

### U. S. Women Give Shoes For Children

Washington — (NC) — New shoes for the world's impoverished children will be shipped from the U. S. following an annual Christmas drive by the National Council of Catholic Women and its affiliates.

Goal for this year is over 8,000 new children's shoes for the Holy Father's storeroom at the Vatican and 60,000 good-as-new pairs to be distributed by War Relief Services — N.C.W.C. throughout the world.

WOMEN'S GROUPS donating the shoes may choose the destination of the gift — Korea, Germany, Italy, the Far East, etc. — N. C. W. has announced.

Saddle oxfords, suitable for both boys and girls, are preferred by the women's committee on War Relief. Through special arrangements the committee is able to purchase new children's shoes at wholesale prices when club collections are forwarded.

"Perhaps in your own community a kindly shoe repair man will give your group wholesale prices on repairing shoes you collect and clean," a letter to N. C. W. affiliates suggested. "And don't forget the new laces..."

### Italian Immigrant's Son Takes Office As Cleveland Mayor

Cleveland — (NC) — Cleveland's new Mayor Anthony J. Celebrezze has pledged to run his administration of the city "over himself and for the people of Cleveland" and to work for redevelopment programs.

In a brief acceptance speech following the acceptance ceremonies, the new Mayor said he would devote his full energies to using wisely the \$7,500,000 earmarked for slum clearance and would start immediate work on approved redevelopment plans.

Mr. Celebrezze, former State Senator and son of an immigrant Italian, resided at Mass with his wife and three children and parents prior to taking the oath of office.

The Mayor was born and grew up in one of Cleveland's poorer sections.

## 3 Canonizations Slated To Occur During Marian Year

Castelgandolfo, Italy — (NC) — An event awaited by the Catholic world seems virtually certain to take place during the coming Marian Year — the canonization of Blessed Pius X, one of the most beloved Pontiffs of all time. Two other canonizations are also almost sure to be Marian Year events.

The last major step toward conferring the Church's supreme honor on the humble-born Pontiff, who has frequently been called the Pope of the Eucharist, was taken when the Sacred Congregation of Rites formally approved two miracles wrought through his intercession since he was beatified on June 3, 1951.

BY THIS ACTION, which was confirmed in a decree issued by His Holiness Pope Pius XII, the Congregation cleared the way for the first canonization of a Pope since 1712, when St. Pius V, who reigned from 1566 to 1572, was proclaimed a saint.

A meeting of the Congregation of Rites, attended by seven Cardinals, took place at the Pope's summer residence here to vote on two miracles attributed to the intercession of the saintly Pontiff who died on August 20, 1914, at the age of 79. They were miraculous cures in the cases of two Italian, a lawyer and a nun, which had already been unanimously approved by a nine-member medical commission on June 18 of this year.

In addition to approving the miracles attributed to Blessed Pius X, the Congregation voted favorably on miracles in the causes of two other candidates for canonization, who seem likely also to be infallibly proclaimed as saints at ceremonies in St. Peter's Basilica in Rome during the Marian Year.

THE CAUSES were those of Blessed Peter Louis Chanel, a Marist priest who ranks as the first martyr for the Faith in Oceania, and Blessed Maria Crocifissa de Rosa, foundress of the Congregation of the Handmaids of Charity. Blessed Peter was beatified by Pope Leo XIII in 1899, and Blessed Maria by Pope Pius XII in 1940.

Decrees approving the miracles in all three causes were issued by Pope Pius, which meant that all that now remains are decrees stating that it is "safe" to proceed with the canonizations and to set dates for them.

Many are still living who recall the memory of Pope Pius X, who was born Giuseppe Melchior Sarto, at Riese in the Diocese of

### Youth Work Mistake? Father Lord Thinks

Boston — (NC) — One of America's foremost workers for youth started an audience of youth leaders here by declaring that if he had it all to do over again "I would not work for youth — to many people are working for youth today."

Father Daniel A. Lord, S.J., lecturer and pamphleteer, then explained he would devote his life to working for adults, the ones responsible for the problems that face youth today.

Children are inspired by "fashions created by adults," he said, holding that the great psychological heresy of this generation is the misconception that "if you take care of the young people, you don't have to worry about the future."

He suggested that study of youth problems should begin with the study of adults — priests, youth directors and parents.

