### 350 Persons Join Monks At Blessing Of Chapel

Blessing of the crypt and shrine to Our Lady Queen of Peace at Mount Saviour Monastery, Elmira on Sunday, Oct. 4 brought an overflow crowd of more than 350 persons from throughout New York State, New England and the Southern Tier to join with the Benedictine monks in the impressive ceremony.

Mount Saviour is the only Benedictine Monastery in New York State. The crypt shrine is an important element of the nearly completed octagon-shaped chapel on the Monastery grounds.

REPRESENTING HIS Excellency Bishop Kearney, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William J. Brien, V.F., pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Elmira, and dean of the Elmira deanery, conducted the services. The Rev. Benedict Ehmman, pastor of St. Mary's of the Lake Church, Watkins Glen gave the principal address.

Rev. Damasus Wymore, O.S.B., welcomed the many guests to the ceremonies.

"The only things that remain are the things of God," Father Ehmman said as he pointed out that the 14th century statue of Our Lady with Child, which is the focal point of the shrine had seen many another time of tribulation, persecution and anxiety, fade into history as Faith in God remained strong and true.

THE IMPORTANT thing in these troubled times, he said is "we must have hope." "Blessed are the Peacemakers" would be an everyday motto. Father Ehmman told the people, for we are "not to say 'What good can I do' but rather 'How can I help others by following our Holy Faith and making and creating peace around us."

ONE SHOULD be able to say, "Wherever there is kindness and the generosity of Christ around me, I find peace, I am a creator of Peace."

After Father Ehmman's sermon the entire congregation went to the lower crypt immediately under the chapel. Monsignor O'Brien blessed the walls of the crypt and the statue as the monks chanted.

The procession returned to the upper chapel. At the centrally located altar in the center of the

**Religion Reported Gaining Among Russian Youth**  
Rome (NC) — The most hopeful news from Soviet Russia since the political changes that followed Stalin's death last March is that after 25 years of persecution, faith in God still persists there and is even growing among the young people.

This is the comment of an article entitled, "Soviet Russia Today and Tomorrow," published here by Civiltà Cattolica, leading Jesuit magazine. Written by Father Antonio Floridi, S.J., the article cites the remark of delegate Michajlov to the 19th Congress of the Communist Party, last October to the effect that that man is desecrated from the apost. religion is gaining ground among the youth of the country.

"Those who believe in God, as we do," the article said, "know that the triumph in the end will be God's. Our faith is confirmed by the information received from reliable sources, according to which the Russian Colossus is not as solid as it appears, and that the Soviet people's welfare and enthusiasm for the communist regime are more propaganda than reality."
