### Nazareth College States Scholarship Test, Oct. 12th

Scholarships totaling in value more than \$10,000 will be awarded 12 young women of the Rochester area by Nazareth College on the basis of results in an examination to be given Columbus Day, Monday, Oct. 12, according to Sister Eve Marie, director of vocational guidance for the women's college. That afternoon the annual Sub-Fresh Day program will be held.

The examination will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the college administration building, 425 East Avenue. Competition is limited to day students. Sister Eve Marie said. Another scholarship examination for out-of-town students who would have to live in a dormitory, will be held at a later date with additional awards to be made.

Formal applications for the examination must be received by Oct. 5, according to an announcement which went out to high school this week. Application blanks and further information are available from the Scholarship Commission. All senior women in public and Catholic high schools in the Rochester area are eligible to participate.

In PAST years are and out-of-town students took their examinations together, in February, and Sub-Fresh Day was observed about Oct. 12, a free day for high schools. Because of the large number of applicants expected, it was decided to separate them into the two groups this year.

The scholarships to be awarded day students for the 1945-46 school year include two full-tuition awards, worth \$1,700, or \$425 annually; two \$500 awards and six \$300 awards. These may be used in the departments of history, business, chemistry,

classics, education, English, history, library science, mathematics, modern languages, nursing, sociology or speech and drama. In addition there is one \$800 scholarship for each of the departments of music and art.

Following the examination, applicants will be guests of the college at a noon luncheon, and are invited to participate in Sub-Fresh Day activities. High school students who do not choose to compete in the examination may attend these activities. They begin with registration and an assembly in the college auditorium at 1 p.m.

GUIDED TOURS of the campus, conducted by Nazareth College students, are scheduled for 1:30. Visitors will have an opportunity to sit in on 210 classes of their choice, and gain first-hand experience of college academic life. A program in the auditorium, arranged by the sophomore — prospective "Big Sister" of the Sub-Fresh — and the serving of refreshments will conclude the program.

Prospective candidates for admission to the college will have an opportunity to discuss their educational plans with deans, counselors and department heads.

O'Sullivan escapes many tragedies because of the prayers of his mother, but his most amazing escape, when his parachute fails to open, is wrought by the prayers of Ann, his beloved."

EDDIE DOHERTY'S biography, "Matt Talbot," presents an impressive portrait of the Irish ascetic who, when he fell dead on a Dublin street in 1925, was found to be wearing chains. Matt's victory over his vice of alcoholism is a story of prayer and penance. This new biography will not disappoint those who, having read "Tumbledown," know the skill of Mr. Doherty in character portrayal.

Books for spiritual inspiration are the following: "Suffering With Christ," an anthology of the writing of Dom Columba

Marmion. Dom Raymond Thibaut the compiler, expresses the value of the book in these words from his preface: "We trust these pages, filled as they are with Christ, His spirit and His love, will be for souls in the grip of suffering pages of light, comfort and peace."
