

Genevan Retires After 42 Years With Power Firm

Geneva—Geneva's oldest active employe of the New York State Electric and Gas Corp. went on the retirement list this week. He is Thomas McGrath, 266 Hamilton St., who is now in his 42nd year with the company.

His rise to his present position as superintendent of gas distribution began in April, 1912, in Auburn, when he became a pipe fitter for the company then known as the Empire Gas and Electric Co.

"Things were different in 1912," he says. "I've seen a great many changes take place. There was no such thing as mechanical equipment in those days—only one automobile in Auburn. Company servicemen used bicycles. And when there was lightning to do, it was done by hand."

"Now we have ditching equipment, bulldozers, compressors and pneumatic tools."

MR. McGRATH became foreman of gas distribution in Auburn. Then he was transferred to a subsidiary company, the Oswego Gas and Light Co. and in 1916 he became superintendent there.

Fr. Turner Marks Golden Jubilee

The Rev. Joseph P. Turner, C.S.S.R., known to many lay re-treatants in the Diocese of Rochester, celebrated the Golden Jubilee of his Religious Profession on Sept. 8 in St. Mary's Church, Annapolis, Md.

Father Turner conducted retreats at the fore-runners of the present Notre Dame Retreat House, the one on Lochland Road, Geneva for a complete season, and at St. Bernard's Seminary.

His Excellency Archbishop Francis P. Keough of Baltimore presided at the Jubiliarian's Solemn Mass.

Under Father Turner's guidance many vocations among young men to the religious life and the priesthood were fostered. He counts among ordained priests 105 diocesan, religious and foreign missionaries who were directed by him to the Sanctuary.

Father Turner was active in promoting the lay retreat movement, especially among the Knights of Columbus, and he took an active part in the conference of the retreat movement throughout the United States.

He entered the Redemptorist order in June, 1902 and was ordained on July 2, 1908.

Young Lady Takes Vows In Dominican Monastery

In a setting consistent with a cloistered order, Sister Mary of the Angels Quill made her first Vows in the Dominican Order of the Perpetual Rosary on Rosary Hill, Elmira on the feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Sept. 8.

The private but solemn ceremony took place in the presence of the Rev. Michael L. Hynes, monastery chaplain, as delegate of His Excellency Bishop Kearney. Father Hynes congratulated the professed novice on the choice of life she has now entered.

AT THE END of the Conventual Mass in honor of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and before the daily Exposition of the Most Blessed Sacrament, the young novice prostrated herself before the whole community to pronounce for the first time the religious vows of Poverty, Chastity and Obedience.

Sister Mary of the Angels is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Quill of Auburn.

Besides the ordinary duties of a cloistered religious, the young

religious pledged herself to take part in the perpetual Recitation of the Rosary in this particular convent for the rest of her life.

"This private but solemn ceremony may be only one of the routine steps to be taken in forming the character of a good religious," Father Hynes said during his sermon, "but for you, dear Sister Mary of the Angels, it is the tapping of a hitherto unknown fountain of grace and merit."

"THE VIRTUES you have thus far practiced in your life; the sacrifices you have made; the temptations you have suffered, will henceforth put on an entirely different character. The vows that you have taken, will raise them all to a higher plane of grace and merit.

"The virtues, the sacrifices, the temptations will be the same, but their spiritual value will now be measured by the rule of the solemn promises made to God today," the chaplain said.

"By way of encouragement," he continued, "let me assure you, that the vows, you have just taken, will be easy of fulfillment in these hallowed surroundings with the help of God's grace and your ever cheerful cooperation.

"Our Lord's promise in the Gospel of a Sunday ago: 'Seek you first the kingdom of God and His justice, and all things else will be given to you' will take care of poverty. Living daily in intimate association under the same roof with Jesus and His Blessed Mother, and your own constant prayer and watchfulness will take care of chastity.

"Imitating the meekness and humility of Christ in being 'subject to them' in this religious home, modeled after that of Nazareth, will make your obedience the holy envy of the whole community," Father Hynes assured her.
