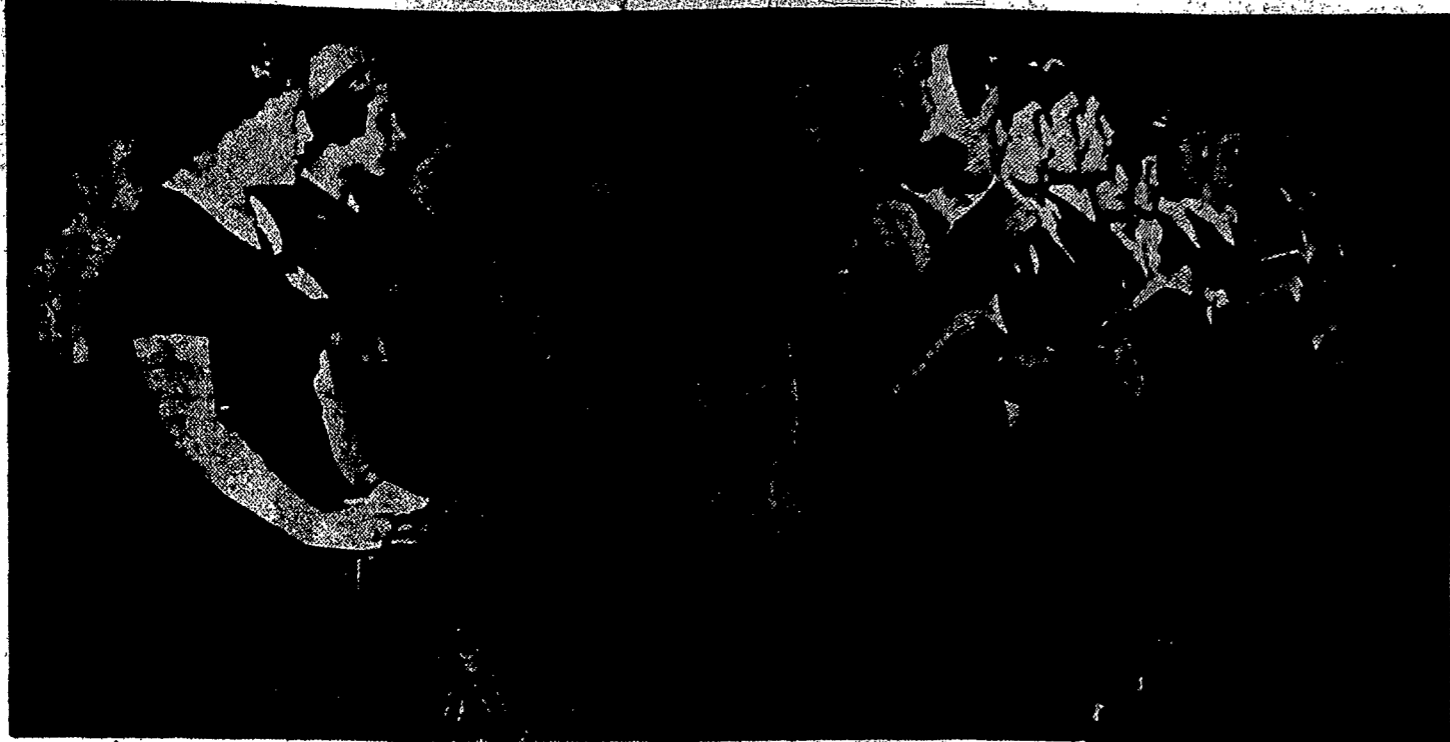


'LITTLE PEOPLE' SING THE CHANT

Liturgical Singing of Children's Choir, Seminarians Praised By Bishop Kearney

Climaxed by the inspired singing of more than 700 parochial school children in the recessional "To Christ the King" by Sister Raphael, B.V.M. and featured by St. Bernard's Seminary choir's chanting of the Benedictus from Gounod's Mass of St. Cecilia, the Solemn Pontifical Mass marking the 50th anniversary of Pope Pius X's Motu Proprio was celebrated in Sacred Heart Cathedral, Sunday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock.

His Excellency Bishop Kearney celebrated the Mass, first announced in the pronouncement of Blessed Pope Pius X was in the full tradition of church music in the Diocese of Rochester.

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St. Bernard's choir was directed by the Rev. Charles J. McCarthy, professor of music at the seminary and the children's choir accompanied by teaching Religion of the different orders was under the direction of the Rev. Albert L. Simonetti, pastor of Church of the Annunciation.

The ceremony took place appropriately on the Feast of St. Cecilia, the Bishop said because it was in recognition of her great contribution to church music, that Pope Pius X wrote his Motu Proprio in 1903.

ONE OF THE features of the great Marian Year about to open the Bishop said will be the expected canonization of Pius X a great advocate of the simple things in life.

The Bishop recalled that Pius X restored the art of Christian doctrine teaching and his famous Encyclical on that subject has motivated the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine and its progress.

Pius X advocated the singing of the chant and he concerned himself with bringing the singing of church music "back into the pews." The sole purpose of the Motu Proprio's advocacy of church music, the Bishop said, "was for little people like you to sing it as you did this afternoon."

The third great achievement of Pius X, the Bishop said was his radical legislation on the subject of Holy Communion, encouraging earlier reception in life by little ones and frequent reception by adults. Pius X opened "the treasury of the tabernacle to all," the Bishop said.

Assisting the Bishop in the Mass were: the Rt. Rev. Msgr. James C. McAniff, Chancellor and Assistant Priest; the Rev. Benedict Ehmann, deacon; Rev. William J. Riefer, subdeacon; the Rev. George V. Predmore, and the Rev. Leo C. Mooney, diocesan coordinator of music, deacons of honor, and the Very Rev. Msgr. John E. Maney, master of ceremonies.

Every year in the month of December sons of Adolph Kolping all over the world gather to celebrate the anniversary of their founder.

In memory of Adolph Kolping, the Rochester Society will lead the "Rosary for Peace" over station W5AY on Tuesday, Dec. 1, at which time the Rev. Besides Father Kolping's cause, the process for beatification for three former members of the society is pending. A Benedictine Lay Brother, Brother Meinrad Eugster, the founder of the Salvatorian Congregation, Francis Maria of the Cross Jordan, who was a painter before becoming a priest, and Brother Jordan May who was the carrier of the Kolping banner before becoming a Franciscan.

AT THE PRESENT, members of the Kolping Society from all over the world are sending petitions to the Holy See, asking the Holy Father to give them the honor of the altar.

On Dec. 20 at 9:00 a.m. the Rev. Francis X. Kenny, C.S.S.R., Praeses of the local branch will celebrate at the Retreat House, a Holy Mass for the Beatification of Father Kolping.