### Tito Aide Queried On Jailed Bishop

Gratz, Austria — (NC) — A Franciscan provincial has taken up with Yugoslavia's interior minister the case of imprisoned Bishop Peter Cule of Mostar, according to word received here.

Father Milo Kela, O.F.M., head of the Franciscans' Herzegovina Province, and his secretary, Father John Petrovich, O.F.M., are reported to have met with Alexander Rankovic, the interior minister who also heads the OZNA, Tito's secret police. Rankovic received the two Franciscans in Mostar, the capital of Herzegovina.

RADIO ZAGREB said the meeting took place at the request of the Franciscans. This was the first time since the Communists took power in Yugoslavia in 1945 that the No. 2 Yugoslav leader has met representatives of the Franciscans, who act as parish priests in Bosnia, Herzegovina and Dalmatia.

It is reported from Zagreb that the Franciscans used the opportunity of Rankovic's coming to Mostar to submit a memorandum of complaints concerning the precarious position of the Church and of religion in Bosnia and Herzegovina. Besides Bishop Cule, more than 50 priests and Franciscans are still held in prisons and concentration camps.

The late Father Leo Petrovich, O.F.M., predecessor of the present provincial, and seven other leading Franciscans were murdered February 14, 1945, the day the Communist Partisans entered Mostar. The priests' bodies were thrown into the River Neretva and never found.

### Milk Shipped To Needy Asians

Hong Kong — (NC) — More than 800 barrels of powdered milk for distribution to 57 refugee and relief centers have arrived on the S.S. Adelaide, with transportation costs borne by War Relief Services — National Catholic Welfare Conference.

The powdered milk, when mixed, will fill 2,600,000 bottles. It is surplus milk supplied gratis for relief agencies by the United States Government.

This relief shipment will eventually go to children in refugee schools, orphans, old people, lepers and others. A hundred barrels will be distributed in Macao.

## No Help In Sight For Refugee Arabs, Says Mission Aide

Rome — (NC) — No end is yet in sight to the plight of Palestine's homeless Arab refugees, according to Magr. Thomas J. McMahon, president of the Pontifical Mission for Palestine, who was in Rome to report to various Vatican agencies on the results of a recent tour of the Near and Middle East.

"The official United Nations relief agency, UNRWA, and the many collaborating voluntary agencies, including the Pontifical Mission for Palestine, have still many months, and perhaps years, to go before all misery will end," Monsignor McMahon declared.

"WHILE I found the condition of many refugees much improved," he said, "I also came away from the area deeply depressed by the thought that after five years of haplessness and hopelessness, there are still many hundreds of thousands still under tents, exposed to a continuing spiritual and physical hardship."

Monsignor McMahon, who also is the national secretary of the Catholic Near East Welfare Association, with headquarters in New York, took the occasion of his return from the areas of distress to reply to recent accusations of Israeli press organs for what they called his "campaign of defamation against Israel."

"It can hardly be called defamation," he declared, "when the Catholic Church insists on a settlement of the Palestine question in accordance with its stake of 20 centuries in the Holy Land. Nor is it a 'campaign' when we continue to remind the United Nations of its resolutions and votes for the internationalization of Jerusalem, and for justice to 800,000 homeless refugees."

"Furthermore," Monsignor McMahon added, "it is neither a campaign nor defamation when the Catholic press throughout the world expresses indignation over the destruction of villages and churches in Israel. We would be abdicating our rightful Catholic position, so clearly stated in three encyclical letters of Pope Pius XII on Palestine, were we not to remind Israel continuously that we expect fundamental justice and respect for Christian claims, internally and internationally."

### Red Gang Attempts To Wreck Shrine

Vladivostok — (NC) — A group of Communists tried to destroy a historic Marian shrine in Slavka, one of the most staunchly Catholic areas of Czechoslovakia, according to reports here.

Located near Bratislava, the shrine is that of Our Lady of Mariatal, which is regarded as one of the most beautiful of its kind in Europe, and has been a center of Catholic devotion since early in the 12th century.

The reports stated that the Communist intruders sought to demolish the shrine and carry off the image of the Virgin, but were repulsed by alerted Catholics.

A voluntary guard of Catholics was subsequently organized to protect the shrine from possible further attacks, the report added.
