In our telecast in preparation for Mission Sunday, the American people were told of the tremendous humanitarian work of the Society for the Propagation of the Faith; for example, about 1,115 hospitals, 5,500 dispensaries, 319 leprosanatoria for 20,000 lepers and other institutions for the poor in Africa, Asia, Oceania and elsewhere. Last year we cared for 60,000,000 aged, sick, orphaned, and lepers, and children in the greatest humanitarian service of our modern world. What is particularly edifying about this work is that our 100,000 devoted souls receive no money for caring for the bodies and minds of these poor people.

We asked our listeners to send us a dime, telling them we would not be displeased if they wrapped it up in a check or in a greenback. The response was tremendous. Many Catholics proved they had the charity of Christ and His love of neighbor. But what was encouraging was the number of Protestants and Jews who made sacrifices for this noble work. Our heart was thrilled not only because some lepers will have more sulfadiazine, and our dispensaries will aid more Moslems and our poor in India will be better fed, but principally because our good friends were asked to do this "out of love of God." They have done the noblest of a great service, but what a greater blessing they have done themselves. One atheist sent us ten dollars and told us that if we answered his letter he would send in another \$15. Though this poor man calls himself an atheist, he knew very well that his offering would be dispensed by those who love and serve God.

These good souls may not all have thought that they were doing it for Our Lord, but we know that Our Lord counts it as if they did it unto Him. "What you do to these the least of my brethren you do unto Me." They are saving their souls by responding to one who speaks in God's name, for God's work. We embrace them in the affectionate bonds of Christ. Since our primary mission in life is to make souls Love God, our joy is not only because the poor were remembered, but because they were remembered for His sake.

## 2 Veteran SVD Missionaries Greeted At St. Michael's

Experiences in their Pacific mission stations of the Society of the Divine Word were related by two missionaries from that area who met at St. Michael's Mission House, Conesus.

The Rev. Arthur Schenker, Divine Word Missionary, who had served almost ten years in New Guinea met Brother Michael Cook, Divine Word Brother who had served in the armed forces in the same area during World War 2. They greeted each other and recalled events on the other side of the world.

FATHER SCHENKER comes from Dubuque, Iowa. He is being transferred to the Divine Word Mission on the African Gold Coast where the Rev. Charles G. Erb, S.V.D. of Rochester is serving. Brother Cook's home is in Potsdam. He pronounced his first vows in August of this year. So impressed was he with the heroic work of the missionaries in the Pacific Islands that he decided to consecrate himself to the same life.

The Divine Word Missionaries have in the New Guinea missions, two Bishops, 104 priests and 131 brothers. During the savage fighting in the Pacific, the Society lost scores of missionaries. Many of the churches and much of the mission property were damaged. At present most of these have been restored with the "excellent cooperation of our

### Candidates More in SVD

Divine Word Missionaries of St. Michael's Mission House, Conesus, report an increase in candidates for the Holy Brotherhood of their community. More than 80 young men from 15 states now enrolled in their three training centers, Conesus, Mt. St. Louis, Miss., and Tarrytown, N.Y. All are high school graduates who spend their mornings at classes and afternoons in acquiring important work skills calculated to fit them for foreign mission assignments. This year's freshmen class numbered 46. Several are expected next year.

## Trinitarian Motherhouse Near Philadelphia, Blessed

The new Motherhouse of the Missionary Servants of the Most Blessed Trinity, and the Father Judge Memorial Chapel solemnly dedicated by His Excellency Archbishop John F. O'Hara at 3501 Soily St., Holmesburg, Pa. on Sunday.

This is the Motherhouse for the Trinitarian Sisters who serve in the Diocese of Rochester with Concesas in Rochester, Auburn and Lyons and who serve in Annunciation, Blessed Sacrament, Holy Rosary and St. Patrick's parishes.

Recently completed and of contemporary design, the Motherhouse is built to accommodate 110 Sisters of the Order which was founded in 1832 by the Rev. Thomas Augustine Judge, C.M. In whose honor the chapel has been erected. The chapel seats 400.

In addition to the chapel, the new building contains a dining room, kitchen, laundry, auditorium, classrooms, library, offices and infirmary. The plan of the building is in the form of a large cross. The exterior is of golden buff brick walls trimmed in Indiana limestone.

PRIOR to the erection of the new building, the Motherhouse of the community was located at the same address but in different quarters.

The Missionary Servants of the Most Blessed Trinity work among spiritually neglected souls in six archdioceses and 19 dioceses of the U. S., Puerto Rico and Cuba. In Philadelphia they serve the Catholic Children's Bureau, Holy Redeemer Chinese School, the Doris Bosco Missionary Cenacle, and St. Barbara's Day School.

The Rev. Mother Mary Francis, M.S.B.T., directs the community as Custodian General. She resides at 3501 Soily St.

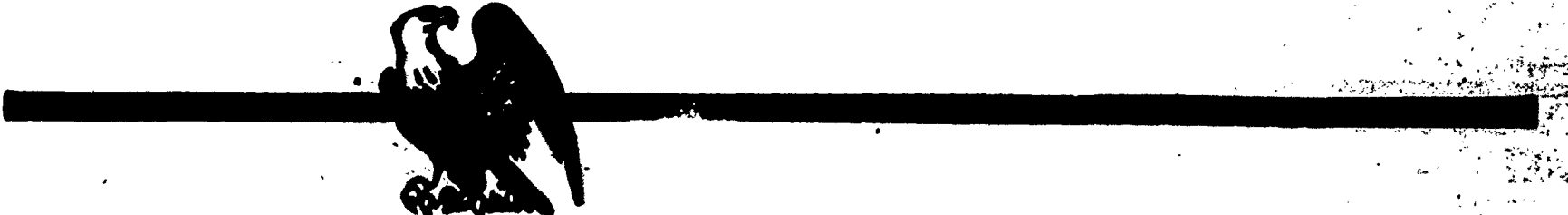
