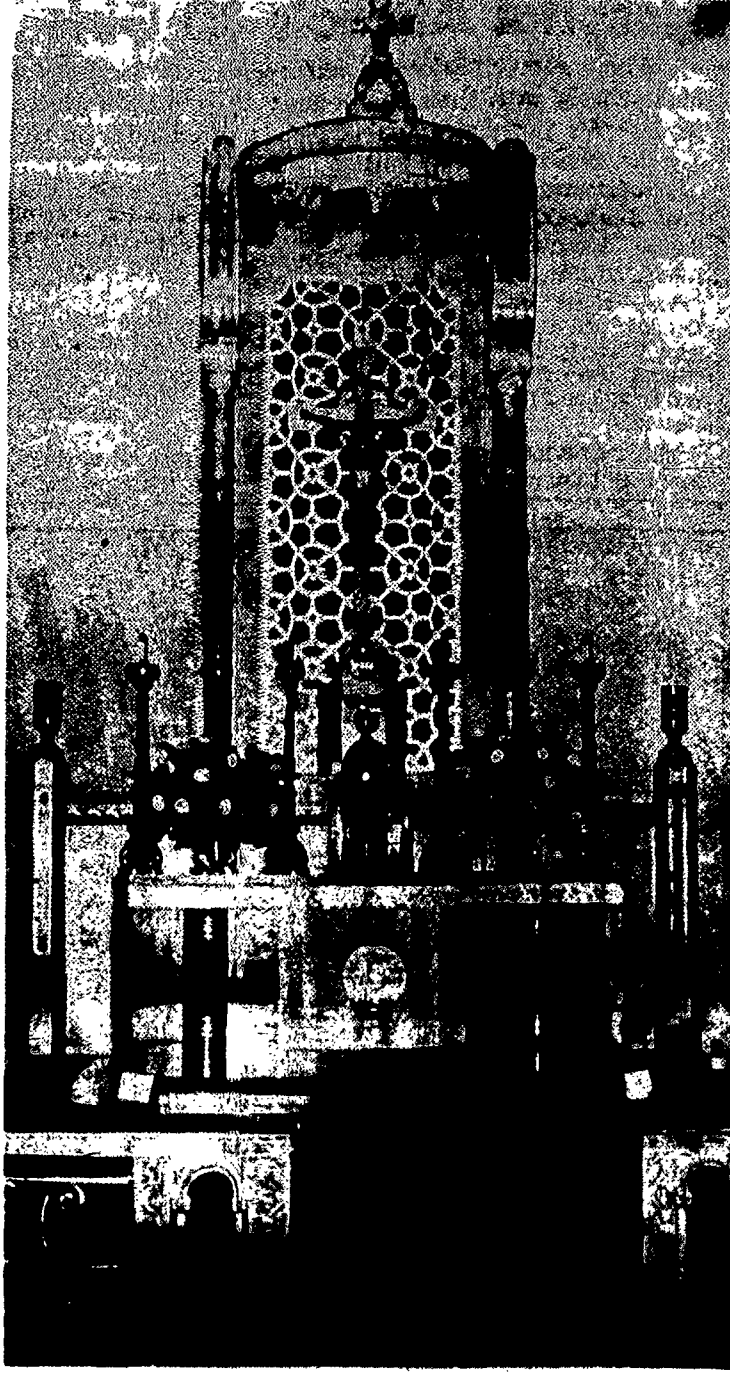

Bishop Consecrates Altar In Hornell

Hornell — In ancient liturgical rites, the marble altar in St. Ann's Church, Hornell, was consecrated Monday by His Excellency Bishop Kearney of Rochester.

The Bishop was assisted, in the solemn dedication of the altar to the service of God, by the Rev. Lawrence W. Gannon, pastor and 16 priests from the area.

Music was by a choir composed of Sisters of Mercy from St. Ann's, St. James Mercy Hospital in Hornell, Rochester and Auburn. The chants, dating back to the early centuries, were presented in a cappella.

Ceremonies, rich in liturgical significance, started at 8 a.m. Bells of Martyr Saints Charus, Caecilia and Domestus were intoned in the unadorned splendor of the altar. At the conclusion of the ceremonies, Bishop Kearney celebrated the first Mass at the newly consecrated altar.

PARISHIONERS AND friends who attended the consecration were aided in following the ancient consecration ceremony by printed summaries which were given to each person. The pamphlets described the meaning of consecration and the significance of each act of the ceremony.

INSTALLATION OF the main altar and two matching marble side altars was completed Dec. 21, 1952. Since that time Mass has been celebrated on a consecrated altar stone placed on top of the permanent altar table.

