New Moderator Says Women Are 'Heart of Home'

Geneva — "Women are the heart of the home. They are the ones whose special light should shine in the world."

This advice was given Sunday by the Rev. Louis J. Hohman, Rochester, new moderator of the Rochester Diocesan Council, National Council of Catholic Women.

Father Hohman addressed 200 women from all parts of the Rochester Diocese at a quarterly meeting in the Knights of Columbus Home here.

He emphasized that Catholic women should take their light out from under the proverbial bushel and "let it shine on the lamp stand."

POWER OF WOMEN is practically untapped in the world today, he said. It should be spread to influence others and to make the world a better one in which to live.

Members of the Catholic women's organization from Elmira, Ithaca, Hornell, Corning, Rochester, and other parts of the diocese were present.

USING THE THEME of the Convention, "Set Your Will To Service," as a guide in planning, Chairman of the Eight Diocesan Committees will erect exhibits which will highlight the activities of each committee.

Nazareth College Slates Scholarship Test, Oct. 12th

Scholarships totaling in value more than \$10,000 will be awarded 12 young women of the Rochester area by Nazareth College on the basis of results in an examination to be given Columbus Day, Monday, Oct. 12, according to Sister Eve Marie, director of vocational guidance for the women's college.

That afternoon the annual Sub-Fresh Day program will be held. The examination will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the college administration building, 4245 East Avenue. Competition is limited to day students. Sister Eve Marie said. Another scholarship examination, for out-of-town students who would have to live in a dormitory, will be held at a later date with additional awards to be made.

Formal applications for the examination must be received by Oct. 5, according to an announcement which went out to high school students this week. Application blanks and further information are available from the Scholarship Committee. All senior women in public and Catholic high schools in the Rochester area are eligible to participate.

IN PAST years area and out-of-town students took the examination together, in February, and Sub-Fresh Day was observed alone Oct. 12, a free day for high schools. Because of the large number of applicants expected, it was decided to separate them into the two groups this year.

GUIDED TOURS of the campus conducted by Nazareth College students, are scheduled for 1:30. Visitors will have an opportunity to sit in on 210 classes of their choice, and gain first-hand experience of college academic life. A program in the auditorium, arranged by the sophomores — prospective "Big Sisters" of the Sub-Fresh — and the serving of refreshments will conclude the program.

Prospective candidates for admission to the college will have an opportunity to discuss their educational plans with deans, counselors and department heads.

Bishop Offers Mass For CWV Leader

Pontifical Review Mass for Thomas J. C. Walsh, 54, former national commander and long-time leader in Catholic War Veterans' affairs was offered by His Excellency Bishop Kearney of Rochester in St. Francis Xavier Church, New York on Wednesday.

Mr. Walsh died Sept. 19, 1953 of a heart attack in Westchester Square Hospital. He was vice president and sales manager of the Wilbar Photo Engraving Company there. He is survived by his wife and a son, three brothers and a sister, Sister M. Mathias, stationed at Staten Island.

A native of New York, Mr. Walsh served overseas with the Army in World War I. He served successively as post, county and state commander of the CWV in New York and in 1939 was elected national commander. He was re-elected national commander twice, serving until 1942 and was the only man in the organization to hold that post for three terms.

Mr. Walsh was a member of the Board of the National Catholic Community Service in the New York archdiocese. He held the Papal decoration of Knight of Malta and was active in affairs of the Knights of Columbus. He served on the executive board of the All-American Conference, an organization formed to combat communism. At the time of his death he was national publicity chairman for the CWV.

Blessing of the Graves will take place in Holy Trinity Cemetery, Webster on Sunday, Sept. 27 at 3:30 p.m.

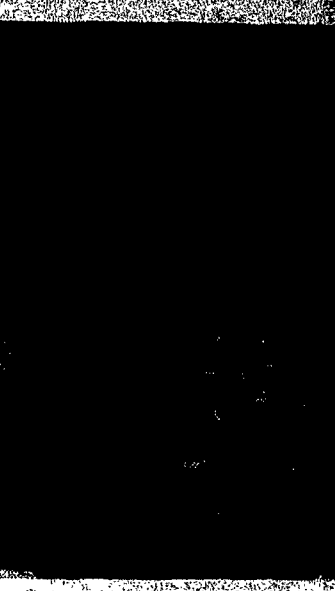
Officiating will be the Rev. George M. Kalb, pastor of Holy Trinity Church, Webster.
