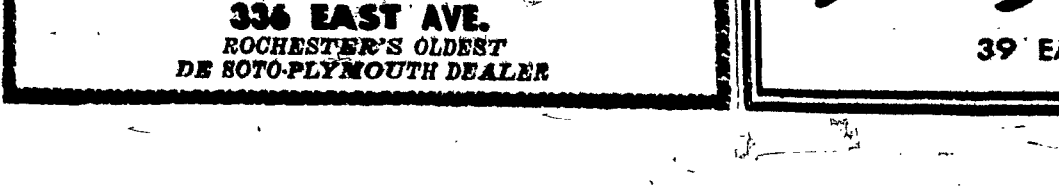
## Girl Campers To Have Yule Party
