

Knights of Columbus Set Third Degree Class To Honor Auxiliary Bishop Casey

Candidates to be initiated in the Third Degree, Knights of Columbus on Sunday, Dec. 13 in Columbus Civic Center will be known as the "Bishop Lawrence B. Casey Class," in honor of the new Auxiliary Bishop of Rochester and a member of the class.

according to Deputy Grand Knight Andrew E. Knauf, chairman of Rochester Council membership committee.

The degree will be in charge of District Deputy Raymond L. Nary and Grand Knight George F. Vick, Jr. will welcome the new

members. This is an opportunity for practical Catholic men residing in the layman's organization which numbers more than 900,000 members, Knauf said this week.

KNOWN FOR its welfare work in Wars 1 and 2, the Knights of Columbus have taken a leading role in Catholic education with support of the Catholic University of America, have contributed to national projects like the Catholic Hour, have sent qualified speakers throughout the country in opposition to Communism since the time the evils of atheistic Communism threatened this country, Knauf noted.

He cited the work now being done by national advertising to bring truths of the Catholic church to those not of the faith. More than a half-a-million dollars are being spent in this advertising project.

Under the headings such as "Why do Catholics Adore Statues?" and "Do Catholics Swear Allegiance to the Pope?" and other provocative titles, the K. of C. advertisements have caught in the Rochester area to become affiliated with a national Catholic eye of millions of readers. More than a million and half have inquired for free booklets. Instructions have been taken by many and converts are mounting.

ON THE LOCAL scene, Deputy Grand Knight Knauf said the steady growth of Rochester council and other K. of C. units in the diocese has been due to the encouragement given by His Excellency Bishop Kearney, who is a former state chaplain of the order.

The Rochester Council has fostered the First Friday Luncheon Club for 11 years at Sheraton Hotel and has encouraged Days of Recollection and Retreats at the Notre Dame Retreat House. The recitation of the Rosary in Columbus Civic Center chapel precedes each meeting.

Active in civic affairs the council, this year, sponsored a charity benefit pro-football game at Aquinas Stadium in August. Each year the knights take Christmas cheer to the disabled veterans in Bath. During World War 2, a canteen was conducted for servicemen.

Younger men have the advantages of bowling, of dances in the clubrooms and gymnasium facilities in Columbus Civic Center, Knauf said.

ROCHESTER COUNCIL is inviting practical Catholic laymen to join in the order's work and enjoyment here, locally, in the state council which sponsors scholarships and a tuberculosis hospital and nationally in the advertising and educational projects, Knauf said.

Comic Book Peril Told In National Magazine Article

The startling truth about the 90,000,000 comic books America's children read each month is literally laid bare in a Ladies Home Journal feature of the November issue.

"What Parents don't know about Comic Books" is revealed in this spine-tingling horror feature, accompanied by graphic sample cartoons and diagrams.

Dr. Frederic Wertham, the consulting psychiatrist of the Department of Hospitals, New York City, is the author of this expose of the uncomic effect of comic books upon America's youth.

The keynote of crime-comic books, says Doctor Wertham, "is violence and sadism." He relates at length episodes from comics to prove this point.

THE PSYCHIATRIST'S most chilling indictment of the comics is his opinion that current trends in real juvenile crimes of sadism, headlined each day in the nation's newspapers, are the same as those described in comic books.

Items on the list of examples of these realistic crimes include: the hanging and torture of a nude seven-year-old boy which investigating officers found to be a re-enacted comic-book plot; holdup and killing of a woman by an eleven-year-old boy whose older brother blamed "these rotten comic books."

"I could continue this list almost indefinitely," says the doctor. "There is nothing in these juvenile delinquencies that is not described in comic books. These are comic book plots."

"The average parent has no idea that every imaginable crime is described in detail in comic books. That is their main stock in trade. If one were to set out to teach children how to steal, rob, lie, cheat, assault and break into candy stores, no more insistent method could be devised."

The campaign against evil literature was launched by Holy Rosary Holy Name Society following a sermon by Monsignor Shay, on Nov. 8.

Three spot-checks in the neighborhood made early in the week turned out favorably according to President Charles Northcote. The proprietors threw out the objectionable reading matter and promised not to renew it.

Monsignor Shay said, this week, that response of the public to his sermon and published reports of it, was most gratifying. He was called by parents and business people commending the action taken to cleanup reading matter offered for sale for young persons.

President Northcote who is directing the campaign with the Rev. James Marvin, spiritual director of the Holy Rosary men's group advised campaigners before distributing the "all clear" sign to give merchants a chance to eliminate the bad literature.
