Saturday, Dec. 6 — Blessed Sacrament, Mercy Motherhouse, Rochester.

1. A Plenary Indulgence may be gained once each day during the Devotion on the usual conditions of confession and communion by making a visit to the church in which the Forty-Hours is being observed, and there praying before the Blessed Sacrament. Five Our Fathers, five Hail Marys and five Glory be to the Father, should be said, and another Our Father, Hail Mary and Glory be to the Father should be added for the intention of the Holy Father. Those who are present at the procession gain a Plenary Indulgence.

2. A Partial Indulgence of fifteen years may be gained for each visit made on the days of the Devotion, with recitation of the above named prayers.

3. These indulgences are applicable to the souls in Purgatory. 4. All the Altars of the Church are privileged during the time of exposition.

5. No change in the time set for this Devotion may be made without written permission of the Ordinary.

CDA Court To Mark 24th Anniversary

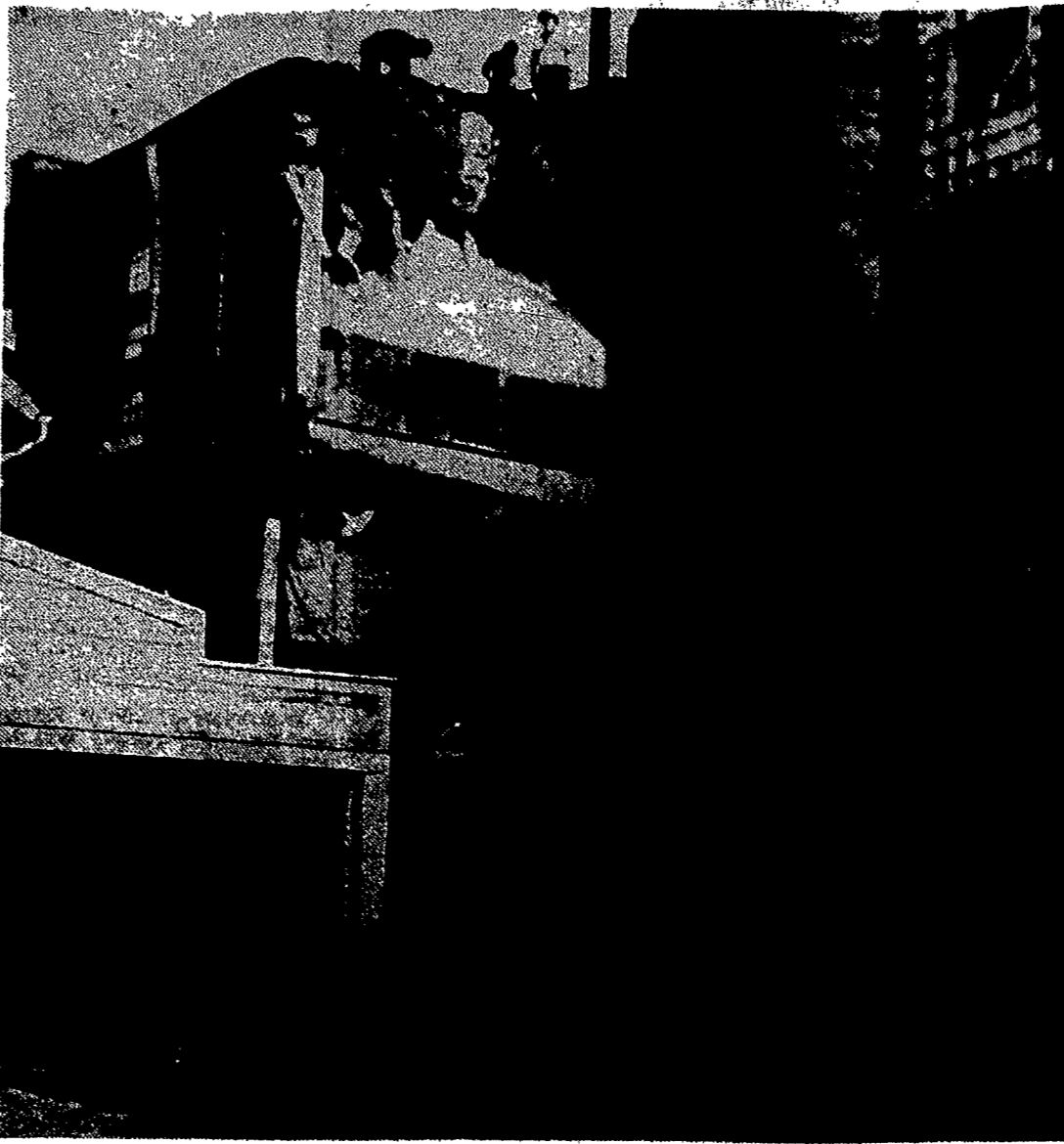

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Princess Ileana Calls Communism Religion of Evil

Communism was described as "a religion of evil, utterly lacking in all moral standards," by Princess Ileana, of Romania, speaking in the Thomas More Lecture Forum at Rochester Chamber of Commerce, Tuesday night.

The Princess, also Archduchess of Austria and great-granddaughter of Queen Victoria of England whose homeland is blacked out by Communism urged Americans to see the battle between the free world and Communism as the battle for the world's future.

"Our whole civilization," she told a capacity audience in the large hall of the Chamber, "is based on certain standards of what is wrong and what is right. The Communist has none of the standards that we understand—neither of moral good or evil, of freedom, or of the value of human life."

When the Communists assumed control in Romania, she said, unification and agrarian reforms already had been accomplished by her father. Farms were privately owned, none measuring over 500 acres, she said; 94 per cent of the homes were private property; industries were small and free of government control, the economy was stabilized.

"When the Communists entered, there was no section nor age group which they did not immediately penetrate and regulate. Communications, railroads, aviation, highways and all provisions and property were strictly controlled. Money was devalued to one-twentieth of its value, and the people—all of us—were reduced to barker."

