At one time she was Assistant Reverend Mother of the Orphan Asylum and Infants' Home at Father Baker's Home in Lackawanna and of the St. Ann's Orphan Asylum in Dunkirk. She also taught and was principal of various parochial schools in the Buffalo Diocese.

Alumnae of the Sacred Heart will gather at Manhattanville College of the Sacred Heart Sunday, Nov. 14 at 3 p.m. to greet Very Reverend Mother Marie-Therese de Lescur, Superior General of the Society of the Sacred Heart who is completing a tour of the Society's houses in the United States.

Reverend Mother Ursula Benziger, Assistant General and Mother de James are traveling with her.

Since her arrival on Sept. 19, she has visited the four vicariates of the Society in the United States, staying about a week each in St. Louis, Chicago, New York and Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

Her visit at Manhattanville will last from Nov. 10 to 15.

It has been 39 years since Manhattanville has had the privilege of welcoming a Superior General of the Order, when Reverend Mother Janet Stuart, whose cause for canonization has been introduced in the diocesan tribunal of Southwark, visited Manhattanville in May, 1914.

The Alumnae of the four convents which are located in the metropolitan area, viz. Manhattanville, Greenwich, Noroton and New York, have organized the reception at which several hundred Alumnae will greet Very Reverend Mother de Lescur and offer her their good wishes.
