Evening Mass Laid To Impact Of Machine Age

Grand Rapids, Mich. (RNS)—The impact of the machine age on modern living was responsible for last January's decree by Pope Pius XII permitting evening Masses throughout the world, the 14th National Liturgical Conference was told here.

The Rev. Benedict A. Ehmman, pastor of St. Mary of the Lake church, Watkins Glen, N. Y., said the machine age had "changed Sunday into a laboring day" and "night into day and day into night."

Because of this many Catholics have been kept from Sunday and weekday Masses and provision has to be made for celebrating Mass at hours that people "can call their own," he added.

Father Ehmman spoke at the Civic Auditorium just before the start of an evening Pontifical Mass that climaxed the Conference.

He said the Pope had not acted hastily in allowing evening Mass, but "after some 25 years of local and tentative concessions which might have been construed at the time by wise observers as straws in the pentecostal wind of our times."

During World War II, Father Ehmman noted, bishops in some parts of the world were allowed to authorize evening Mass, especially for soldiers and prisoners of war.

"It is the Mass that matters and not that it has to be in the morning," said the priest. "It may have been the urgency of wartime conditions which precipitated many of these grants of evening Mass, but we need not suppose that the war did any more than accelerate what has been long a growing."

Father Ehmman added that Catholics had given a "spontaneous and eager" welcome to the evening Mass, which may be celebrated only by permission of local Bishops and not before 4 p.m.

The only possible objection to it might have arisen from the requirement of the Eucharistic fast, he said, but this fast has been modified for those attending evening Mass.

Carmelites To 500 Pilgrims Expected To Build Monastery Visit Auriesville Shrine

The attendance of 500 men, women and children attending the pilgrimage to the North American Martyrs Shrine at Auriesville is expected to exceed this year when the visit is planned for Sunday, Sept. 13 according to Chairman Ralph F. Murphy of the local committee.

A SPECIAL TRAIN will start from Buffalo to pick up the western contingents. This train will leave Rochester at 7:30 a.m. daylight saving time. The fare for adults, round trip is \$5.50, children one-half fare. Reservations may be made with Charles A. Tucker, at Tucker's Catholic Shop at 300 Main Street East, or Secretary Clifford Sargent at the K. of C. Clubrooms.

Pilgrims may see the Open Chapel; venerate the relics of Martyrs; pray in the Ravine where St. Rene Goupil's body was secretly buried by Father Isaac Jogues; and attend Mass in the Temple of the Seventy-Two Doors. The Coliseum or "big round church" has four Altars facing north, south, east, and west set in the center of the Edifice and has a capacity of 10,000 pilgrims. It is a sixth of a mile in circumference.

School Enrollment Expected To Pass 38,000 On Sept. 9th

A noticeable increase in registration of Catholic school children in elementary and secondary grades over the 35,112 reported last year is anticipated when schools open on Wednesday, Sept. 9 according to the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles J. Mahoney, superintendent of diocesan schools.

Seminaries and colleges in the diocese are awaiting added students. Registration figures at St. Bernard's Seminary have not been fully compiled but the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Wilfred Craigh, rector, expects an enrollment near the 276 of last year.

A RECORD enrollment of 220 students is reported at St. Andrew's Seminary by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Maynard A. Connel, rector, in the minor seminary will be students from the dioceses of Rochester, Syracuse, Albany and St. Augustine, Florida. The Rev. Louis J. Hohman joins the faculty this year.

Nazareth College for women conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph will open on Wednesday, Sept. 16 with approximately 400 students. A faculty of 42 will conduct the course. Freshmen orientation will take place on Sept. 14 and 15.

With approximately 350 students registered including 30 veterans of the Armed Services, St. John Fisher College for men conducted by the Basilians Fathers will open for its third year. Freshman registration will take place on Monday, Sept. 14 and lectures will begin on Friday, Sept. 18.

Faculty members of the men's college added this year are: the Rev. William P. McGee, C.S.B., the Rev. Robert C. Miller, C.S.B., the Rev. Gerard Pilecki, C.S.B., Walter Rafalko, Edward N. Weber and John G. Keller.

