Bitter Doses

Lady should have a universal appeal. The same thought was brought home to me when I heard a woman in her late seventies discussing a project of a certain club. Using a familiar figure of speech she declared to me: "Why, my mother would turn over in her grave, if she thought I was spending money so foolishly!"

ALL THIS leads us to conclude that our meal of approval or disapproval may carry more weight than we sometimes are led to believe. Our taste in everything subtly influences the young minds around us, for better or worse.

Take, for example, the matter of reading. The following anecdote is taken from "Printed Poison", a publication of the Archdiocese of Rochester of Christian Mothers.

"His right leg was in a heavy cast. The hospital would be his home for at least two more weeks. Just as the priest finished hearing the young man's confession, two people entered the room and placed their bundles at the bottom of the bed. Three sexy magazines slipped out from the package.

NO ONE was more startled than the priest when, after noticing the books, he was introduced to the buyers of the books, the boy's mother and dad. What a throwing overboard of a God-given privilege and obligation of parents to check the reading material of their sons and daughters!

"A mother needs to worry these days about the reading material that may fall into the hands of her boys and girls away from home. But many a mother is failing to realize that in her own home she may be feeding her children bitter doses of poison by permitting perhaps only occasionally, a magazine, book or booklet that is slightly or entirely indecent, to be part of her home.

"OUR BLESSED LADY, model of mothers, reads over your shoulder. May she never turn away in disgust from any literature that she may find in your hands or in your home."

"What gives?" she asked in shocked surprise. "You're tired?" And putting the kids to work—at fourteen!"

It is not quite as bad as that. We haven't yet violated any of the Child Labor laws, nor do we feel afraid of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children.

But we do feel that the three-month vacation from school ought to contain—especially for the teenagers—something constructive, something besides late sleeping, tennis and swimming, playing sasharine records over and over, be-bop, jokes and conversation, comics and television.

And that constructive something for Mary this summer is typing.

FAT AND JOHNNY, Eileen and Markie, each in turn took a summer-school course in typing following eighth-grade graduation and found it was really money-in-the-bank ever after.

History and English assignments, term papers done on the typewriter are easier to write and certainly easier for the teacher to read. College notes transcribed and put into a book make for easier exam preparation. And, so the older children learned, there's always a fast buck to be picked up for a few hours spent at the old machine.

With no summer school easily accessible, Mary is getting her typing lessons at home. In cool next-to-nothing clothes, hair pushed back by her ears, she peeks away every day after lunch during these breathlessly hot hours when outdoor activity is unsafe anyway.

Pretty soon, of course, Mary is going to need a book. But it's too hot to go downtown and get one, so she is getting along with what her teacher (that's me) can remember from her own early efforts, and what the other children can remember from theirs.
