**Catholics Reject 'Solution' In Missouri Bus Issue**

St. Louis, Mo. — (NC) — A new ruling, hailed by the secular press as a solution to Missouri's school bus problem, may get Catholic children aboard some school buses, but they will have to pay their way.

An opinion by Missouri Attorney General John M. Dalton advising school boards that they may sell their buses to private purchasers to transport school children, was reported by some sources as a compromise measure which would allow parochial school children to ride the buses under public auspices.

THE OPINION followed a previous ruling by the Attorney General that state funds may not be used to transport parochial school students. The ruling came after a Missouri Supreme Court decision that barred use of State funds for parochial school transportation.

That ruling ended a long-standing practice in the State and left parochial school students without means of transportation to and from school. The ruling was objected to by Catholic organizations and clergy here.

In answer to a request by State Senator Meredith Garten the Attorney General recently gave the opinion that school districts may sell their buses and contract with private operators. The buses must be sold for cash, he added, and the sales must be made "for the benefit of the district."

CATHOLIC SOURCES have stated that the opinion is in no way a solution to the bus transportation problem. The opinion stated that "a board of education has authority to contract with private owners for the free transportation of children to public schools."

There was nothing in the opinion to change the earlier ruling that parochial school children may not receive transportation aid from State funds.

Previously, both parochial and public school children have used the buses together under State auspices.

If you wish to help trim it, send a toy or a dollar and we will do the rest."

**Refugees In Korea Still Need Help**

New York — (NC) — The pathetic plight of a million Korean refugees was emphasized here by Msgr. George Carroll, M.M., who returned this morning to the country to report on the urgent need for continued shipments of relief materials to Korea during the coming winter months.

The Monsignor is the Korea representative of War Relief Services—National Catholic Welfare Conference. He made his report at the agency's headquarters here.

"IT LOOKS like this winter is going to be the hardest yet for the million civilian refugees from North Korea," the Monsignor said. "They now have lost all hope of returning to their homes."

WRS—N.C.W.C., at the direction of Cincinnati's Archbishop Karl J. Alter, chairman of the National Catholic Welfare Conference Administrative Board, is now engaged in promoting the annual Thanksgiving clothing campaign. It will be conducted in some 100 archdioceses and dioceses the country over during the week of November 22 to 29.

Goal of the campaign has been fixed in excess of the ten million pounds of relief material which was donated last year.

The contributions will go not only to the relief of the Korean refugees, but also to aid the needy and destitute in Europe, the Near and Far East. It has been pointed out by Msgr. Edward E. Swannerton, WRS—N.C.W.C. executive director, that with the signing of the truce and the end of hostilities in Korea, the million refugees from North Korea lost hope of being able to return to their homes above the 38th Parallel.

THE MONSIGNOR emphasized that in addition to the million North Korean refugees, there are some three million homeless South Koreans who are also in urgent need of our help.

These are returning to their villages to find everything homes, fields and buildings destroyed completely," Monsignor Carroll said.

The Maryknoll Missioner said that the five million pounds of clothing and other relief materials which WRS—N.C.W.C. donated to Korea from last year's Thanksgiving clothing campaign, kept warm more than a million refugees.

"IT ALSO kept alive in them."

**Catholics Approve Action Britain Took In Guiana**

London — (NC) — Approval by all religious groups in British Guiana, including Catholics, of the recent action taken by the British government there in suspending the constitution was reported here on the return of Henry Hopkinson, Minister of State for Colonial Affairs.

THE "DRASTIC" action taken by the British government came when it was discovered that the People's Progressive Party under Prime Minister Cheddi Jagan and his Chagosome wife, Janet Rosenberg, were plotting a coup d'etat to set up a communist republic.

According to Mr. Hopkinson, this communist party was "endeavouring to remove church control of the schools and to stop the churches from selecting the teachers. Of the 276 schools in Guiana, 253 are church schools with dual control by the churches and the educational authority."

The leaders of the Christian Social Council, representing every denomination, including the Roman Catholics, told me that the British government's action had been necessary."

ABOUT A TENTH of the population in the Latin American country are Catholics, who are reported to be the most active of all religious groups there.

Explaining the methods of the communist politicians trying to set up a republic in South America, John Fernandes, prominent Catholic member of the colony's old legislative council, told the Catholic Herald here that fully 65 per cent of all Guianese students who attended British universities went Red. "The communists in Britain made it their business to capture the minds of these young men," he said, "by befriending them and by exploiting their natural grievances. Most of the deposed communistic cabinet of Dr. Cheddi Jagan were English University Reds."

Honolulu, T. H. — (NC) — Mother Mary Jolenta, Mother General of the Sisters of the Third Order of St. Francis in Syracuse, N. Y., was honored here for her contributions to the nursing profession in Hawaii.

Mother Mary Jolenta, former administrator of St. Francis Hospital here and regional superior of the Syracuse community of the Franciscan nuns in the Honolulu diocese was singled out for special recognition in a resolution adopted by the Nurses' Association of the Territory of Hawaii at its 22nd annual convention.

Mother Mary Jolenta came to the Islands in 1935. She was named administrator of the hospital in 1938, and regional superior in 1946. While here she was active in nursing circles. She is a past president of the Hospital Council of Honolulu, and of the Nurses' Association which recently honored her. She was elected Mother General, highest office in her community, last August.

**'Taken In' By Reds, Says Minister**

Duluth, Minn. — (RNS) — The Rev. Kenneth Jackson Smith, minister of First Unitarian church here, whose name is listed on material circulated by the National Committee to Win Amnesty for the Smith Act Victims, says he was "taken in."

The 11 Communist leaders for whom amnesty is being sought were convicted Oct. 14, 1949, of conspiring to advocate the violent overthrow of the United States government. Ten of them were later sentenced to five-year prison terms.

MR. SMITH SAID that about six months ago he received a letter from a group of ministers regarding the campaign against the Smith Act, which makes it a crime to seek overthrow of the government by force and violence.

He said he recognized the name of one "whom I had no reason to suspect" of being a Communist sympathizer and signed the letter.

Subsequent use of his name along with those of suspected Communist-frontiers has "made me very angry," Mr. Smith asserted.

He said he assumes the man whose name he recognized on the list "also had been taken in."
