

Dr. Joseph Lane Elected Head of St. Mary's Staff

St. Mary's Hospital staff elected Dr. Joseph A. Lane president to succeed Dr. Leo LaPalm on Tuesday. Dr. Lane is a veteran of two World Wars and has been a member of the hospital staff for 30 years.

A 1932 graduate of Georgetown University Medical School, Dr. Lane is a diplomate of the American Board of Surgeons and a fellow of the American College of Surgeons.

He is attending surgeon at St. Mary's and Monroe County hospitals, and consulting surgeon at the Air Force Hospital at Sampson Air Base.

Dr. Lane, who lives at 4 Al-lan Pkwy., was a student-soldier in World War I and was discharged from World War 2 naval service as a commander. His son-in-law, Capt. Forbes R. Hald, of Rochester, is a Marine Corps fighter pilot in Korea.

Times Set For Mailing

Postal employees are asking "Where is the Christmas mail?" All preparations are made to handle a large volume of Christmas cards and gifts, but these have not yet been mailed.

There is still a big job to do says Acting Postmaster John S. Cain. "We are prepared to handle a large volume of mail and hope that the public will cooperate by mailing early and avoiding the disappointment that is bound to come if everyone waits until the last minute. The amount of early mail this year is very low. Time is running out. If the public will get the mail into the post office, we will get it out—and deliver it by Christmas—but we must have early mailing."

To assist the public in early mailing, service windows at the Main Post Office will be open as follows:

Parcel Post Windows—7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.
C.O.D. Windows—8:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.
Stamp Windows—7:30 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.
Money Order Windows—8:30 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.
Registry Windows—8:30 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Classified Stations and branches will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Mail carriers will make as many daily deliveries as are necessary.

Send your Christmas cards with first class postage to local addresses and send those for out of town by air mail or special delivery. Air parcel post is recommended for any remaining gift packages going to other states.

This year a bigger load of Christmas mail is expected than ever before.

Patrons may submit their local address list to Room 101, Main Post Office, for insertion of zone numbers. List will be returned to them. There is no charge for this service.

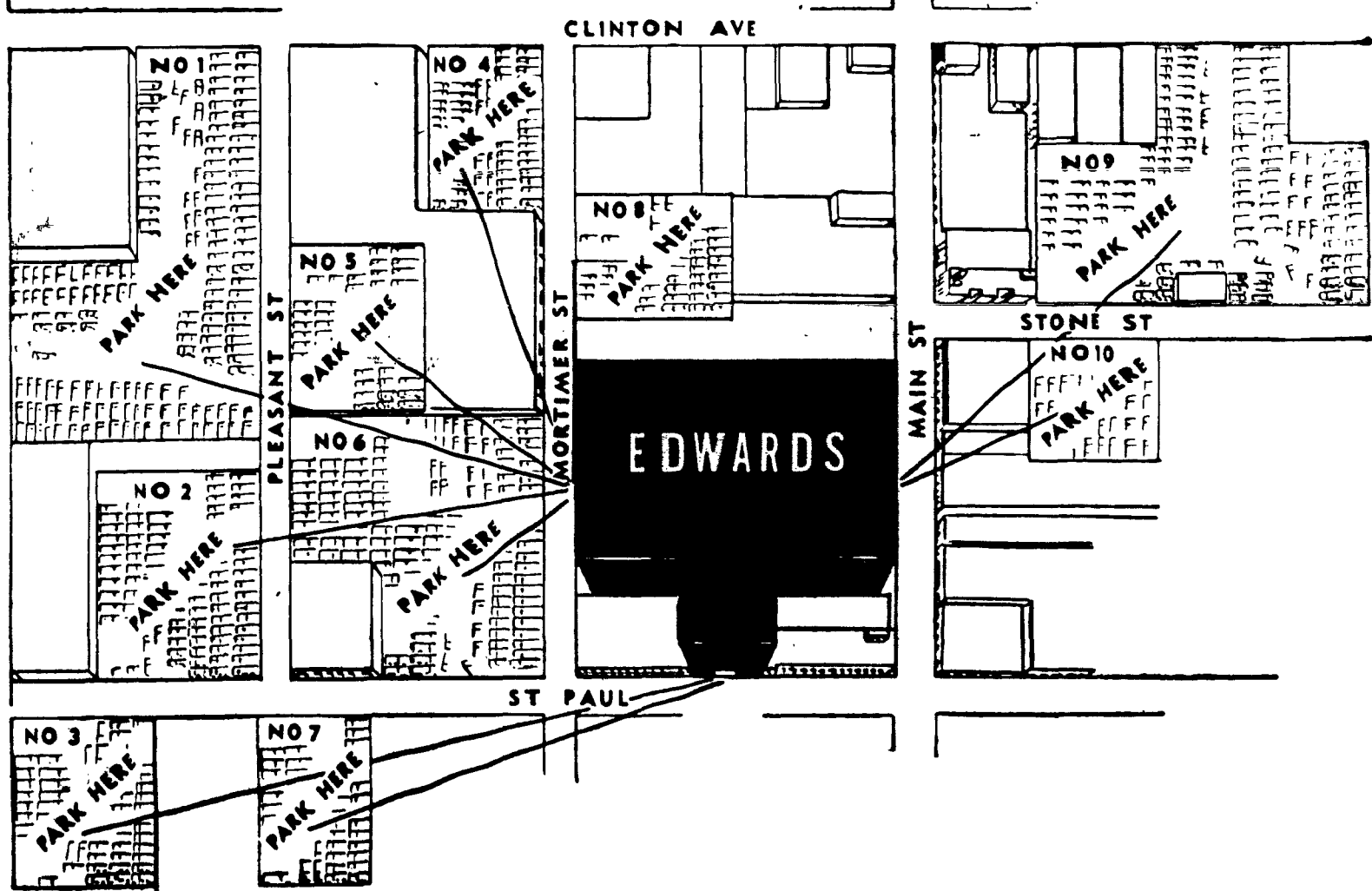
