**15,000 See Pros In Charity Game**

In the first National Football League charity exhibition football game held in Rochester, the Baltimore Colts defeated the Pittsburgh Steelers, 13-6 at Aquinas Memorial Stadium, Wednesday night.

*The Bodleian Library*

Sister M. Dominik, who traveled in Europe this summer with her companion, Sister Margaret Teresa, wrote the following summary of her visit to the Bodleian Library at Oxford. This communique is addressed to Reverend Mother M. Helene, superior general of the Sisters of St. Joseph, with whose kind permission the following is published.

Oxford, England  
July 23, 1958

I just returned from my third visit to the Bodleian Library. The first visit was to see an exhibition on the history of Oxford. The second was to secure admittance to the library proper, very much of a red tape procedure, swearing among other things, "not to smoke in the library."

To get admittance to the office where this was done, we first had to be introduced by a "responsible" person known to the Librarian. Our friend, Father Van Dijk, the Dutch liturgist, performed this service for us. He by the way, has been on the library staff of the department of manuscripts for five years. My third trip today was possible because I had succeeded in getting my little pink ticket of admittance.

Dr. Hunt, the Keeper of the Manuscripts, is a very great scholar and a very genial man. He appointed a librarian to take me through the working quarters, following the book as it were, from the time it is selected and ordered until it finds its proper home in the stacks.

FROM DR. HUNT and his assistant cataloger I learned many things I never knew about handling manuscripts. Then I proceeded to examine some which I had listed. One one gets that pink slip, and is taken into the family, as it were, the Librarian is yours. Priceless toms were brought to me and I enjoyed a couple of hours poring over them.

The first document shown proves that there was a body of teachers (monks) at Oxford as early as the early twelfth century. The document is a short invective against the monks addressed to Thurston who was Archbishop of York from 1119-1139.

Another document from the University Archives is an award made to the monks by the Papal Legate on June 25, 1214 in which he restricted the rent charged the clerics by the townsmen. There had been a conflict be-

tween the University and the Town, and in it some of the monks were hanged. This award was by way of settling the peace. It is in this document that the title "Chancellor" of the University first appears.

ANOTHER document granting land in Cat Street (now spelled Cate Street) dated 1215 was witnessed by a binder, a scribe, three illuminators, two parchment sellers—a good picture of the arts and crafts then serving Oxford.

Bishop Kearney would enjoy seeing one of these official papers. Following a thirteenth century clash between students of northern and southern England, the King's Chancellor wrote to all the Bishops in England to warn their students, who would be returning to Oxford after vacation, to return unarmed. So many documents point to the Catholic control of Oxford. A note of coming strife is struck in a document dated 1367 in which any appeal from the Chancellor's Court to the Papal Court is forbidden.

I COULD NOT begin to list all. There are in all fifteen cases containing one hundred thirty such documents. I'll just indicate a few. St. Augustine's "De Civitate Dei," a copy owned and annotated by Robert Grosseteste; a syllabus of the studies and exercises required for an M.A. degree at Oxford; the manuscripts of original plays given before James I and other Kings at Oxford; the Will of Cecil Rhodes, dated September 8, 1893, founding the Rhodes Scholarships; and a more recent document of interest to Americans is a letter from the Rockefeller Foundation informing the University of their plan to give \$2,300,000 for the development of the Bodleian Libraries at Oxford. It is dated December 24, 1931. And the English still say we worship the dollar! Santa Claus surely was good to Oxford that year. Another appealing document is Her Majesty's D.C.L. degree—honorary—awarded in 1948. It is about 24" by 30" and beautifully hand printed.
