
Proposed Sketch Of Mount Carmel High School in Auburn

The low modern school will be situated on a beautiful site south of the new Whitefriam Drive as shown in the above drawing. The 400 meat cafeteria appears at the far left of the building with the large mass of the combination gymnasiumauditorium in the background. The gymnasium will have ample apectator capacity, a large platform, and a collegiate sized basketball court, with ample lockers for both boys and girls.

The low central wing incorporates administration and offices, a large library,

room, aid a small chapel. At the right of the building appears the long north-south classroom wing

which will contain ten large homercoms and two large homercom study halfs. Counselors' offices and teachers' lounges are also included in this wing. The entire program has been planned for future expansion which would



Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, in an address before the American Bar

Association, has advocated extensive revisions of the United Nations Charter. He ave that the document, which was drafted at San Francisco in 1945, "now reflects serious" inadequacies. Few, if any will disagree with Mr. Dulles that these "inadeo-

H o w ever. not a few will seriously dispute views of the Secretary of State when he somehow appears to present the thesis that the shortcomings of the UN Charter derive not sormuch from the documentt itself bue rather from circumstances and developments which were either unknown at the time to the drafters of the Charter or could not possibly be formeen by them.

SUCIE CEPTICS will say that the "inadequacies" which Mr Dulles rightly complains about today, were plain as a pilkestaff at the time of the Charter drafting in San Francisco. It is not only "now," as Dulles asserts, that they are "reflected." They were there from the very beginning. And, what is even more significant, they were pointed out at the time by persons who, while fully recognizing the need of a world or manization, set forth the basic principles that ought to guide its construction.

Carves Crucifix In Priest's Memory



Freedom Village, Kores-American war prisoners repatriated by the Chinese Communists here hold a three-foot crucifix hand-carved by a Jewish marine captain in memory of Chaplain (Capt.) Emil J Kapaun of Pilsen Kan. Father Kapaun died May 6 1951 of "causes unknown" while a prisoner of the North Korean Reds. He was listed as missing in action on Nov. 20, 1950 and was last seen caring for wounded men. The officers who brought the crucifix across the lines over Red objections are left to right: Capt. Joseph O'Connor of Spring City, Pa.; Marine Warrant Officer Felix J. McCool of Glendale.; and Lt. Ralph A. Nardella of Paterson, N J. The men said that Father Kapaun, while in prison, dad almost the impossible in helping his fellow PW's, both spiritually and materially.
