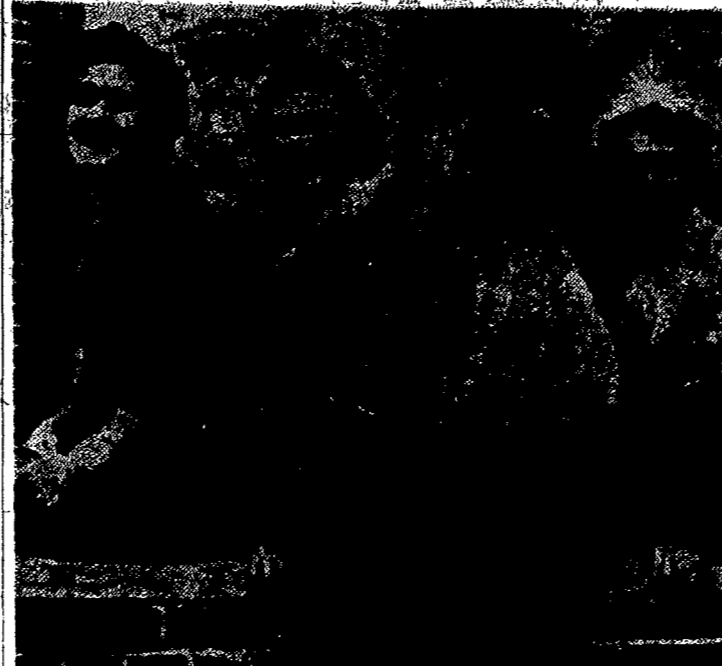
Buffalo Girl Wins Doll Contest Prize

Mr. Saffron industrial engineer for Graflex, Inc. died Oct. 31, 1933 in General Hospital after a short illness. He was 61.

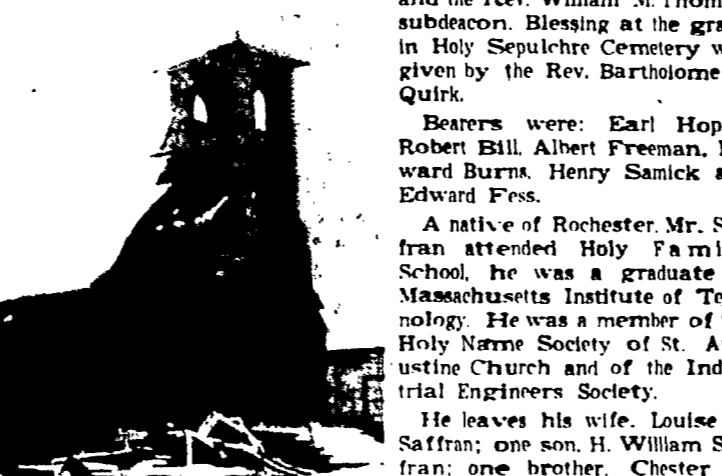

Appeals For School Needed For Blackfeet Indians

The Blackfeet Indians, living near the Glacier National Park in northern Montana, were converted to Catholicism by the great Indian apostle, Father De Smet, in the 19th century. Today they are predominantly Catholic.

For fifty years their children received a Catholic education at the Holy Family Mission, administered by the Jesuit Fathers and Ursuline Sisters. A series of disastrous storms and fires drained the community's resources and in 1939 the school was closed. For 13 years the Catholic Blackfeet have been attending government schools.

IN THE LAST four years, Father Cullen as director general of the Marquette League for Catholic Indian Missions (289 Fourth Ave., New York 10, N. Y.) has paid a parochial school near the Blackfeet Reservation \$6,900.00 for its yearly enrollment of some 39 Indian children. The Holy Family Mission buildings are still usable. It would take only a few thousand dollars to open their doors.

"This is a crucial year in Indian missionary work," points out Father Cullen. "Indians, particularly, need to be fortified with a religious education. Reopening the mission school for the Blackfeet will help to save the religion given them by our saintly pioneer missionaries, who risked their lives to carry the cross beyond the frontiers into the Wild West. Any gift you make to this cause, surely will be returned to you with interest in Heavenly coin."
