A two-week campaign for funds for the restoration work will be launched immediately, according to the Rev. Charles J. Azzi, Mount Carmel pastor.

Heartbreaking side of the disasterous fire was the fact that Father Azzi had only recently concluded a complete modernization of the school at the approximate cost of \$180,000.

ALTHOUGH FIRE and water damage to the school is estimated at \$300,000, exact extent of the damage cannot be determined until the water-soaked building is dried out so architects can examine it, Father Azzi explained.

Problem of housing the 490 Mt. Carmel pupils was solved by the City's offer of the vacant Public School 18 on Draper and North Streets and only a few blocks morth of Mt. Carmri School.

The City of Rochester offered to lease School 18 to the parish on a month-to-month basis at a "nominal" rent until the parochial school can be restored.

Extensive clean-up and remairs will be necessary before the vacant public school can he reopened to its first classes in nine wears. Only eight reems and wine will be occupied by the Mt. Curmel pupils and