Marble for the main altar and side altars was imported from various sections of Italy. The three-step platform leading to the main altar is of Red Levanto marble. Boreo marble forms the altar table which is supported by columns of Green Alpi marble with gold mosaic inlays.

The solid panel behind the columns, of Poggio Imperiale marble, is centered with natural-color Venetian mosaics forming a pelican design, a liturgical symbol of the early Church.

Stipula marble with vivid red inlaid symbols, houses the Eucharistic tabernacle. The movable top is of renaissance bronze.

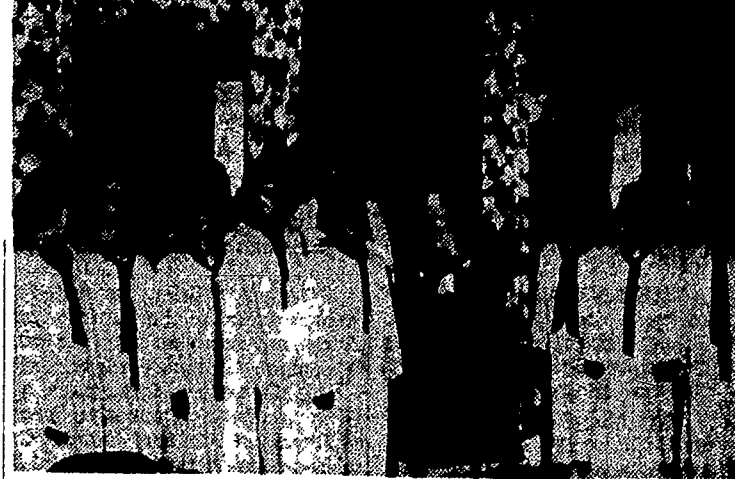
Gold lattice-work, against solid red, forms the background of the altar. On either side are slender columns of white oak. The large crucifix above the altar is of white oak and basswood.

MAINTENANCE OF the altar is used for the lectern and priest's bench in the recently decorated sanctuary. Huge shields, bearing gold conventionalized crosses, illuminate the sanctuary.

This week a new altar railing was installed in keeping with the design of the marble altars, lectern and priest's bench. It is of white oak, carved with liturgical symbols. Burnished bronze flagpoles, between Roman arches, allow for a maximum view of the sanctuary.

Beautification of the sanctuary was done under direction of Dr. Prato Studios of New York City. Design of the marble altars in co-operation with Daprato Studios in Italy.

Korean Carmelite Nuns Return To Seoul Convent

Seoul, Korea — (NC) — The Carmelite nuns, who had to flee from their convent here in December, 1950, have returned from their temporary home in Pusan. They arrived back in their monastery of the Annunciation on the feast of St. Theresa. An advance group of four extern Sisters had come earlier.

The community here numbers 24 now, all Koreans. Six are novices, four postulants. THE CARMELITES stayed in Seoul for the first Communist occupation, June-Sept. 1950. The Reds arrested the five foreign nuns in the community, three French, two Belgian, and brought them to prison camps in the north. Two of the nuns died of hardship in captivity. The other three were released this year through Moscow.

The Korean nuns were obliged to leave their convent during the Red occupation, and became domestic servants. They were received into Catholic households in Seoul.

When the Communists advanced on the city a second time, during the winter of 1950, the Sisters left for Pusan. They maintained a community life there, as refugees.

TWO OF THE foreign Sisters who survived their captivity will return to the Carmel here from France this month. Both are in their fifties. One, Mother Marie Madeleine, mistress of novices, is blind. She lost her sight while a prisoner of the Reds. The other, Mother Marie Henriette, will take the post of prioress. The third survivor of the group is too infirm to leave France.

The Carmel here was founded from the Carmel of Aire, France, about thirteen years ago.

Results Of Nun's Leprosy Vaccine Hailed By Doctors

Rome — (NC) — The leprosy vaccine discovered by a nun has given very satisfactory results in early application, according to a report on the vaccine made to the international Congress on Leprosy held at Madrid. The report has been published by Fides, a mission news agency here.

Reporting on the vaccine at the international congress were Doctors Gate and Roussel of Lyons, France, and Doctor Blanc from Cameroon, South Africa.

THE VACCINE was discovered by Sister Marie Suzanne of the Missionary Sisters of the Society of Mary. She heads a laboratory in Lyons for research on leprosy (Hansen's disease) in the fields of bacteriology, histology and therapeutics.

Doctor Blanc reported on 1,000 cases in which the vaccine was used and the results were "enthusiastically received," the Fides report says.

The vaccine produced a positive reaction in 100 per cent of the children vaccinated and in 63 per cent of the leprosy patients treated, the report says.
