The Very John F. Murphy, C.S.B., president of St. John Fisher College, was principal speaker at the Memorial Service of the 36th annual New York District convention of Kiwanis International on Sept. 27 in Hotel Seneca.

The service was a prelude to the official opening of the four day convention.

"Man will never mature if all things of this and now, as long as they deal forever with what and never why. Once a man recognizes the absolute values of Truth and Justice—freedom of thought as absurd as freedom of breathing," Father Murphy said.

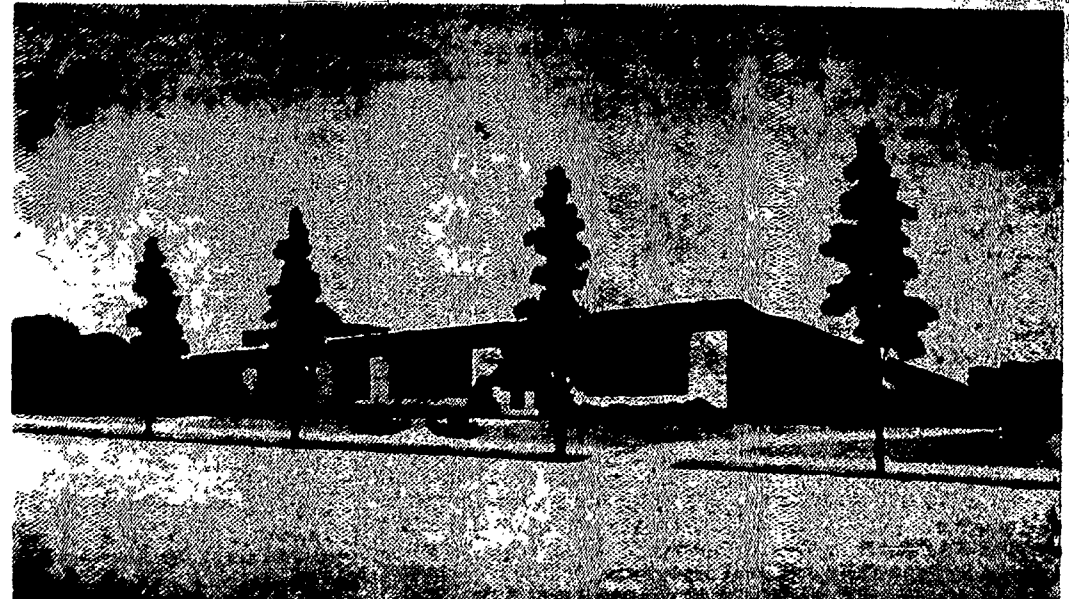
# Bp. Kearney To Open \$200,000 Drive For New East Rochester Parish School

A \$200,000 campaign to erect a new, modernly equipped school building in St. Jerome's Parish, East Rochester will be launched with a dinner at the East Rochester Columbus Youth Association building on Saturday, Oct. 3 at 6 p.m.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney will be the keynote speaker at the opening dinner on Oct. 3, and His Excellency Auxiliary Bishop Casey will appeal to the workers on Saturday, Oct. 10, according to the Rev. Roy B. Morphy, pastor of St. Jerome's.

A SCHOOL BUILDING, adequate in every respect for school children of East Rochester, is planned, Father Morphy said today. It will front on South Garfield St. and have entrances on Filbert St. and West Ave.

Designed as a one-story structure with provisions for a second, the school will be adjacent to the present C.Y.A. Building. Construction will be of cement block with brick facade. Eight classrooms and a kindergarten, a library, lunch room, principal's and nurse's offices will be included.
