WHY is it that secrets are so hard to keep? Because they are good news and above the general average of information communicated by word of mouth.

On that day the Society for the Propagation of the Faith will give you and your parish an opportunity to prove that you are Catholic.

40% of the sacrifices will go to the home missions of the United States.

51% of the sacrifices will go to the Holy Father for the foreign missions.

90% of the sacrifices will go to the Catholic Near East.

Here are some reasons for not keeping the secret of your faith, but for telling it through sacrifice.

1. 1/3 of the people of the world earn less than 50c a week.

2. 2/3 of the people of the world earn less than \$2.00 a week.

3. 2/3 of the people of the world go to bed hungry every night.

4. If all the pagans walked in single file, night and day, one per second, it would take them 35 years to pass before you.

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Judge John Swift To Receive Medal At St. Bona U.

St. Bonaventure, N. Y.—The Hon. John E. Swift, prominent Boston jurist and civic leader, Sunday (October 4) was named the 1933 recipient of St. Bonaventure University's Catholic Action Medal, awarded annually to a layman outstanding in Catholic Action.

The Very Rev. Juvenal Lalor, O.F.M., St. Bonaventure president, in announcing Judge Swift's selection said, "Few Catholic laymen in this country have carried out so long and so faithfully the words of St. James inscribed on the Catholic Action Medal: 'Be ye doers of the word and not hearers only.'"

Presentation of the medal will be made later this month. Fr. Juvenal said. The medal is usually awarded on Oct. 4, the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, patron of the Catholic Action. Date of the award ceremony will be announced after the return of Judge Swift from Rome, Italy.

Judge Swift is the 20th recipient of the Catholic Action Medal, first awarded in 1914 to the late Alfred E. Smith, former governor of New York State. James M. O'Neill, author and lecturer, was awarded the Catholic Action Medal in 1922. Among those who have been honored in recent years are Richard Pattee, Quebec writer; David Goldstein, Boston lecturer and author; and Clem Lane, Chicago newspaperman.

Judge Swift is a graduate of Boston College and Boston University Law School. He was admitted to the practice of law in Massachusetts in 1903 and has been a member of the U. S. Supreme Court since 1917. In 1933, he was appointed to the Superior Court of Massachusetts for life.

A 41-year member of the Knights of Columbus, Judge Swift held various local and statewide offices before being elected Supreme Knight of the Knights of Columbus in October, 1934.

Parents Visit Missioner Son In Far North

A first-hand idea of problems facing their missionary son, the Rev. Bernard W. Brown, O.M.I. in Northwestern Saskatchewan was obtained by Mr. and Mrs. Frank J. Brown of 315 Lake Front Irondequoit on a visit to his far-north station, this summer.

Father Brown, a graduate of Aquinas Institute has been in the far Northwest since 1951. The visit of his parents to Uranium City where he is building the Mission of St. Barbara was during the long winters.

MR. AND MRS. Brown drove to Edmonton, Alberta and then chartered a plane to Camell Fort where Father Brown had previously built a chapel of logs. They completely surprised their son who had not received 15 previously written letters due to the ice tie-up.

The parents were at the mission when His Excellency, Bishop Joseph Trocellier, O.M.I., vicar apostolic of Mackenzie arrived by plane with the Rev. William Leysing, O.M.I. The Rochester couple served as sponsors for 11 native girls and ten boys who were confirmed by Bishop Trocellier.

In his new post Father Brown at Uranium City is surrounded by boom town conditions, the parents recalled. His brother, Brother Thomas F. Brown, O.M.I. pronounced his final vows as an Oblate of Mary Immaculate at the Shrine of Our Lady of Hope in Essex, N. Y. on Sept. 8.
