Bishop Joseph Oliver Bowers, S.V.D., newly-consecrated colored Bishop, will preside at the Investiture and Profession of the Divine Word Brothers at St. Michael's Mission House, Conesus, on August 15th.

Five Brother Novices will pronounce the first vows in the Society of the Divine Word. They are: Brother Dominic, Erie, Pa.; Brother Edmund, Holyoke, Mass.; Brother Mario, Brooklyn, N. Y.; Brother Michael, Potsdam, N. Y.; and Brother Thomas, Utica, N. Y.

The Very Rev. Robert C. Hunter, Provincial of the Eastern Province, will receive the vows in the name of the Superior General in Rome.

**BISHOP BOWERS** was consecrated recently for the Diocese of Accra, Gold Coast, West Africa. He was born on March 28, 1910, on the island of Dominica, British West Indies, where today his 84-year-old father is still the organist in the parish church. He entered St. Augustine's Seminary in Bay St. Louis, Miss., after preliminary college studies in his homeland. He pronounced his first vows in the Society of the Divine Word in 1933 and continued his theological studies at St. Augustine's until 1938 when he was sent to Rome to complete his studies at the Gregorian University. He was ordained priest in



**BISHOP BOWERS** Rome in January 1939. For the next ten years Father Bowers was a missionary in the Gold Coast, British West Africa. In 1951 he returned to Rome for further studies in Canon Law and the degree of a licentiate. Bishop Bowers brings to his office an excellent command of English and French and three of the native languages spoken in his diocese of Accra, a wide knowledge of British Civil Law and many-sided missionary experiences.

## Genevans Hear Director Of Family Rosary Crusade

Geneva — Several hundred Genevans crowded Club 86 here last week to hear the story of the Family Rosary Crusade from the Crusade's world famous director, the Rev. Patrick Peyton.

Through the Family Theatre, Father Peyton has been able to produce special broad-casts over radio and television dedicated to the Mother of God and the family rosary.

"Even if only two are saying the Rosary—that is the Family Rosary—these two will be following Christ's words where two or three are gathered in My name, there am I in the midst of them."

**FATHER PEYTON** described how in illness he prayed to Christ's mother "as one who needed a friend". When he was restored to health, he dedicated his life to the spread of the rosary.

"I felt that the way I could thank her was to be a 'little excuse' to spread devotion to her. My thanks to Our Lady was to get ten million Americans to say the rosary."
