Determined to pass the goal of \$150,000, workers in the campaign to rebuild Our Lady of Mt. Carmel School spurred by the women's division daily reports, will make the final tabulation Monday, Dec. 14 at a dinner in Hotel Seneca.

A report meeting was scheduled for Thursday of this week in the Lewis Street Center House and results were not available as this paper went to press.

THE CAMPAIGN was sent off to a flying start at the first report meeting, last Friday, when the Rev. Frank Valukkevicius and the Rev. Frederick Elsemann, campaign managers, reported \$63,437.70 pledged in five days.

Louis Martino's team topped the men's division with pledges of \$33,436. In the women's division the team captained by Lucy Vallone was high with \$2,940 reported. The women's division led the five competing divisions with \$27,372.90 and this will be greatly increased because of the women's extra activity in the drive, campaign managers reported.

The Rev. Charles J. Arzi, pastor will receive the final reports which are hoped to assure rebuilding the school which was heavily damaged by fire on Nov. 2. The Very Rev. Msgr. John C. Randall who outlined campaign procedure will direct making of reports.

to the national stability, economic as well as cultural.

"ALTOGETHER TOO many people for our own good are in the big cities. So far as food production goes, the parasitic and dependent part of our population is enormously out of proportion to the part which produces food and the disproportion becomes increasingly grave with each passing year as farm areas are deserted by young people. New blood is badly needed in the farm areas of the United States."

Bishop McElroy said that overpopulation and unemployment were the main reasons why "Communism has made progress in Italy and other countries."

Senator John O. Pastore of Rhode Island, who was toastmaster, declared that two million Italians are now jobless.

Mr. Siciliano read a message from President Eisenhower which said that the honor given him by the committee "applies equally to the many legislators who did so much to facilitate passage" of the 1953 Act.

"Our nation has gained from the experience of two wars, a deep understanding of international human relations," the President stated. "Through the Refugee Act of 1953 we have taken the leadership in solving the basic problem of over population that besets so many of the free nations of the world. We are hopeful that this legislation will stimulate action on the part of other nations in a position to welcome permanent settlers."

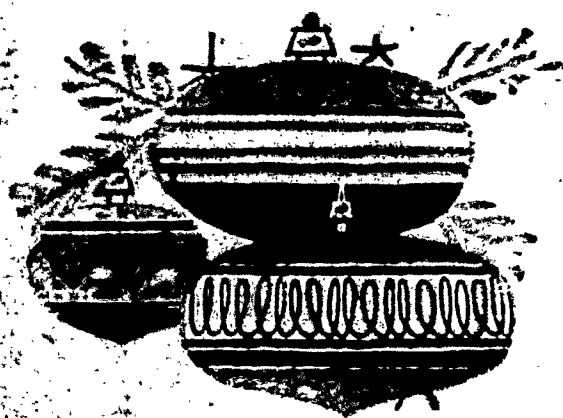
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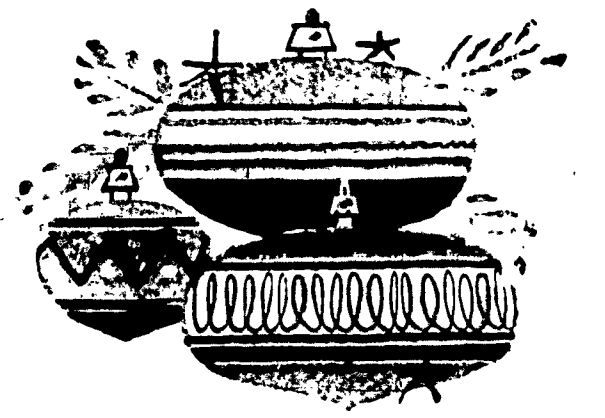
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
