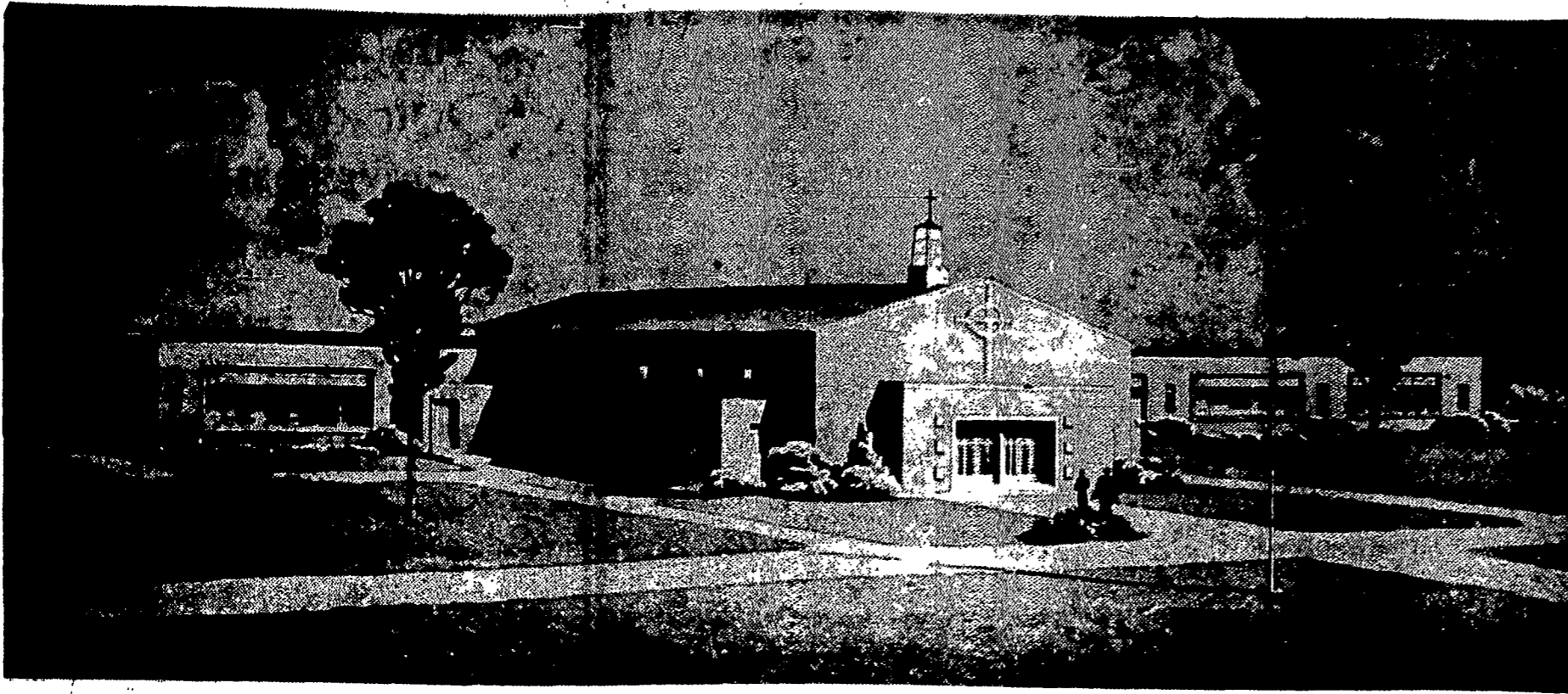


Architect's Drawing Of Proposed St. Theodore Church, School

Six new classrooms are to be built.

\$202,450 Pledged In Drive For St. Jerome's School

A total of \$202,450.80 topping the goal of \$200,000 was pledged for the new school in St. Jerome's Parish, East Rochester, it was announced by the Rev. Roy B. Morphy, pastor at the Masses, last Sunday.

Father Morphy said he was most grateful not only for the excellent cooperation given by parishioners, but by the whole village. The campaign assured the building of the proposed school, ground for which is expected to be broken in March with the building scheduled for completion in early 1955.

The new structure will provide eight classrooms and a kindergarten, a library, lunchroom, principal's and nurse's offices. It will front on South Garfield St. and have entrances on Filbert St. and West Ave.

STAFFED BY the Sisters of St. Joseph, St. Jerome's School now housed in the Columbus Youth Association building, was started in 1932. With a kindergarten, first and second grades, the school has an enrollment of 118 pupils. A new grade will be added each year to take care of the population growth in the village.

Father Morphy was honorary chairman and the Rev. Anthony F. Calmeri, honorary vice chairman in the successful campaign. Roland G. McDonald, as general chairman headed the hard working campaigners.

\$100,000 Campaign To Open In St. Theodore Parish

A one-day campaign for \$100,000 to build a new St. Theodore's Church and School on Spencerport Road will be conducted on Sunday, Nov. 1 according to the Rev. Raymond J. Epping, pastor of the parish since 1937.

In this, the first major appeal for financial aid in the parish, parishioners will be called upon between 2 to 5 p.m. Sunday to make their pledges. Each parishioner is asked to pledge for himself and his children, two hours pay a week for a two year period.

THE PRESENT St. Theodore's Church holds 253 persons and several of the Masses are overcrowded. With the great development in that area in Gates, the present six classrooms are inadequate, parishioners are told.

The school has no lunchroom or assembly hall and one of the classrooms is used as a lunchroom. Each year, it is estimated, it will be necessary to add a classroom at each entering class approximately 50 pupils.

Planned to meet the needs are the retaining of the present classrooms and the building of six new ones. The new church is designed to have accommodations for 600 persons. A lunchroom and an assembly hall will be located in the present church building.

Total parishioners of all ages near number more than 1000 persons. The parish lists have increased from 258 in 1945 to 473 in 1953 and the number is on the upgrade with all who have moved into the suburbs because their family had outgrown their city quarters.

CURRENT MAGAZINES are kept on file for reference and a visit to the library would be well worth while. Hours are Monday through Friday from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. and evenings from 7 to 9 p.m. On Saturdays the library is open from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. It is closed on church holidays, Sundays and legal holidays.

Father Quinn To Discuss Bible
