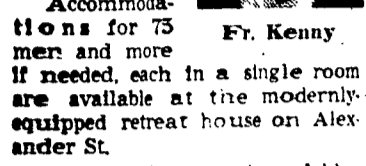


15 Weekends For Men Set At N. D. Retreat House

Aerial Offensive Sharpened For Aquinas Opening Grid Foe

Like most modern youths the Aquinas football team will be very much air minded this season. After three weeks of intensive practice in preparation for their opening game against Cathedral Prep of Erie, September 27 at Aquinas Stadium it has become obvious to Coach Ray Jablonski and his aids that the main Little Irish offensive weapon will be in the air.

The main reason for this conclusion are the accurate right arm of T-formation quarterback Charlie McKenna and the fast catching ability of Jimmy and Joe DiFabio. McKenna's throwing last season as an unlettered to Tom Wals and part-time starter has blossomed into a fine, confident passer.

ACTING AS the catcher in the starting Aquinas battery is the veteran end DiFabio. Maturing last during the summer he now packs close to 200 pounds on his 6 ft. plus frame. Possessed of a good pair of hands and excellent speed he should develop into an outstanding receiver.

Not since the days of the famous Burns-Hollender duo has Aquinas been blessed with such a talented aerial combination.

In order to keep opposing defenses honest, the Irish can unleash a heavy attack and hard running backs. The probable starters are Dave Kelly, a bruising fullback, and Jackie McDonald.

A light but aggressive line will be anchored by rugged Nano D'Ercole at center. The guard spot is a strong point in the Irish forward wall with veterans Don Congdon, Jud Dry and John Guarino set for action. Four men Jim Cortina, Larry Palkino, Dan Yaeger and Rev. Maloy are waging a bitter struggle for the starting tackle berths. Dan Anichino will probably get the nod as DiFabio's running mate at end.
