

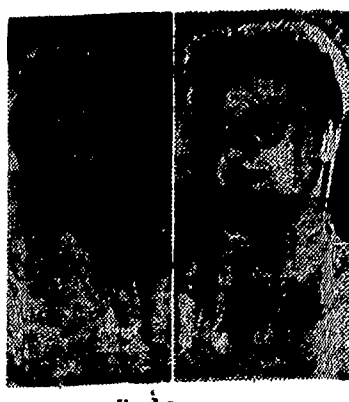
Catholic GI In Britain Honored For Bravery

Home Secretary Sir David Maxwell Fyfe presented him with the British Empire Medal. Alrman Smith dove into the icy waters and saved 10 people from almost certain death.

Chest, Red Cross Join For Drive

The Rochester Community Chest and the Rochester Chapter, American Red Cross will join forces for fund raising purposes in May 1954. This information was released Friday, Sept. 11 by representatives of both fund raising organizations, after the Board of Directors of the respective organizations voted approval. George L. Todd, President of the Rochester Community Chest and Charles S. Wilcox, Chairman of the Rochester Chapter, American Red Cross, made the following joint statement: "We recognize the extremely difficult situation existing in Rochester and the towns of Monroe County as a result of having to conduct a Red Cross campaign in the month of March and a Community Chest campaign in the month of May. It is our intention, therefore, to help reduce the number of separate drives in the community by combining the two appeals and raising the total budgets of the Chest and the Red Cross in a single campaign. This campaign will be known as the Community Chest-Red Cross Campaign of Rochester and Monroe County." Under the plans for the campaign appeal, the fund drive will be organized and directed by a joint committee of the Community Chest and the Red Cross.

You know, some of the best one-act plays have never been written, but may be observed on the R.T.C. bus lines by all of us fortunate who are regular patrons.

The 5 o'clock rush in the afternoon is much more invigorating, touched with just enough personal danger to arouse interest and speculation.

Getting a seat is the primary problem that glares in the eyes of the rider as he boards the bus. It is a sort of hungry look that results from the day-in-day-out challenge.

THIS USUALLY amounts to a few days ago I observed one of these little "fill-in" games that consisted of only two lines of dialogue. The setting was one of the Rochester Transit Company's early chariots that carries a pot pourri of machine-workers, bank tellers, students, housewives, department store clerks and insurance agents.

The bus was filled with the expectation of one seat. At the "stop", a young lady from one of our high schools boarded. She wore the neat uniform of her alma mater, and was struggling under a pile of books and notebooks that would have easily given her a Ph. D. by the time she was sixteen.

As the bus pulled away from the curb she was jostled from right to left. A Latin grammar fell one way while an English Composition notebook did spill on the other. Fellow riders of the red stallion retrieved the books and helped the young lady gain her equilibrium.

SHE SMILED apologetically and thanks as she found the only vacant seat. In a sitting position, her pile of volumes came very close to her chin. She breathed a sigh of weariness relief as she settled back. It would have been quite a load for a Latin grammar to have carried from her home to the bus "stop", to have endured holding until the bus arrived, and then have balanced with any kind of grace until she found a seat.

There were smiles of satisfaction on the patrons who had helped her. She was an attractive young lady, her manners were excellent, she showed training, and fall was beginning, school days—there were lots of reasons to smile.

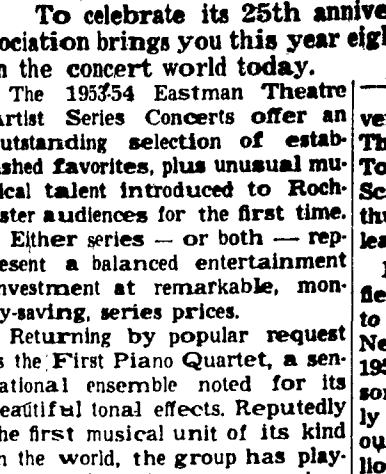
Returning by popular request is the First Piano Quartet, a sensational ensemble noted for its beautiful tonal effects.
