in China, Japan, Formosa, Korea, Africa, the Philippines, Hawaii, North America, Central America, South America and Rome, Italy.

Liturgical Workshops Opened To Public

Purchase, N.Y. — (NC) — Six choral workshops open to the public are being held as a special feature of the summer season of Manhattanville College's Pius X School of Liturgical Music, the school announced. Conducted by experts in the field, mostly members of the Julliard School of Music faculty, the sessions are being held on Tuesday evenings through Aug. 11. One dollar fee is being charged for each workshop session.

St. Maria Goretti Feast Day Moved

Vatican City — (NC) — The Sacred Congregation of Rites has confirmed here the shift of the feast day of St. Maria Goretti, modern Italian martyr of chastity, from July 6 to July 9.

The feast day was changed because July 6 is the octave of the Feast of St. Peter and Paul. It was pointed out that the liturgical feast of St. Maria is celebrated only in some parts of Italy and not throughout the Universal Church.

Reds Refusal Of U. S. Food Irks Germans

Berlin — (NC) — The people of the Soviet Zone of Germany are shocked and disgusted by the communists' blunt rejection of the food offer made by President Eisenhower. This becomes clear from many reports that have come to Western Berlin from the surrounding communist-ruled areas.

BOTH CATHOLIC and Protestant Church circles here have much information on the distressing food situation in practically all parts of the Soviet Zone. The food supply has been unsatisfactory for a long time and has become even more deficient since the countrywide uprising against communist rule last June 17.

Charitable organizations, though severely hampered by lack of means and the unfriendly attitude of the ruling powers, do all they can to help in the most urgent cases. But, they point out, the great majority of the people must depend for aid on their friends and relatives in western Germany and abroad.

Hence the aid organizations point to the great importance of appeals issued by His Eminence Josef Cardinal Frings, Archbishop of Cologne, and Evangelical Church leaders to people in western Germany to send food parcels to their suffering brethren in the East.

THE ACTS OF President Eisenhower's 15 million dollar food offer and its rejection have become known throughout the eastern zone and are believed to have further strengthened the opposition against the communist regime, which depends for its existence on the Soviet occupation army.

Mexican Village Welcomes First Priest

Merida, Mexico — (NC) — When Father Walter W. Winick, M.M., a Maryknoll missionary from Raymond, Wash., visited the village of Chanysache near here, he had no idea what a welcome fight he was.

The American was the first priest the villagers had seen since 1928. They docked to the church to join in reciting the evening Rosary. The next morning Father Winick learned that most of them had stayed in the church all night so as not to miss their first Mass in three years.

Chinese Catholics In Philippines Plan Nocturnal Convention

Manila (NC) Chinese Catholics in the Philippines are soon to hold a national convention here to bring about closer union in their ranks and to map plans for spreading Catholicism among the millions of their fellow countrymen in the Philippines.

Initiative for the convention came from the Manila Chinese Catholic Association, a small but active group organized shortly after the last war. The association's aims are to make Catholicism a religious and social force in every Chinese community, and to convince the Chinese that they do not lose their national customs or traditions by being baptized into the Catholic Church.

India Government Welcomes Birth-Controllers, Seeks Ban On Missioners

New Delhi, India — (NC) — Any discrimination against foreign missionaries by India's secular government would be incompatible with the welcome extended to foreign birth-control advocates.

So declared the Catholic Association of Bengal in a letter to Home Minister Dr. Kailash Nath Katju, who recently told the House of the People that the Indian government disapproved of the proselytization of Hindus by foreign missionaries, and said they were welcome to work only in educational, medical and other social fields. The Minister's view brought strong protests from Catholic leaders in which Protestant and even Hindu spokesmen joined.

STRESSING THAT the clear implication was that Christianity was the only religion that would be forbidden to seek converts, the Bengal Catholic group told Dr. Katju: "We are unable to understand that a policy of discrimination against teachers of religion should be adopted by a declared secular State, particularly when foreigners are welcome in India to teach its people methods of birth-control—and this despite the religious beliefs of millions in this country."

Repudiating what it said were the aspersions cast on foreign missionaries by Dr. Katju, the Bengal Catholic Association added: "IT IS NOT clear how Christianity, responsible already for so

much good to our country, and responsible for the very concept of democracy itself, can in any way be considered as opposed to the best interests of India. On the contrary, it is our proud claim that by its insistence on obedience to duly constituted authority, its high moral standards and its work among the sick and suffering, it advances the very progress of India herself."

Among Hindu leaders who have criticized Dr. Katju for his statement is A. Krishnaaswamy, member of the Indian parliament, who characterized the Minister's views as utterly unconstitutional. Heading Catholic critics was His Eminence Valerian Cardinal Gracias, Archbishop of Bombay, who declared that Dr. Katju's statement was a threat to freedom of religion in India.

Bishop Receives Honorary Degree

New Orleans — (NC) — An honorary doctorate of laws was conferred on Bishop Joseph Oliver Bowers, S.V.D., of Accra, Africa, by Xavier University here.

Prior to the civic reception at which the degree was conferred, Bishop Bowers offered Solemn Pontifical Mass in St. Louis' Cathedral.
