Chap. Maguire, Homell Native, Dies In London

Rev. William Augustus Maguire, 62, former chaplain of the United States Fleet and a native of Homell, N. Y., died Sept. 13, 1948 while visiting London. He was educated at Seton Hall University and at the Immaculate Conception Seminary, both in South Orange, N. J. GOD LOVE YOU!

THE greatest penalty hanging over all human love is that we become used to it, begin to take for granted what is really a gift and a privilege. So it is with the love of God. It, too, has its seasons. Some of us begin to love off at a certain altitude, compromising for a set of prayers and certain devotional acts. Others become like eggs that avoid those deep acts of love which would incubate them to a higher level. Still others are like travelers who see God as a mountain, but whose love is so shallow they live in the valley below, merely content to look at heights which are believed impossible to scale.

The mediocrity of love is a source of unhappiness. We know it ought to blaze, but in our hands it is as a burnt ember. The problem is how to lift love from meanness.

The one solution is sacrifice. No one ever mounts to a higher level without death to a lower one. To love on the level of spirit, one must make a sacrifice in his name. For example, educate a young man for the priesthood which can be done for \$150 a year in Africa, Japan and India; help build hospitals for lepers; feed starving children in India; enroll yourself as a perpetual member of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith for \$40 or your family for \$100 and share in 15,000 Masses a year; or send an offering of \$2 to the Holy Father's Missions and request a World Mission Rosary. Do without a luxury, a dessert, a package of cigarettes, a cocktail and send the money to the Holy Father's Missions. He has to care for 100,000 missionaries throughout the world. Lift the necks of the souls of your soul. Leon Bloy once said: "One step beyond ordinariness and we are saints."

GOD LOVE YOU to V. N. H. for \$1 "I usually spend 17c a day carting but when I can I walk to work. This week I shall try to walk and give the money I save to the Missions. . . to J. W. M. "The enclosed \$3.50 was accumulated from "loose change" on hand at the end of each day. . . to Mrs. M. O'B. "Instead of spending this \$3 I received for my 82nd birthday, I send it to the Missions and pray that God will restore the gift of faith to a lover one. . . to J. H. K. Famed Sculptor Assails Persecutions In Yugoslavia

Syracuse—(RNS)—Ivan Mestrovic, famed Yugoslav sculptor, decried recent outbreaks of violence against Catholic bishops and priests in his native land and criticized the free nations of the West for bolstering dictators who oppress their peoples.

Referring to mob attacks against Yugoslav churches, the self-exiled artist, now head of the Syracuse University School of Sculpture, said: "Such barbaric occurrences must make every civilized man without regard to religion and nationality, feel ashamed that there are men who have no respect for the lives and dignity of others."

HE SAID such oppression would continue in one form or another until Yugoslavia is freely allowed to choose their own form of government.

Mr. Mestrovic said that Archbishop Lajci Budanovic, Apostolic Administrator of Backa who was reported kidnapped and beaten by Communist workers near Sombor, Yugoslavia, is a close friend of his.

The sculptor denounced as false charges leveled by Yugoslav Communists that the bishop is a "fascist." As evidence to the contrary, Mr. Mestrovic said that Bishop Budanovic was beaten and imprisoned by Hungarian fascists during the last war because of his antifascist activities.

"Today, the bishop is again insulted, beaten and humiliated because he is a Christian and a Christian and is opposed to Communist ideology," he said. "These are also reasons why other Roman Catholic bishops and priests are persecuted."

TO JUSTIFY these "acts of terrorism" against the Church, he said, Yugoslav authorities are spreading propaganda insinuating that the Croat clergy is conspiring against the country and people and serving the interests of a foreign power.

"However, this is a complete lie," the sculptor said, "and the Croat people know that their clergy and especially their bishops, have always defended their liberal and national independence."

Mr. Mestrovic, one of the world's outstanding sculptors, left Yugoslavia in 1947 in protest against the Communist government under Marshal Tito. High Yugoslav officials have invited him to return but he has rejected such invitations.
