The novena, which has an especial appeal to young persons, will be preached by Monsignor McAniff. It will continue every Tuesday night until Dec. 22.

THIS WAS the first Novena in honor of the Infant of Prague in this area and has gained in attendance each year. Particular intentions are made by those making the Novena, priests at St. Mary's said.

Central has been beaten once by Flint to the tune of 19-13. Flint scored the winning touchdown in the last few minutes when they recovered a Central fumble.

IN ITS victories Detroit has been impressive running up rather high scores. Their opening game against Servite ended 51-0. They walloped Hamtramck of Detroit 40-0, and last week humbled Boystown 21-0.

Bob Handloser 6'11" and 185 lb., running as a left half, has done most of their running and scoring. He is an All-City guard in basketball and All-State in football. His coach has declared the best high school back that he has ever coached and even predicts a great professional future for him.