HIS EXCELLENCY Bishop Kearney and His Excellency Auxiliary Bishop Casey will celebrate Mass of the Holy Ghost in colleges and high schools on dates to be announced in their appointment schedules next week. Masses will be celebrated to invoke the guidance of the Holy Ghost upon the forthcoming school terms.

Accurate enrollment figures could not be given, this week but estimates reported follow: Aquinas Institute, Catholic Boys High School will have between 1485 and 1500 boys with a faculty of 63. The Basilian Fathers Nazareth Academy for girls in charge of the Sisters of St. Joseph will have more than 1300 girls and a faculty of 52.

Our Lady of Mercy High School for girls will start about 800 girls on the school year with the Sisters of Mercy in charge. Faculty numbers about 33.

St. Agnes High School conducted by the Sisters of St. Joseph will have approximately 134 girls in the student body with nine on the faculty.

Elmira Catholic High School will open with Sister M. Raphael as principal and Sister Mary Alberta as vice principal.

3 Lay Professors Added To John Fisher Faculty

Three additional lay professors on the staff of St. John Fisher College were announced by the Rev. John E. O'Meara, C.S.B., dean, today.

They are: Walter Rafalko, L.L.M. of Spencerport, Edward N. Weber, M.A., M.S. of LeRoy and John G. Keller, Ph.D. from St. Louis, Mo. The first has been named Assistant Professor of Political Science. Mr. Weber will be an instructor in Chemistry and Dr. Keller will be Associate Professor of Biology.

MR. RAFALKO earned his B.S. degree in Business Administration at St. Louis University, his LL.B. in law at Boston University, School of Law and his L.L.M. degree at the Graduate School of Law, Georgetown University.

He has served on the St. Louis University, School of Law staff and as Attorney Advisor, Office of Price Stabilization in Washington, D.C.

During undergraduate years at St. Louis U., he was a member of the baseball and football teams and during his senior year captained the varsity football team. He later served as assistant football coach.

Mr. Rafalko was in the United States Army during World War 2 and had a 1st Sgt. rating.

COMMITTEES on which he served, of the St. Louis Bar Association are: Guest lecturer of Tax Institute, Attendance, Corporations and Legal Advisor for the St. Louis Legal Aid Bureau.

As a member of St. Louis University he was a member of the human relations library and special affairs committees. He has been a member of the Legal Education and Admissions Committee of the Missouri Bar Association and Chairman of the Special Affairs Committee at St. Louis University.

He is a member of the United States Supreme Court, United States District Court for the District of Columbia, United States Tax Court, United States Court of Military Appeals and Supreme Court of Missouri.

MR. WEBER received his B.S. in Education and M.S. in Chemistry from Canisius College. He has been a graduate Teaching Fellow in the Biological Laboratory Department of Canisius College, he has also had experience in industry having father of two children.

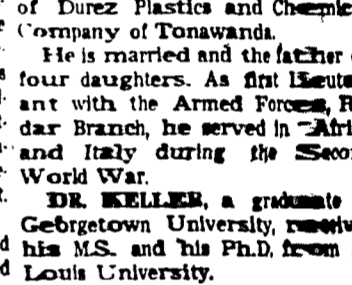
He has been a graduate Teaching Fellow in the Biological Laboratory Department of St. Louis University. Mr. Keller is married and the father of two children.

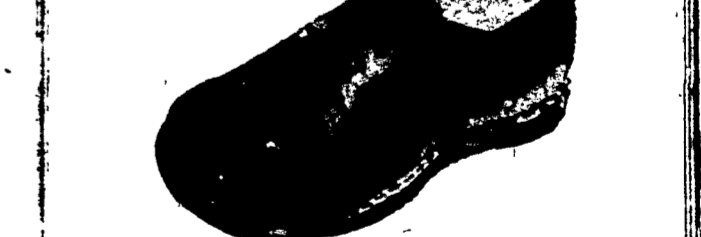
