Mother of Sorrows School Dedicated By Bp. Kearney

Mother of Sorrows new school building, 1777 Latta Road, Greece was blessed by His Excellency Bishop Kearney on Sunday in a ceremony attended by priests of the diocese. Sisters who teach in the school and parishioners.

After the procession and placing of the crucifix in the hall at the school's entrance, Bishop Kearney spoke of the place of a religious school in the community.

THE BISHOP said a generation growing up without the assistance of "the seven Sacraments of Christ" is a weak generation. One must have sympathy with juvenile delinquents, the Bishop said, who are raised without religious knowledge — "those who have to try to face the battle of life without these helps."

As the procession went through the modern structure, some 400 parishioners and teaching nuns lined the corridors. Many of the children wore Boy and Girl Scout uniforms.

ACCOMPANYING the Bishop were: the Rt. Rev. Msgr. George W. Eichel, pastor of St. Andrew's Church; the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles F. Shay, pastor of Holy Rosary Church; the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles J. Mahoney, superintendent, Catholic Schools, Diocese of Rochester and the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Wilfred T. Craugh, St. Bernard's Seminary rector.

The Rev. Daniel B. O'Rourke, pastor of Mother of Sorrows Church said the school was built to house 430 pupils. Now in use, the school is one story high in front and two stories in the rear where the hillside on which it is built drops off.

Rapid expansion of the educational needs of the parish in the past seven years necessitated the larger school, Father O'Rourke said. The school had the largest increase in registration in the diocese this year.

Thomas More Lecture To Open Tuesday With Trygve Lie Of UN Fame As Speaker

Trygve Lie, first Secretary-General of the United Nations, will launch the 1953-54 Thomas More Lecture Forum in Rochester, when he appears next Tuesday evening, Oct. 20, on the stage of the Eastman Theatre.

Lie has just returned to the United States from his native Norway to tell his beliefs for the future on the basis of what he learned as chief administrative officer of the United Nations.

As the only candidate acceptable to both the West and Russia for one of the most important jobs in the world, he came as close to being a middle of the road force as could have been found.

NORWAY'S LEADING labor lawyer and Minister of Justice, Lie won international admiration for his clear, levelheaded thinking. As Foreign Minister during and after World War II, he was acclaimed for his part in the important Norwegian contribution to the Allied war effort and his astuteness in handling the tricky position of a small nation close to Russia.

He managed to maintain friendly relations and an independence that could easily have been lost.

In steering a middle-course in his effort to develop a working United Nations, Lie alternately incurred the wrath of the West and of Russia. But he constantly reminded his critics that his first responsibility and allegiance in his post was to the United Nations.

As the world's leading international citizen, Lie maintains his belief in the need for a United Nations in which all parts of the world are included. At the same time, he believed that the United States must stand firm against armed aggression and he acted instantly in support of the United States position when Korea was invaded.

Lie HAS received world-wide recognition for his vision, for his efforts to promote world peace, and particularly for his activities in urging economic and social aid to underdeveloped lands.

At Tuesday evening's lecture, the speaker will be introduced by Sol M. Linowitz, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Rochester Association for the United Nations. The lecture will begin at 8:15.

Six speakers in all will make up this year's program, and with the exception of Mr. Lie, all lectures will be given at the Rochester Chamber of Commerce.

\$85,000 Is Record For Aquinas Boys Magazine Drives