"COMMUNISM," she said, "is a religion which has its martyrs, its prophets and its ministers, who cannot understand and have no tolerance for people who still possess moral standards of any kind other than materialistic aims. It often is supported by intellectuals who have lost their moral feeling and seek an explanation and theory of history."

"We must seek to give ourselves with our basic beliefs and have the courage to live them and be unafraid to die for them if necessary. We belong to the large community of the human race, and we must live in that community in Christian love and human understanding."

Society Pays Tribute To Adolph Kolping, Founder

bread; but to pray—yes, truly, they could pray."

BECAUSE OF the dire poverty at home, Adolph Kolping was obliged to forego his wish of studying for the priesthood in his younger days. Instead, he became a shoemaker.

After his years of apprenticeship he began his traditional wanderings as journeyman and thus got first hand information of the social conditions of those journeymen, the low moral standard of his fellow workers.

For eight years he wandered from city to city sharing the lot of the journeymen, who by the decay of the guild system became acceptable to revolutionary ideas and began to become a real plague for the people.

When Father Kolping later on counseled the great Bishop von Ketteler on the construction of the famous Encyclical Quadragesimo Anno and the Pope's plan for Social reconstruction, Kolping knew what he was talking about by his own bitter experience.

FINALLY AT the age of 24 he was in a position to think in a more practical way of his boyhood's dream to become a priest and sat with children in high school to start at the very bottom of studies. At the age of 32 he was ordained with the conviction that "the priest must leave the sacristy and get out among the people."

In a short time, Father Kolping became the apostle of youth and father for the homeless journeyman. He gathered them in homes and gave them religious instructions and saw to it that they received proper training in their trades. But not only with words he preached to them, his actions spoke still louder.

When the pestilence came over Cologne and Kolping heard of a journeyman stricken by the disease abandoned by others in the fear of contagion, he went and took care of him. In all his work he had overtaken his strength and fell easy prey to the disease himself, hovering near death for a long time.

The same evening when Karl Marx proclaimed his manifesto, Adolph Kolping only a few blocks away gathered his journeymen around him telling them of the necessity of labor; and of course, "Justice for all" active party. He stated emphatically that his organization was to aid in the reconstruction of the social order by reforming the journeyman.
