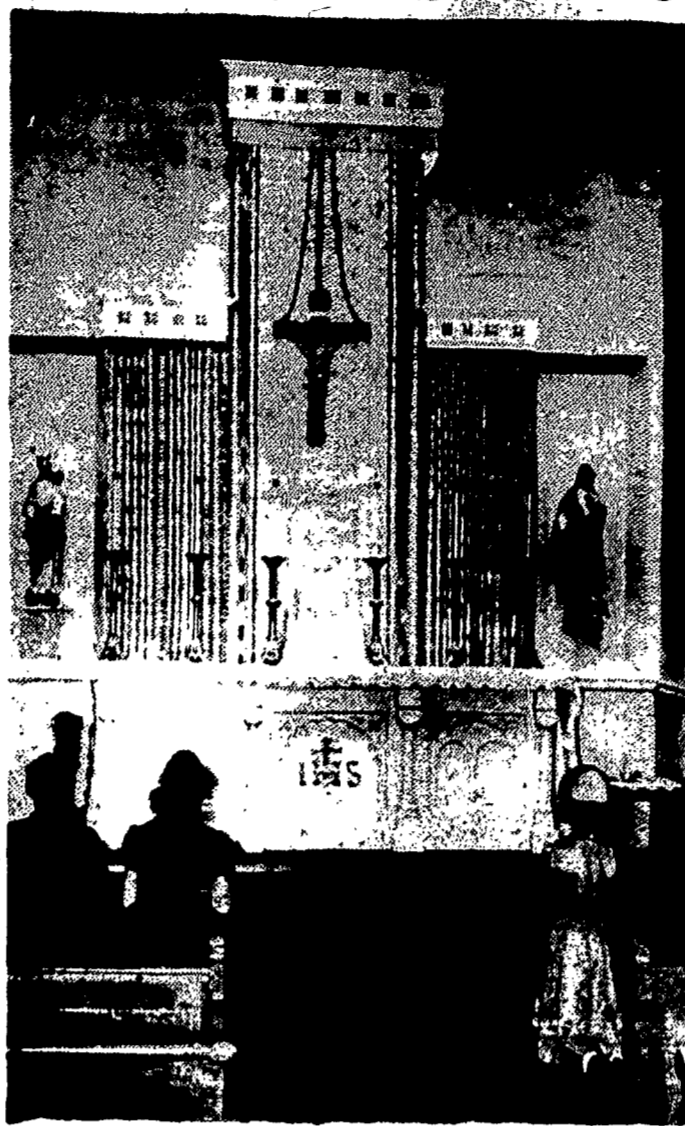

GOD LOVE YOU!

REMEMBER me? YOU DON'T! Well, that means you didn't remember that last Sunday was MISSION SUNDAY. Of course, I remembered because the Mission Sunday Envelope was "my little job" (Who but an angel and a sacrifice could get inside an envelope?)

I first appeared on the outside of the envelope, lighting up all the important facts about The Society for the Propagation of the Faith. For instance, DID YOU KNOW:

—that the Society with the aid of your sacrifice helps 1,100,000 pagans?

—that it is the Holy Father's own Society for aiding the missions?

—that if you give up a 10-cent, 10-dollar or 100-dollar pleasure and slip the money in the envelope with me, you will directly help 60,000,000 aged, sick and orphans?

—that even if you refuse to help, the Holy Father will must find some means of supporting 219 leprosaria, 1,900 orphanages, 1,200 hospitals, 3,400 dispensaries, 250 homes for the aged, 51,000 schools and 100,000 missionaries?

—that there are 630 areas of the world where the Church needs help desperately, and if you gave \$6.36, a penny would represent your charity for Christ in each place?

—that if you have been praying for a favor and receiving no answer, maybe you are just ASKING? Many people who have promised to aid The Society for the Propagation of the Faith to save souls have had their prayers answered.

—that of the ten letters who were cured, only one came back to thank Our Lord? Count your blessings but not your sacrifices and more blessings will come.

—that 15,000 Missas are offered yearly for the intention of the benefactors of the Holy Father's Missions? You also share in the daily Missas, Prayers, sufferings and sacrifices of every missionary.

—that Our Divine Lord said, "Freely received; freely give"? None of us has earned the gift of Faith. How can anyone who received that gift keep it to himself and not pass it on to others? If you realize the meaning of these words, you are the rare one who appreciates his Faith. And had you lived in the time of Our Lord you would have been the cured leper that came back and said, "Thank you."

"This \$10 was going towards some new clothes for college but after giving it some thought I realize that the starving children in the missions have a far greater need for the money. ... to Mrs. V. H. "We have just returned safely from a camping trip. We feel that The Propagation of the Faith can use this \$10 better than we can use souvenirs. ... to V. G. for \$5 "I was having trouble in my accounting course and I promised to send a dollar to the missions for every good grade that I would get. This not only gives me an incentive to study harder but I also feel that I am giving God something in return for His helping me. ... to Mrs. J. W. "Please accept the enclosed check for \$13. The organ is the gift of the Altar and Rosary Society. St. Joachim's Rectory was purchased in November, 1951. The first Rectory in Canisteo, it is a ten room house located on a corner lot next to the church. The interior of the house has been completely remodeled by the men and women of the parish and the exterior painted during the past summer by a non-Catholic friend of the parish and the members of the newly formed St. Joachim's Men's Club.

A DRIVE for funds resulted in more than \$5000 being contributed for improvements.

The Church interior has been completely refinished and richly decorated. The painting, rewiring and remodeling was the work of the Men's Club. Kneeers were repaired throughout and rubber cushions installed.

A member of the Altar and Rosary Society completed the draperies for the beautified altar. The color scheme of silver and gold is pronounced by the design of the center panel, banded with olive and gold galons, a striking background for the hand carved Crucifix suspended by gilded chains. All draperies are being designed so they can be changed according to the colors of the liturgical church year.

The colonial woodwork of the baldichino, finished with gold metalions and fringe, is the work of a non-Catholic friend of St. Joachim's.

Pews have been refinished in blond tone by Gerace and Forde of Rochester.

Rose carpeting throughout the church and new lights are a part of the improvements.

Shrines to the Sacred Heart and the Blessed Virgin Mary replace the former Sanctuary windows.

THE ALTAR and its furnishings were donated by a Rochester friend of St. Joachim's.
